Meditation

Lift up your hearts – we lift them up to the Lord.

The story about the unknown woman with a chronic stoop, whom Jesus healed in a synagogue on the Sabbath Day, is told only in Luke's gospel. Its dramatic character seems to occur in a situation where men and women sat separately to worship, and where Rabbis never addressed or touched a woman who was not their own wife. It is one of a sequence of stories in every Gospel in which Jesus' healing on the Sabbath posed a real challenge to his religious critics, as well as asserting his authority to act in this way on behalf of God.

When I hear this moving story it brings to mind several people who I gradually learnt were weighed down by events they could not control. And I expect that hearing this today may trigger similar memories for you of yourself or of others. Sometimes people bear woes, be they other people in their family, or situations, or pain of physical, spiritual or mental dimensions. Sometimes people are able to hold their head high for a while, but at other times they can be literally bent over by the burdens they carry, or feel they cannot shoulder the burden any longer, so cease to go out and interrelate with others. Sometimes, encountering situations like this can leave a feeling of deep frustration, sadness, helplessness or regret. When friends ask me why I attach such importance to pastoral ministry in parishes, it is because I am sure that no family or individual should feel unsupported and uncared for. We try to be here to help families and individuals in the tight corners of life that come to us all. Around the kitchen table of a home, like another altar, people pour out their hearts, and we listen, encourage and show an interest in their lives. Lift up your hearts. All Christians are called to share in this pastoral ministry by being alert to the needs of others in a kind and non-judgemental way. Indeed, every Christian is in the midst of a unique web of relationships. The particular vocation of Anglican Christianity is to offer this help and support to anyone in the community, whether they come to church or not.

That is why the parish system needs to be maintained and valued. A Gospel story like this one sets us all a fine example.

In many of the miracles of Jesus, such as this one, what happened outwardly shines light on what is needed inwardly. He went across to her as she lurked in the shadows; he spoke with her and listened to her; he embraced her and raised her up; he liberated her from a crushing burden that had distorted her life for eighteen hard and wearisome years. She lived in a religious society that may have taught that such illness was a punishment from God for sins committed by her, or perhaps by her parents. Part of the mission of Jesus was to break this tyranny of opinion, hence the sharp reactions from his religious critics, as well as the joy of some of his hearers.

Jesus came to liberate people from their inner burdens – of fear and guilt and sin, of trauma and hurt; at his cross we find our burdens are rolled away. This is why in every service we confess our sins and seek absolution. By so doing we express our loving and penitent solidarity with those around us who are in a similar plight before God, from whom no secrets need to be hidden. No one needs to be trapped in their unhappiness.

This woman was bowed down and unable to look up. This may symbolise the plight of every fallen human, unable to look in the direction of God, and fixated on the things of this created world as ends in themselves. Every human society, from the poorest to the richest, is prone to this. In our own society, the greatest enemy of Christianity may be distraction. The aim of a consumer society is always to keep people focussed on the next purchase, the latest fashion. A good symbol of this is the mobile phone which some people give their inordinate attention. More tragically, people can easily become bowed down by obsessions promoted by consumerism; the next car, gadget, fashion; or more destructively the compulsion of addiction to drink, drugs, pornography, or the inordinate love of wealth or status. Finally, many people are simply oppressed, bowed down by poverty, power abuse in family, work, or relationships. Sometimes whole countries seem to succumb to such an oppressive legacy from which they cannot escape, inflicting violence on their neighbours in a vicious cycle that can last for centuries.

Jesus said "I have come that they may have life – life in all its abundance." This is why we stand to hear the Gospel in Church and at the communion prayer we say, "Lift up your hearts – we lift them up to the Lord. Let us give thanks to the Lord our God. It is right to give thanks and praise." These are some of the earliest Christian prayers and have always prefaced the consecrating prayer. This is because we a bidden to come into the presence of God as those who have been liberated from the downward bias of sin, no

more cowering in the bushes, hiding from God and clutching fig-leaves! For 'the Lord is the Spirit: and where the Spirit of the Lord is, there is liberty: so, we all with unveiled faces, reflecting as a mirror the glory of the Lord, are being transformed into the same image from glory to glory, by the Spirit of the Lord.' (2 Cor 3 v17-18)

Returning to the Gospel story once again, we see that there were two other people who were stooped down; one actually; the other metaphorically. The ruler of the synagogue responded in a frustrated and institutionalised manner, protesting that such disturbance should not occur in divine worship. Jesus exposed the folly of his tunnel-vision and the innate hypocrisy and cruelty in terms that were clearly not forgotten by those who witnessed it. Indeed, it is possible that this was actually a moment of liberation for some of them, perhaps even for the ruler of the synagogue himself. St Paul certainly testified to the crushing nature of obligation to the Law of God for so many at that time and the barrenness of being obsessed with its literal interpretation.

The other person who stooped down was, of course, Jesus himself, bending over to hear the whispered story of this unhappy women, who was confined to the margins of society. "Proud people can only be saved by a humble God", and the humility of Jesus was his hidden strength because it sprang from God himself. This is one of the great themes of Luke's Gospel, culminating in Jesus staggering and bowed down by his own cross, and yet able to pray for his tormentors who were lost in their own darkness, blindness and cruelty.

We too are called to stoop down willingly in humility in order to come alongside others in a kind and non-patronizing way. We are called to stoop as we receive the Holy Communion, saying "Lord, I am not worthy to receive you, but only say the word and your servant shall be healed." We are called to stoop in our hearts as we contemplate the humility and love of God in the tiny baby of Bethlehem, born in a cave or an underground outhouse. We are called to stoop in wonder as we peer into the Empty Tomb, and then, like the women, to fall at the feet of our Lord in loving worship, and to hear him say to us also, "Peace be with you" "Lift up your hearts."

Prayers

In the power of the Spirit and in union with Christ, let us pray to the Father. Lord of glory, it is good to know you are with us. In peace we make our prayer to you. In trust we confirm our faith in you. Help us to set our faces steadfastly to where you would have us go.

Lord of glory, look with favour on your Church, proclaiming your beloved Son to the world and listening to the promptings of his Spirit. May she be renewed in holiness that she may reflect your glory.

Lord of glory, look with favour on the nations of the world, scarred by hatred, strife, war, plague, and injustice. May they be healed by the touch of your hand.

Lord of glory, look with favour on those in need or distress, suffering as your Son suffered and waiting for the salvation you promise. May the daybreak and Christ the Morning Star bring them the light of his presence.

Lord of glory, it is good if we suffer with you so that we shall be glorified with you. According to your promise bring all Christ's brothers and sisters to see him with their own eyes in majesty and to be changed into his likeness from glory to glory.

To him be praise, dominion and worship now and for all eternity. Amen. Christ Jesus, the splendour of the Father and the image of his being, draw us to himself that we may share in his light and share his glory; and may the blessing of God almighty, the Father, the Son and the Holy Spirit be among us and remain with us always. Amen.

Gospel of Luke 13 v10-17

Now Jesus was teaching in one of the synagogues on the sabbath. And just then there appeared a woman with a spirit that had crippled her for eighteen years. She was bent over and was quite unable to stand up straight. When Jesus saw her, he called her over and said, 'Woman, you are set free from your ailment.' When he laid his hands on her, immediately she stood up straight and began praising God. But the leader of the synagogue, indignant because Jesus had cured on the sabbath, kept saying to the crowd, 'There are six days on which work ought to be done; come on those days and be cured, and not on the sabbath day.' But the Lord answered him and said, 'You hypocrites! Does not each of you on the sabbath untie his ox or his donkey from the manger, and lead it away to give it water? And ought not this woman, a daughter of Abraham whom Satan bound for eighteen long years, be set free from this bondage on the sabbath day?' When he said this, all his opponents were put to shame; and the entire crowd was rejoicing at all the wonderful things that he was doing.
