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The Rector writes ...



The **Feast of the Holy Cross**, sometimes known as the Feast of the Exaltation of the Holy Cross, is the day when Christians celebrate the cross. Whereas Good Friday is dedicated to the passion of Christ and his crucifixion, Holy Cross Day is an opportunity for us celebrate the Cross itself, as the sign of salvation.

The feast dates back to the early days of the Church. On 13 September 335, a great church build by the Emperor Constantine was consecrated in Jerusalem.

This church of the Holy Sepulchre in Jerusalem survives in a later construction, as the church build by Constantine was destroyed 1009, rebuilt forty years later and modified over the centuries. It is a place of great significance for Christians. It has been an important pilgrimage site for Christians since the fourth century. According to ancient traditions, the church

contains both the site where Jesus was crucified at Calvary, or Golgotha, and the location of the empty tomb.

The day after the church's consecration, a relic of the cross on which Jesus was crucified was shown to Christian people for the first time for veneration.

Holy Cross Day is kept each year on 14 September, which this year coincides with a Sunday.

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The cross is depicted in a miriad of different shapes and representations, from bare wood through to ornate designs of precious metal and jewels. Some are empty. Some carry the depiction of Jesus being crucified. The cross in today's picture is from El Salvador in central America, a depiction of the Nativity in the shape of a cross, which has been displayed on the walls of our different homes over the years.

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The work on the exterior wall at the **east end of the church** is almost completed. The perished mortar has been removed, and the wall has been re-pointed with lime mortar. Once the stone has been cleaned on Monday, a water repellent spray will be applied to protect the building and the downpipe will be reconnected.

Once the wall has dried, perhaps next spring, we will deal with the damage to the internal plaster around the organ and on the east wall of the chancel.

Scaffolding has been erected on the **path from the car park** to the church, in preparation for the work on the roof and tower. Whilst the path is still open, and safe to use, please take care as you walk through the scaffolding.
