

From the Vicarage . . .

Dear friends

We're now well into the new school year, and beginning our run of Harvest Festivals. This season is known as 'Creationtide' in the church calendar, but I do sometimes

known as 'Creationtide' in the church calendar, but I do sometimes wonder if these things are more to remind those living in cities – surrounded by it we can't help but recognise God's creation all year round!

On the 19th October Prison Sunday is being marked at Lamerton, when we have our local Prison Chaplain preaching. Then Sunday 26th is Bible Sunday. If you have any questions regarding the Bible, let me know. I'm preaching at all three services and am always happy for requests as to what you might want addressed—I can't make any promises to include them, but I do enjoy a challenge! All queries will be treated in confidence, of course.

Towards the end of October and through November we move towards the 'dusk' of the church year. All Souls and All Saints tide, followed closely by Remembrance, are times for reflection and a pause. On All Saints' Sunday at 11am we celebrate the Patronal Festival of Dunterton Church, and then in the evening at 6.30pm please do join us for a quiet service of Reflection, where we'll have the opportunity to light candles in prayer for loved ones as part of this special service. It will be a precious and sacred time.

Then we mark the start of the Advent season on Friday 28th November with the ever-popular Carols at Theale, with mulled wine and mince pies. Sunday 30th November is Advent Sunday, the first day of the new church year (Year A) when we'll have a United Benefice Service.

Our Advent Groups begin before the next edition of Parish News (see below) and on page 26 you'll see a few 'save the dates' for Christmas services. They aren't set in stone and there will be more—but put them in your calendars. Speaking of which, if anyone knows where I can get hold of a blow-up Christingle costume do let me know!

Finally, I want to say how blessed I feel being here among you all. Looking at things with the eyes of a newcomer, I am seeing so much of God in individuals and in the life of these parishes as a whole. Every single individual is treasured by God, and every single person reflects a different facet of God's being in the world. I know sometimes it is a plod, especially as the days darken, but please do be encouraged—God has promised blessing on our churches and communities. Keep praying with me for that.

UPDATE ON CORYTON CHURCH BELL TOWER

Work has finally started on the bell tower. The scaffolding is now fully installed. We had to change scaffolder and the new team have done a brilliant job surrounding the tower with multiple platforms for access to the top of the walls in readiness for repointing and hoisting the lead up to the roof.



The top 2 metres of the walls and the pinnacles are in need of repair so that work is being done now, before work starts on the new lead roof. Work has also started to clean up the bell chamber where a couple of jackdaws have made their home, and repairs will be made to the louvered windows so they don't come back! Again, many thanks for all who sent donations without which this would not be happening. We have raised over £12,000!

Harvest Festival this year is on Sunday 12th October at the usual time of 6.30pm. This has always been a popular service with substantial refreshments afterwards. Do come and join us.



Remembrance Sunday. This year Coryton is hosting Marystowe Parish at 10.45am on Sunday 9th November. Last year at Marystowe we had a wonderful display of information and memorabilia related to local people who served in various conflicts.


When I Am Afraid

The Grandfather's Table

A frail old man went to live with his son, daughter-in-law, and fouryear old grandson. The old man's hands trembled, his eyesight was blurred, and his step faltered. The family ate together at the table, but the elderly grandfather's shaky hands and failing sight made eating difficult. Peas rolled off his fork onto the floor. When he grasped the glass, milk spilled on the tablecloth.

The son and daughter-in-law became irritated with the mess. "We must do something about Grandfather," said the son. "I've had enough of his spilled milk, noisy eating, and food on the floor." Therefore, the husband and wife set a small table in the corner. There, Grandfather ate alone while the rest of the family enjoyed dinner. Since grandfather had broken a dish or two, his food was served in a wooden bowl. When the family glanced in Grandfather's direction, sometimes he had a tear in his eye as

he sat alone. Still, the only words the couple had for him were sharp admonitions when he dropped a fork or spilled food.

The four-year-old watched it all in silence. One evening before supper, the father noticed his son playing with wood scraps on the floor. He asked the child sweetly, "What are you making?" Just as sweetly, the boy responded, "Oh, I am making a little bowl for you and Mama to eat your food in when I grow up." The four-year-old smiled and went back to work. The words so struck the parents that

they were speechless. Then tears started to stream down cheeks. Though no word was spoken, both knew what must be done.

That evening the husband took Grandfather's hand and gently led him back to the family table. For the remainder of his days, he ate every meal with the family. And for some reason, neither husband nor wife seemed to care any longer when a fork was dropped, milk spilled or the tablecloth soiled

NATURE NOTES BY BLUEBELL

Round the corner comes Jack Fall, Dressed in yellow, dressed in brown, 'Goodbye, summer,' hear him call As he wanders through the town.


'Give her a kiss and wish her well, Give her a gold and silver chain. Tell her you love her,' saidJack Fall. 'And bring her back this way again.'

This autumn is rich in blackberries, apples, mushrooms and slugs, as the rain sweeps in. There have been a lot of butterflies, particularly white ones. The swifts and swallows, cuckoos and willow warblers are gone, but the winter migrants are coming to bring cheer



on their wings. The winter thrushes, the redwings and fieldfares come in large flocks from the harsh Arctic winters of Europe. Wild swans, Whooper and Bewick's, join our resident Mute Swans, and geese and waders come to our lakes and estuaries.

The Gulf Stream is the cause of our milder winters, but climate scientists tell us that ocean currents are shifting with melting ice from the North Pole. Global warming could actually make us colder. (Simon Barnes RSPB Magazine Autumn 2025). It could also affect fish migration as currents change.



Fish, especially salmon, have a brilliant sense of smell, or olfactory sense. This is how salmon find their way back to their natal river after years spent miles away at sea. Scottish salmon rivers are spring fed. The springs bubble up sometimes from hundreds of feet underground and each has a different chemical composition and different temperature reading. However dilute or polluted the scent of the different stream and its varied mineral content, salmon can pick out the scent of their home stream again. (The Salmon; Michael Wigan; William Collins, London 2013).

For a long time it was believed that birds cannot smell. But recent research has proved this to be a myth. Despite their highly developed visual and auditory systems, their elaborate plumage and complex vocalisations, birds can smell and have olfactory acuity as good as a rat's.

They can smell food, and danger, find a mate and know their

family by smell.

Pigeons find their way home by smell. Homing pigeons reared behind glass screens (with a view but no wind) had difficulty navigating home compared to those raised behind a palisade (no view but exposed to wind) who returned home easily. (Marc Gilles, Bielefeld University; BTO News Autumn 2025).


Be Alert for Asian hornets!

Asian or yellow-legged hornets (scientific name *Vespa velutina*) were accidentally introduced into France in around 2004. Now they have spread through much of Western Europe. They are serious predators of honey bees, and also attack bumblebees, solitary bees and other insects.

They defend their nests aggressively and will attack anyone who gets too close: **never approach a nest**. Since 2016, there have been sightings of the Asian hornet in the UK, and a few nests have been found.

Asian hornets are generally smaller (25-30 mm head to tail) than our native hornet, the European hornet (*Vespa crabro*), which is 30-35 mm head to tail (but can seem much bigger!). They are easy to distinguish because Asian hornets are mostly dark brown/black, with yellow 'socks' and an orange-yellow band near the tail. Native hornets look like very large wasps, with brown legs and bright yellow and black/brown markings. Native hornets fly both night and day, while Asian hornets fly only during the day.

COULD THIS BE YOU?


At the recent meeting of the Benefice Pastoral Care Team on the 24th June, it was agreed that we should run a locally based Anna Friends Training Course in October. With Rev. Andy leaving and Rev. Phill holding the fort with support from Tim Thompson and Richard Searight, there was a recognition that many of our older folk, who can longer physically attend our church services, should be supported as much as possible by our local lay people. Anna Friends work alongside Anna Chaplains (Annie Jefferies and Josie Whitfield) to offer varying degrees of spiritual support. This might be personal visits to people's home, telephone support or taking worship services in care homes.

All six of our churches have parishioners in their later years and when falls or illness make people housebound, we should have a flexible team who can visit these people at home. It would therefore be ideal to have one or two people from each church who might consider doing the Anna Friends course which is done over three training sessions of two hours each.

The course will cover:-

- what it means to be a good and focused listener
- the ageing process, grief and loss
- what is dementia and how can we meaningfully engage with individuals and their families
- how to select helpful Bible readings
- writing simple prayers
- offering people Holy Communion at home
