New Starts

September always feels like a threshold month, doesn't it? Even if our schooldays are long behind us, there's something about the smell of new exercise books, the sight of fresh uniforms, and the return of routine after summer that gives the air a sense of beginning again. Schools, colleges, and universities fling wide their doors, and thousands of young people find themselves facing both the excitement and the nerves of a new start.

The Bible is full of "new starts". From the very first pages of Genesis, we hear of a God who speaks creation into being and calls it good. Later, when Israel wandered and stumbled, God did not abandon them but renewed covenant after covenant, promising to make all things new. The prophet Isaiah gives us that glorious word: "See, I am doing a new thing! Now it springs up; do you not perceive it?" (Isaiah 43.19).

And at the heart of our faith is the most astonishing new beginning of all – the resurrection of Jesus. Out of despair came hope; out of the tomb came life; out of endings came a new creation. As Paul writes to the Corinthians: "If anyone is in Christ, there is a new creation: the old has gone, the new is here!" (2 Corinthians 5.17).



So September, with its timetables and sharpened pencils, offers us a reminder that God is always the God of fresh starts. That doesn't mean it's easy. New beginnings often bring uncertainty. The first day at school, the first lecture at university, or even the first meeting in a new workplace can make us feel rather small. Yet scripture reassures us: we are never alone. Jesus promised, "I am with you always, to the end of the age."

Perhaps this September is a new beginning for you – not necessarily in a classroom, but maybe in the shape of a new challenge, a shift in circumstances, or simply a renewed desire to walk more closely with God. Whatever lies ahead, we can step into it, trusting that the God who raised Jesus from the dead is also at work in us, breathing life into old bones, making paths through the wilderness, and offering new mercies every morning.

So let's pray for all those starting school, college, or university this month – and let's also remember that each day, for each of us, can be a holy new start with God.

⇒ Light bulbs! If the average household replaced all of their bulbs with LEDs, it would cost about £100 and save about £35 a year on bills.

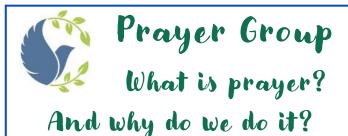

- Use natural light when you can to save energy. Sit by the window. Decorate your hone in light colours to maximise natural light.
- ⇒ Turn your lights off when you're not using them. If you switch a light off for just a few seconds, you will save more energy than it takes for the light to start up again, regardless of the type of light.

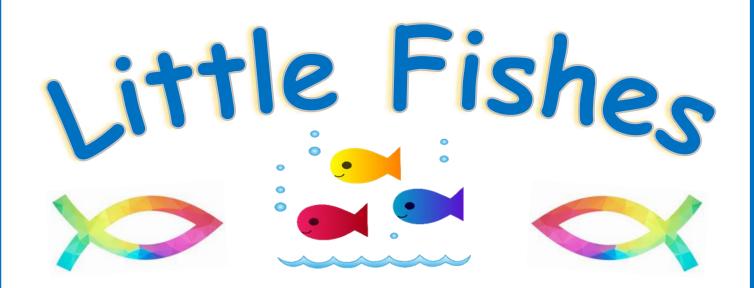

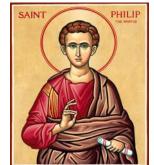

The Apostle Philip was one of Christ's first disciples, called soon after his Master's baptism in the Jordan. The fourth Gospel gives the following detail: "the next day Jesus was about to leave for Galilee, and He found Philip. And Jesus said to him: Follow Me. Now Philip was from Bethsaida, the town of Andrew and Peter. Philip found Nathanael and said to him: We have found Him of whom Moses in the Law and the Prophets wrote, Jesus the Son of Joseph of Nazareth. And Nathanael said to him:

Can anything good come out of Nazareth? Philip said to him: Come and See" (John 1: 43ff)





A recently released report "The State of Us: Community strength and cohesion in the UK" explores why people are feeling more "divided, disconnected and under pressure". This describes how things still feel a bit fragile after recent racist protests and unrest in many parts of the UK – attributed mainly to the challenges of making ends meet alongside shortages of public services. Immigration and asylum are described as being used as "political footballs".

The "State of Us" report describes how communities are quietly holding things together ... through everyday acts of care, connection and welcome; and actively raising awareness of issues facing migrants. One such organization is LASSN.

LASSN describes its vision to be "for asylum seekers and refugees to be safe, respected, supported and empowered to rebuild their lives free of persecution". There are several strands of work and projects that address the needs of refugees, asylum seekers and other migrants at risk of harm or exploitation. These include projects around 'Housing and Hosting' (providing safe places to sleep), 'Welcome and Connect' (matching refugees with volunteers to help them access support, education and leisure opportunities), and 'English at Home' (providing one to one lessons for refugees who cannot access mainstream classes, enhancing independence and confidence).

And what do we do within LASSN?.... Deborah is a trustee, and the organization safeguarding lead. Tim and Ann are involved in housing projects. Ann also





volunteers within one of the houses, with activities ranging from befriending and advocacy through to practical support. We value not only the work that LASSN undertakes, but also the opportunity we have to walk alongside the LASSN team and those refugees in need.

There are many opportunities to get involved in a number of areas of need. Full training and support are given. Please feel free to talk to any one of us if you also would like to consider getting involved; there are a range of options depending on your availability and what you would feel comfortable with (https://lassn.org.uk/volunteers/).

Quite honestly, it is an absolute privilege to be part of the LASSN organization.

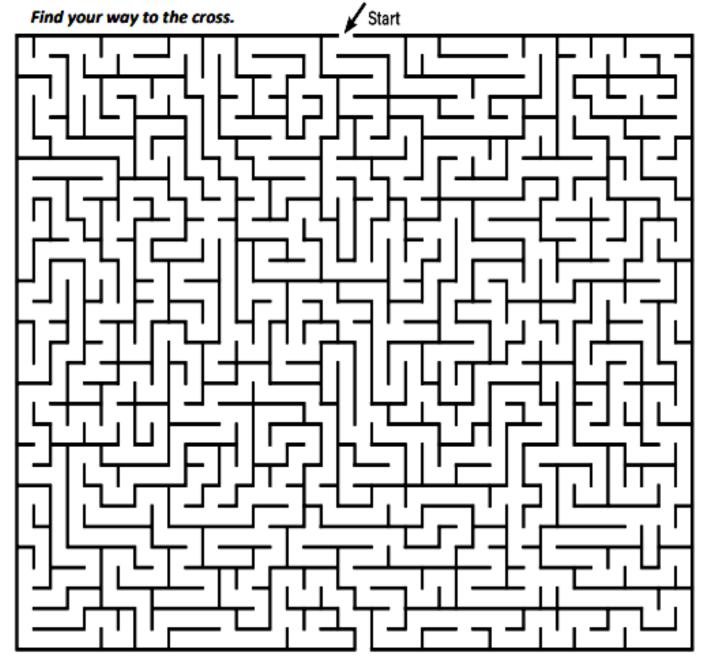
MEMORY VERSE:
