

REVEREND'S REFLECTIONS



Bishop Sam & Revd Simon

New Beginnings and the **Enduring Need for Christ**

As we turn the calendar to September, the signs of a new term are all around us. Children with fresh uniforms, students preparing for university, and even those of us long out of education still feel that subtle pull toward fresh starts and renewed purpose. September often feels more like the "new year" than January does—a season of possibility.

New beginnings are something the Christian faith understands deeply. At the heart of the gospel is the promise that, in Christ, we are made new. "If anyone is in Christ," writes Paul, "they are a new creation; the old has gone, the new has come!" (2 Corinthians 5:17). This isn't just a one-time event but a daily invitation. As we step into this new term whether that's returning to routines, starting new ventures, or simply navigating the changing season—we are reminded that God is always doing something new in our lives.

Yet as we look around Britain today, it is clear that our nation is in need of renewal. Public trust is often shaken. Loneliness and anxiety are growing realities. Many people are searching for something deeper, truer, more hopeful. And this is where Christianity still speaks with a powerful and relevant voice. The message of grace, forgiveness, community, and hope in Christ is not just ancient—it is urgent.

In times of uncertainty, the local church becomes even more essential. It is here that people can find not just answers but belonging. Not just tradition, but transformation. Not just services, but service.

I've been encouraged by simple but profound moments in our own setting in recent weeks: the team at St Paul's providing breakfast each Saturday morning for the homeless and the lonely, the bustling Cosy Cuppa in Rainow is a space for people to come together and share fellowship; or the quiet but faithful commitment of those who clean, care, and prepare our churches week in and week out. These are not just "church activities"—they are signs of the Kingdom of God breaking through.

This term let's recommit to being the kind of church and the kind of people that live out the love of Jesus in ways both bold and humble. Whether it's welcoming someone new to our congregation, volunteering with a local charity or on a church rota, inviting a friend to church, or simply praying for our neighbours—we all have a part to play.

The needs are great, but so is the grace of God. And in Him, every beginning is sacred. As we embrace the opportunities of this new term, may we do so with open hearts and willing hands, trusting that God is already at work among us and ahead of us.

God of all seasons,

You make all things new in your time. As we step into this new term, renew our hearts, refresh our purpose, and guide our steps in the way of Christ. Help us to be a light in our community, and to walk each day with faith, hope, and love. In Jesus' name we pray, Amen.

Family History Research

Would you like to know more about your UK ancestors?

How I can help you:

If your ancestors lived in England and Wales, I can carry out an online search. This will usually trace families back to the late 18th century, although this can be tricky for very common surnames. Some online records go back further. Searching in Ireland, Northern Ireland, Scotland, Isle of Man or the Channel Islands will usually incur additional costs, and records are not so readily available.

HEALTH WARNING:

If you would be offended to find examples of ILLEGITIMACY, INSANITY or CRIMINALITY in your family, then do not search for your ancestors or cousins. These phenomena can be found in practically ALL families! (But it can be quite interesting!)





The roof appeal fund total is:

£46,387.93

(end August 2025)

A reminder of what our thoughts for 'first phase' of the project are:

- Re-roof the upper and lower rooves of the church, including modifications to the guttering to prevent water getting into the building in the future
 - · Replace and re-plaster all internal ceilings panels
 - · Re-plaster internal walls where needed
 - · Redecorate the building internally
 - · Re-light the building with energy efficient lighting
 - · Modernise the sound and media system
 - · Reheat the building in an energy efficient way
 - · Repair the spire where issues are arising

Matt, Nick and Vicar Simon had a positive meeting recently with Architect Ed Kepzyck and Sheena Wilson (Diocesan Buildings Advisor) about how to really begin to move the project on. Lots of discussion was had around what stages we need to complete to feel ready to move to the next stage. From the meeting we are going to do the following: *Create a project brief (what do we want and why)

- * Gain PCC approval for a Feasibility Study for the project to be completed by the Architect. APPROVED BY PCC IN JULY 2025.
- * Arrange for Quinquennial Inspection to take place to aid the study
- * Re-meet once completed and look to send the study to the Diocesan Advisory Committee (DAC) for first thoughts and then wider sharing to all stakeholders.

At the meeting of the PCC on 24th June, approval was met unanimously by all members to instruct our Architects to undertake a Feasibility Study. This is a costly piece of work (Approx £10,000) but a vitally important part of any project to be completed. The study will look at what we want, consultations completed, a survey of the building (above and beyond the Quinquennial inspection) options of project style including re-ordering. It is looking likely that this is something that we will have to consider extremely seriously to ensure the future of the building, ensuring worship space remains the focus but with a flexible community space to help us become a beacon of light in our community. If anyone wishes to have a look an example study then please do ask and we will be happy to show you.

The study will take 2-3 months to complete from start date and as soon as we know when this is we will let you know and of course we will share as much of this as possible with you.

Look out in the coming weeks for an email asking you to think about and share with us what is important about the church now and what do you think we could do with the space. More in depth detail about this will be in the email once sent out.

This is really an exciting time for St Paul's as we move towards the biggest refurbishment of the building in it's 180 year history and look to secure the future of the church and have a legacy to pass on to future generations. We are both genuinely excited by the opportunities that await us.

Please do raise any questions with us (Matt, Nick, Vicar Simon) as we want to ensure everyone has the opportunity to have their say and share their feelings.

BUILDINGS UPDATE



There has been little rain in recent weeks, but after the last rain showers we have noticed an issue around one of the north side clerestory windows of wet patches on the wall. We are going to investigate this further, hopefully with some help with someone with a drone so we can see what is going on directly above the window on the roof!

We continue to monitor the plaster work in some parts and you may have noticed a couple of pews roped off. This is due to damaged plaster that has dried out and gone powdery falling. We are looking at what remedial work we can do to remedy this. Please bear with us.

We are still awaiting Bailey Steeplejacks to come along with their big ladders to replace some of the upper level lightbulbs for us.

Electrical testing has been completed and there is some remedial work to be completed which is in hand with the contractors.

We need to look into doing some work on the Louvres of the south side of the church as these have become incredibly dislodged and will almost certainly be letting rain water in. We are going to see what funding is available to remedy this.

caddy spoon, a pickle fork and a small fork (what that ones for we haven't a clue) at a


small antique shop,

As a child I didn't think much of Laurel and Hardy, but as an adult I can appreciate their timing and brilliance.



GIVING TO ST PAULS

There will be a contactless card reader at the back of church to use for your offertory on the way in or out. As well as debit & credit cards, you can use your phone with Google Pay, Apple Pay or other contactless payment apps. You can put your card into the reader and use your PIN if you prefer that to contactless.



Also, there will be QR codes in your pew for you to scan with your phone's camera and key in your card details to make your offering.

Don't worry if you are not into technology and the internet. We are still delighted to accept cash or whatever else suits you best to support God's work at St Paul's!

All these facilities will let you Gift Aid your donation, if you wish, allowing us to claim an extra 25% back from HMRC at no cost to you.

SEASON OF CREATION



HOPE NORTH EAST an Eco Festival of events in Macclesfield 1st September - 4th October 2025



The churches of HOPE in North East Cheshire inviteyou to join in this period of reflection and action to cherish and protect our environment.

The International Season of Creation has been celebrated by churches in Macclesfield for 10 years and is open to all local people.

In 2025, the call from the religious leaders around the world is for everyone to "create peace with creation". The hope is that Creation will find peace when justice is restored. There is still hope and the expectation for a peaceful Earth. To hope in a biblical context does not mean to stand still and be quiet, but instead to act, pray, change and reconcile with Creation and the Creator in unity, repentance and solidarity.

Action for peace can include advocacy, sustainability projects, cleaning campaigns or education to show that caring for Creation is central to our faith and how we live our lives.
