A Warm Welcome for Bishop David

Nigh on one hundred people from the parishes across Kerrier Deanery attended the Celtic service at Mawgan Church on Sunday 7th September to welcome the new Bishop of Truro to Kerrier.

It proved to be a warm, social occasion giving rise to an opportunity for friends, who don't often meet, to catch up and enjoy the "bring and share" high tea that was provided prior to the service.

Bishop David, had spent a very full day visiting the Churches in the Deanery with the Rural Dean, the Rev'd Heidi Huntley, and had conducted a service at Sithney in the morning. He remarked on the importance of meeting together over the conviviality of a meal and shared a memory from childhood spent in Zimbabwe as the son of a church leader there, when goat would be served; not to everyone's taste in Cornwall, he surmised.

The Bishop patently enjoys meeting people and used every available moment to speak with as many as possible and commented on the remarkable and enriching day he had spent on the Lizard and beyond. An endorsement of his claim that:


"I am, at heart, a parish priest. I want to continue working for the flourishing of local churches. The local church is vital to a local community."

Before leaving, Bishop David blessed the bells which had just been repaired and the team of ringers from Helston and Wendron, apologising and laughing at himself for almost forgetting. He then related a snippet from his past. How could he forget! He had also been a keen campanologist before becoming the parish priest at Dore near the Peak District, from whence his two curates and himself had subsequently become bishops. Surely a poem in there somewhere:

The Gospel of Matthew for 'Year A': the message, the context, the theology

From Advent, in a few weeks' time, the lectionary will begin to choose the Sunday Gospel reading predominantly from the Gospel of Matthew. Revd Dr Robert Evans is leading a session on this on Tuesday 21st October, Epiphany House in Truro, 10.30am finishing with lunch at 1pm, and you are welcome to come. It is free: you just need to register by sending an email to Melanie Pomery melanie.pomery@truro.anglican.org.

This session is an opportunity to look at the Gospel of Matthew as whole – its structure, its themes, and its distinctive portrayal of Jesus. There will be some attention to the historical circumstances of its first readers (the communities it was written for), in order to think about how we move from the message then to the message for us now.

CRYING THE NECK

On the glorious evening of Wednesday 3rd. September the villagers of Germoe gathered in fields to observe and celebrate the tradition of "Crying the Neck". The congregation then moved to St Germoe Church to complete the service before dreamy pasties were served in the Church Hall.

Our own "Reader", Kim presided in English along with Sarah Tresidder contributing in Cornish. Mike Jacka cut the last ears of corn before making his declarations to the four points of the compass, with responses in English and Cornish from the congregation. It was truly moving. "Crying the Neck" is an ancient celebration of harvest and thanks-giving, and a blessing on future harvests. Held in late August/early September, it was, in the past, commonly celebrated throughout Devon and Cornwall; less frequently and not so wide-spread, now. We do not just perpetuate an archaic tradition, rather fully acknowledge how essential "Harvest" will always remain, our connection with the Land and our place in Creation. The "Neck" will remain suspended in St Germoe Church throughout the year's cycle.

Enormous thanks go to Mike, Kim and Sarah and most importantly Gwynneth for her planning and catering and for perpetuating this noble and lovely tradition.





HARVEST AT GERMOE

This is a rural parish and having celebrated "Crying the Neck" last month we marked "Harvest" in two beautiful ceremonies in September. In the beautiful Church Hall a harvest supper was a sell-out and a sumptuous meal was served. Enormous thanks were expressed to the devoted band of helpers who prepared the hall, ran the raffle and cooked and served the meal. The village and church would be so much poorer in spirit and community without their love and devotions.

Apart from the roistering a whopping £340+ was raised and donations of a more material nature were additionally made to support the Women's Refuge and the local Foodbank.

This was the focus two days later when Harvest Festival was celebrated in a magnificently decorated St Germoe Church. The floral displays and fresh produce could not have been more welcoming. Revd. Len presided over a traditional service of Sunday Eucharist and favourite "Harvest" hymns. Our links with and dependence upon the land were thus established for another year.

The Importance of Prayer in the Gospel of Luke

We are now heading towards winter with Autumn, and Remembrance fast approaching. We, as members of Christ's church here in Kerrier, need to get to the backbone of our Christian journey by concentrating on our prayer life. This then naturally follows into praise and don't we all need our hearts and minds uplifting. My new friend AI came up with the following bullet points from our gospel of Luke for this year.

Luke's Gospel highlights Jesus as a model of prayer, frequently depicting him withdrawing to pray at key moments in his ministry.

Major events in Jesus' life in Luke—such as his baptism, the transfiguration, and his time in Gethsemane—are all marked by prayer.

The Gospel uniquely records several parables on prayer, including the Parable of the Persistent Widow (Luke 18:1-8) and the Parable of the Pharisee and the Tax Collector (Luke 18:9-14), emphasizing persistence, humility, and sincerity in prayer.

Luke stresses the necessity and regularity of prayer, with Jesus instructing disciples to pray always and not give up.

Jesus teaches the Lord's Prayer (Luke 11:1-4), providing a model for his followers and highlighting the intimacy of addressing God as Father.

Through prayer, believers are shown to seek guidance, strength, forgiveness, and alignment with God's will.

Prayer in Luke is depicted as a source of power, comfort, and transformation for both Jesus and his followers.

The Gospel encourages a community of prayer, as seen when disciples gather to pray after Jesus' ascension, laying the foundation for the early church.

Jesus, pour out your Holy Spirit on your Church here in Kerrier. We ask we might come close to you in prayer, bringing all our hearts to your heavenly throne. Lift us with your joy and praise, that others may be drawn to you, the source and fount of all true love. We ask that our churches may look out to the needs of those outside of the walls of the church. Strengthen us O Lord, to work for God's Kingdom here on Earth and to glorify Him in all we do.
