A LETTER FOR NOVEMBER 2025

Dear Friends,

Remember, remember the fifth of November...

We are all busy remembering at the moment. There's Bonfire Night with fireworks (I love them, I know not everyone does!). There's All Souls Day on 2nd November, when we remember our loved ones who have died and give thanks for their lives. And then there's Remembrance Sunday, instituted after the First World War to remember the millions who served in the Armed Forces and died. We've been remembering them ever since, as well as those killed in more recent conflicts and wars. Since the First World War, there were no operational deaths of members of UK armed forces in 1968, 2016 (and 2024 and 2025 according to provisional data). People serving in the Army, Royal Navy and Royal Air Force, however, continue to face the possibility of death in action.

As civilians, living within Northumberland, we find ourselves unlikely to die as a result of military aggression, and I thank God for that. But this is not the reality of millions of people around the world – in Gaza, Israel, Ukraine, Russia and so many more places. When conflicts drop out of the news cycle, it can be hard to remember so many people we don't know, in distant places. We forget. We do the opposite of remembering.

War is a form of dismembering. We speak of people and places being "blown apart". Communities are broken, and lives are wrecked. But the opposite of dismember is re-member. Remember, put back together, heal. We might think that here in Northumberland there's no need to re-member.

However, we are human. We have different experiences and beliefs and politics. We are not immune to the polarisation of society. We are capable of falling out over flags, of worrying about increases in demand for schools and doctors and parking, and of falling out about politics, just like people anywhere. We each choose whether to provoke and pick quarrels, and whether to respond to people with harshness or compassion. We choose every day, in every tiny difference and potential argument.

My prayer for us all is that we choose kindness, compassion and love, that we always choose to remember, and re-member.

REDESDALE SOCIETY NEWS

The Redesdale Society's meeting on 10th October attracted a good attendance of members and guests to hear a talk by Andrew Agate entitled "Fusing metal detecting and archaeology: Northumberland's Portable Antiquities Scheme (PAS)".

Andrew is a well-travelled archaeologist and academic who, since 2011, has been the Liaison Officer for the Northumberland Portable Antiquities Scheme (PAS) based at the Hancock Museum Newcastle. He firstly took us through the foundation of the PAS and its functions. In the later part of his talk, he described in detail several artefacts the PAS



hater part of his efacts the PAS has logged. He brought

He brought along some pieces and we were also privileged to have an exhibition of finds in the local area, over the last ten years or so, by Alan Gray, a keen detectorist from West Woodburn. These included coins, tools and decorative pieces, some of which Andrew regarded as being of national significance.

The foundation in 1997 of the PAS in England and Wales arose from Treasure Act of 1996 which replaced the previous Treasure Trove regulations. One major reason for this change was the rapidly increasing popularity of metal detecting in the 1980s/1990s. This was leading to tension between archaeologists and detectorists with one

group of the former wanting a ban on metal detecting. Amongst its other functions, the PAS is something of a mediator in these relations now.

Moving on to more local matters, from 1997 the PAS progressively set up county groups throughout the country, including Northumberland, where the first Liaison Officer was appointed in 2004. The PAS nationally now has approx. 1.8 million objects logged in detail on its database -a very useful resource for researchers. In Northumberland alone 900 finds a year are being logged. The regulations on how and when detectorists need to report their finds are very clear, but unfortunately nationally only about 10% of the estimated total of 40,000 detectorists do so. Others are putting themselves at risk of contravening the law.

Andrew then illustrated several important finds made in Redesdale and neighbouring areas, which are rich in historical sites. His examples were primarily from Bronze Age, Iron Age and Saxon periods. The amount of information logged by the PAS is impressive and it is particularly interesting to see how this can often be used to link in with known historical events, battles, etc. It can also, in some cases, suggest where future archaeological digs may be productive.

Andrew, through his very informative and entertaining presentation, had an enthralled audience and everyone was very grateful to him and to Alan for introducing us to many very interesting and, in some cases, beautiful objects.

The next meeting of the Redesdale Society will be on Friday 7 November at 7.30pm in Otterburn Memorial Hall. David Petts will take us back to Lindisfarne in a talk entitled "Recent work on the early mediaeval monastery of Lindisfarne." As always, visitors are very welcome.

GOD'S WORLD - OUR WORLD

Since COP30 (the UN's climate change conference) is taking place this November in Brazil, here is a brief guide to help you make sense of news reports and bring this important issue into your prayers.

Climate change is already causing severe devastation globally and, as temperatures continue to rise, the risks are increasing too. In the 2015 Paris Agreement, governments committed to limit the rise in the global average temperature to 'well below' 2°C above pre-industrial levels, ideally 1.5°C. Progress towards these goals is way off track and we are perilously close to breaching the 1.5°C goal. A key task facing all world governments ahead of the conference is to submit new national climate plans, known as 'Nationally Determined Contributions' or 'NDCs'. You may hear these mentioned on the news this month. These generally include a numerical target for how much a country should have reduced its emissions by a certain year (2030 or 2035). The idea

is that, when put together, the world's NDCs should collectively be ambitious enough to keep warming in line with the goals of the Paris Agreement. Sadly, NDCs submitted in the run-up to COP30 are unlikely to close this gap and experts warn that current proposals would still result in 2.4° C warming by 2100 — which would produce a devastating result for our planet.

So COP30 will centre around responding to this unhappy state of affairs by trying to set out a pathway for accelerating climate action in the years ahead. Watch out for other discussions centring around money, particularly climate financing mechanisms for vulnerable nations and technology transfer agreements between countries.

Do join the climate action group in praying for this critical conference with this prayer: "Loving Creator, we come before You with hearts full of concern for our world. As leaders, activists, and communities gather for COP30, we ask for Your wisdom to guide their decisions. May they act with courage and compassion, prioritising justice for those most affected by the climate crisis - those who have contributed the least but suffer the most. Inspire bold commitments to protect our common home and to care for creation as You intended. We pray for unity among nations, for innovative solutions, and for the strength to follow through on promises made. Help us all to play our part, no matter how small, in restoring balance to the earth. Amen."

A TRIP TO GALASHIELS AND MELROSE

Thank you to everyone who participated in our trip to Melrose and Galashiels on 7th October. We had a record number of people on the coach - 36 people were aboard! It was a lovely atmosphere as people joined with old friends, and made new ones. Folks came from near and far - Wark, Kielder, Falstone, Stannersburn, Tarset, Otterburn, Elsdon and Bellingham. Whilst many people had been on several, if not all of our coach trips, some were debutantes!

We were all really looking forward to seeing the Great Scottish Tapestry in Galashiels and in did not disappoint. En route, we stopped in lovely Melrose and enjoyed visiting the great independent shops and cafes, with some brave folks enjoying ice cream!

We arrived in Galashiels bang on time, thanks to our expert driver, Steve. Most of us headed straight for the Great Scottish Tapestry. It was amazing - consisting of over 180 large panels of Tapestries telling the story of the history of Scotland from 3000BC to the current day. The detail, textures and colours of the Tapestries were fabulous. Each Tapestry panel had a narrative of the significance of the story it depicted- so there was a lot to take in. We all had our favourite panels. Some of the panels that particularly struck me, because of their significance were: "Cuthbert at Melrose and the Lindisfarne Gospels", and "The making of the King James Bible 1611". Other panels were striking because of their use of colour and detail, one of these was the history of "Scots in

India" - the colours and the detail on the turban were superb; Also the panel depicting the hero "Eric Liddell in the 1924 Olympics" captured his running style perfectly, and importantly his integrity as "Champion of Conviction". Of course, Liddell famously refused to run in the heats of his favoured event, as they were held on the Sabbath. Another panel depicted the Suffragette movement with their recognisable purple and green colouring.

It was thirsty and demanding work taking in all the panels and information(!!) but thankfully, there was a lovely little cafe in the stunning building in which the Tapestry is housed. We all had a lovely day, and one person summed it up: "I can't remember when I enjoyed a day as much...absolute perfection from the word go". Thank you everyone who made it so!

Also a big thanks to the funding we received from the Newcastle Diocese "Partners in Community Action" (PICA) Fund, who enable us to make these trips happen - the purpose of which is to overcome social isolation in rural Northumberland. We plan to run our next trip in Spring 2026. Meanwhile we look forward to welcoming everyone to our Falstone coffee mornings, full details can be found in the 'Noticeboard' section earlier in this magazine.

NEWS FROM BELLINGHAM DEANERY

On Saturday 11th October we had a meeting at Simonburn village hall for all Parochial Church Council (PCC) members, church wardens, readers, lay leaders etc to discuss deanery development, where we go from here and what can we do better etc. During the course of this meeting, I was asked "Do we really work together as a deanery, and what do we do?". I had thought that everyone already knew (and I know that many of us do know) but it struck me that there may be many people who aren't directly involved and who therefore don't know. With that in mind, therefore, I thought it might be an idea to do a brief summary of just some of the things we do. We actually have nine 'working' groups, but I have only mentioned four of the busiest groups below.

Communications Group: meetings are held at Elsdon, Bellingham, Byrness and

Humshaugh. Every parish is represented in the group, where we talk about our sister publications: the broadsheet for the South of the deanery and the Meeting of the Waters for the northern section of our deanery. We have done a great deal of work to enable us to comply with GDPR (General Data Protection Regulations), purchasing a computer program called 'I know Church' which is used for safe internet communication throughout the Deanery (e.g. the weekly notices about church services etc.) and we have undergone training sessions to enable us to use the program effectively. We also discuss 'A Church near you', which is a nationwide program listing all churches in C of E and which allows both visitors and locals to access information about services, as well as other information.

Pastoral Group: we visit people who need a visit and in conjunction with Caroline Clarke from the Church and Community Partnership (CCP), we have done training in mental health awareness, suicide awareness, suicide prevention, First Aid and Dementia Awareness training - among others. We spend one day per month at Hexham mart as part of our mental health work, to advise any farmers on available help. Many of our village halls are also now dementia friendly, and this work is on-going.

Schools Group: many, many people have been involved in the work we have done. 2025 has been quiet, giving us a chance to recover from the intensive work over the last few years. Some members of the group have been preparing a book for publication, regarding the work centred around Simonburn. We aim to be up and running again in 2026 with again an Easter themed event, which is what the schools have been asking for. We will again be asking for volunteers nearer the time. Messy church is also done with many of the schools.

The Community Connections Group: involves people who run coffee mornings, lunches and other events involving our communities.

I feel quite sure that anyone wanting to be involved in any of the above groups will be made very welcome.

NEWS FROM FALSTONE

Many people love autumn for its changing scenery, cosy atmosphere and the crisp weather which brings vibrant leaf colours, comfortable temperatures, and the return of warm drinks and comforting foods. I like it for the warmth of wearing opaque tights, knee length boots and woolly jumpers! The season is also, however, a time for reflection and slowing down, with the longer nights and the shedding of leaves inspiring a sense of peace and calm.

St Peter's held its Family Harvest Service on Sunday the 5th of October. This was certainly not calm, but we wouldn't have it any other way. It was indeed a bright and sunny autumn day despite *Storm Amy* doing her damage the day before. NEWS FROM THORNEYBURN

As I write this, we have had some lovely autumn days with mild calm weather, which has led to a magnificent display of trees, fruits and berries. Evidently it is a "mast year", which is a period when trees and shrubs produce an unusually large crop of fruits, nuts, and seeds (called "mast"). This abundance is actually an evolutionary strategy for trees to ensure some of their offspring survive by overwhelming seed predators. These years often occur every 3-5 years, and are hugely beneficial for the wildlife that depends on these food sources. It is great to see this wonder of creation, and I have enjoyed getting out to be among it, walking and collecting apples from the orchard. By the end of October, we will have had our Harvest Festival and Soup Swap, where we can thank God for His abundance.

During November (weather permitting), we will be repairing our north chancel window (next to the organ) so there will be workmen around and scaffolding up, but this shouldn't present any problems for visiting the church or attending services.

Some good news is we have finally got the date confirmed for our Soup and Pud Social, which will take place on Thurs 13th November, from 12-2pm, at Tarset Village Hall. As always, there will be delicious soups and mouthwatering puddings for you all to enjoy, as well as a raffle. Do come along and enjoy this lovely social event if you can.
