Biosphere Festival at St Olave's

St Olave's was part of the 2025 Biosphere Festival in the form of a 50 minute guided visit to the church and churchyard led by Richard Smout. The Isle of Wight was designated by UNESCO as a Biosphere Reserve in 2019 for its ecological and its cultural diversity. It is therefore the interaction between human residents and the environment in which they live which is being celebrated in the festival. The visit was given the title "St Olave's: a witness to change."

A total of twenty people attended the two walks that were offered. As the title implies, the aim was to give visitors a greater understanding of the church and its history, but also see how the natural world in which St Olave's sits, and our attitude to it, has changed over the years.

The weather was fine and hot, although less oppressive than it had been the previous day. It did mean that the bulk of the event was held inside the church where it was cooler and there was shade. In addition to a traditional introduction to the church building and the many delights that it possesses, we looked at how Gatcombe Parish had been carved out of the Anglo-Saxon parish of Carisbrooke, and spent a little time on place names: Gatcombe meaning "goat valley" and Ramsdown being likely to refer to wild garlic, or ramsons, rather than sheep being grazed on the local downland.

We looked at how the ability to choose the next rector, the advowson, had at one stage been acquired by the local landowners, and how in the early 19th century the Campbells at Gatcombe House had redesigned the local roads to push back the Carisbrooke to Chillerton road further from their home, and give them more privacy.

Churchwardens had been responsible for the control of what were regarded as pests, and in Gatcombe moles, stoats, and in particular sparrows (and other seed-eating birds) were taken, sometimes in huge numbers. Other species have been introduced, such as foxes in 1845. Badgers were re-introduced in the 1920s, having died out on the Island at the end of the nineteenth century. Outside in the churchyard a number of the species that we take for granted are in fact introductions from the Mediterranean from the 16th and 17th century, including ivy-leaved toadflax, red valerian, and (from a little later) the tiny plant called "mind-

your-own-business." Other plants were regarded as of being of medicinal value. A single foxglove was in flower, while herb, bennett was St Benedict's Herb, believed to have been used in a cordial to ward off the plague and bad breath. The churchyard is well provided with ferns, a group of plants much sought after by collectors in the 19th century.

Many thanks to everyone who came and supported this event. It was very clear how fond people across the Island are of St Olave's church and churchyard in the feedback given after the event. Richard Smout



Big Butterfly Count

Following on from the count of butterflies at St Olave's last year, the exercise was repeated in 2025.

The same number of species was seen in both years, although there were many fewer individual butterflies seen this time. This may have been due to slightly fresher temperatures but also to the fact that last year's count was eight days earlier, on 29th July, rather than 6th August, and a number of the species seen in 2024 are now past their peak. Food plants like brambles are starting to fruit whereas last year there were lots of flowers, particularly in the churchyard extension, which were a source of nectar.

No examples of Speckled Wood, Gatekeeper or Small White were observed, although all of these were around this year in July. Numbers of Meadow Brown have dropped dramatically between the two counts, but

numbers of this species were also strong earlier in the year. Three new species were found: Red Admiral, Large White and Comma, and it was good to see that the most numerous species was Green-Veined White, about which there has been concern after a particularly poor year in 2024.

Butterfly Conservation's COUNT

The results have been submitted to the Big Butterfly Count website, and may help to identify long-term trends in butterfly populations. Richard Smout
