Rector's Ramblings

It seems crazy that we are already in November, the nights are drawing in and the heating being turned on is now open for debate. The 'C' word is being thrown about in my household...and yes, I have already had the 'don't you dare' conversation with my eldest as she tried to switch the car radio to one which only plays Christmas tunes as the family rush towards Christmas!

And yet, there is so much about this month where we need to take some time; to slow down and to pause to reflect. November, as I say to the children is the month to remember... we celebrate All Saint's Day on the 2nd during our Sunday morning services; giving thanks for all the saints known and unknown to us who lived their lives in an exemplary Christian way. And then later that evening we commemorate those who we have loved and lost, remembering our loved ones and all they brought into our lives through our service of All Soul's. This allows us the space to be still and quiet. To remember those dear to us and to aid in our own healing; holding those special memories and loved ones close again for a while as we remember.

Then of course, we follow these acts of remembrance with Remembrance Day; honouring all those who made the ultimate sacrifice for us through their acts of service during wars which cost them their lives.

It may feel that we enter November and the season of Remembrance, sombre, with our hearts heavy and this year more than ever, I do indeed feel that way with the conflicts and tragedies that persist across the world. Yet, as I sit here and think of all those I will remember at this time; the pain they would sit with as they look at the state of our world right now; I am reminded that it is through our remembering that we are shaped, and how we shape our future and the future we hand to our younger generations.

The love and encouragement of those we remember on All Souls has shaped the love, strength and determination we now live our everyday with. The stories shared with us as children from grandparents, aunts and uncles and for some of us stories from more recent conflicts also, is

why so many of us gather as community, united to honour those known and unknown to us on Remembrance Sunday.

As a child, one of my greatest delights was visiting my uncle and hearing his stories of bravery and kindness during his time as a POW. I remember the honour of holding a small trinket box hand-crafted and gifted to him for his 21st birthday with an engraved message from other POWs made from bottle tops and polished to shine like silver. A light; an encouragement; a gift of love in a time of darkness. A gift of hope and a reminder of a more peaceful and just future.

Today as I remember, I realise that the act in itself is a powerful thing. Not only does it bind us together either through the pain of loss or the encouragements of love and kindness, but it also reminds us that we are called to be people who live 'in remembrance', not for just one month in a year, but each day. It is through the act of remembering that we are reminded to live in such a way that we build better futures.

Remembrance is not just about the past; it's also about the present and the future. In these times of uncertainty and conflict, it is essential for us to remember so that we maintain hope. We hope for an end to violence and division, for the safe return of those who are far from home, and for the healing of wounds, both seen and unseen. We hope for a world where the lessons of the past guide us away from intolerance and hatred towards lasting peace, love and acceptance.

As people of faith, we know through the teachings of the bible that hope is not a passive act but an active one. In the book of the prophet Micah in the Old Testament we are told that the Lord God requires us to live justly, to love kindness and to walk humbly by His side and Jesus in his famous Sermon on the Mount tells us that we will be blessed as we bring peace. We are called to work towards peace, justice, and reconciliation in our own lives and within our communities. Our faith teaches us that, even in the face of despair, hope can be a powerful force for change. It can be the light in the darkest of times. So let us gather this month in Remembrance; to give thanks and to honour; but let us also carry and live in that remembrance through the following months until we gather again as bearers of hope in our parish and as individuals. Let us reach out to one another, especially those who may be struggling with the weight of current conflicts or the loss of someone

dear to them. Offer comfort, support, and a listening ear. In doing so, we can help kindle the light of hope in the darkest of times.

Together, as a parish community, we can be a beacon of light and a source of hope filled inspiration for a world so in need of peace.

Sarratt Neighbourhood Plan Your Future, Your Plan

On Thursday 6 November 2025, the Sarratt Neighbour Plan referendum takes place. The polling station will be Sarratt Village Hall.

A Neighbourhood Plan is a *planning* document. It sets out what things we, in the parish, would like to be considered as part of any planning application or call-for-sites consultation. The Neighbourhood Plan allows us to have different policies to the rest of Three Rivers, in order to address local needs and concerns in Sarratt. For example, to conserve the historic character of villages and hamlets, edge-of-settlement developments will not generally be supported, thus hopefully preventing urban sprawl into green fields.

The Parish Council started the process to make a Neighbourhood Plan for Sarratt in 2018, but it has taken seven years and five statutory consultations, navigating Covid-19 lock-downs preventing public meetings and the sad death of the Chair of the working group, John Carter, in 2023. We would like to thank all those who took part in the Public Consultations ensuring this plan represents local views.

The independent external examiner has now deemed that the Sarratt Neighbourhood Plan meets all legal requirements and Three Rivers District Council have issued a Decision Notice for it to go to a referendum.

If a majority of people vote 'Yes' in the referendum, then TRDC must adopt it. A large turnout gives the result more weight as the voice of the Parish.

The plan does not give us a right of veto, but if adopted it must by law be taken into account in planning decisions.

Thomas Heatherwick – a modern Leonardo? Ian Swankie

Most of us will remember the astonishing cauldron at the London Olympics, gradually constructed as part of the opening ceremony. Thomas Heatherwick entered the national consciousness that night and his outstanding work has continued to revolutionise architecture and design. 

Sarratt Festival of Music 2025

The name, **A Couple of Swells**, a nod to the 1948 musical Easter Parade, gave us a strong clue about our Friday 19 September evening's entertainment.

And **Joe Stilgoe and Liza Pulman** certainly are entertaining! Introduced with wit, style (and no little sparkle), and punctuated with occasional acidic topical references, Liza's sublime voice and Joe's extraordinary piano playing combined to give us an evening of classics from the Great American Song Book (think Irving Berlin, Leonard Bernstein, Jerome Kern and Stephen Sondheim, among many others).

But this was much more than just a collection of songs from musicals and films of yesteryear. As well as old favourites like People Will Say We're in Love, Mountain Greenery and Close Your Eyes, we had some of Joe's own more recent compositions, including That Was Then, and Harmony (beautiful harmonies right there, of course). They paired Ray Henderson and Mort Dixon's 1926 song Bye Blackbird with Paul McCartney's 1968 Beatles' classic Blackbird to treat us to one of their trademark song doubles. And always that harmony.

Performing is quite literally in their DNA, and as if to emphasise their versatility, we heard Joe on double bass, and Liza on Kazoo, while I'm sure few will forget Joe's imitation of a muted trumpet, or his air double bass, or the opportunity to select a few tunes for him to blend in his own inimitable style....Ride of the Valkyries in the key of F, anyone?

Music, it has been said, is what happens between the notes, and I was struck by how cleverly the evening was put together; and by how the entertainment transcended the songs - and even those glorious harmonies.

What a swell party it was!

On Saturday 20th September, our Concert was provided by the great Carducci String Quartet and pianist Julius Drake.

First Schubert and a String Quartet he wrote when just sixteen years old. This work is already classic Schubert, a joy to hear an absolute gem. The quartet played it with much care and enthusiasm with its bold first movement , the beautiful slow third, fast exciting fourth with hints of the opening and of course the second featuring that donkey!

There then followed the String Quartet in E-flat major by Fanny Mendelssohn, (Mendelssohn's sister). This work, composed in 1834, like nearly everything Fanny wrote was lost or ignored for many, many years but fortunately this is now being redressed. The Quartet completely realised the power and significance of this piece with its intense opening followed by an agitated/urgent second then the amazing desolate third with music here well ahead of its time and then the fast and exciting final movement.

Following the interval just one work, Shostakovich: Piano Quintet in G minor, this completed in 1940 and first performed in the then Leningrad. Joining the Quartet at this point Julius Drake opened the work with the solo piano part playing the very high register notes required, then the instruments of the quartet start to enter. It is an extraordinary piece, based on five movements, with all the musicians having significant solo moments and coming together to capture the contrasting atmospheres:

stark/soft/jaunty/tender/menacing/resigned then following a bridge provided by the solo violin the final fifth movement light, gentle and mysterious as indeed the work ends. In the hands of these five brilliant musicians it was just perfection.

On 26th September, we were privileged to witness great young musicians from a great music school. These brilliant students will grace the world's concert halls for many years. Moscow born classical guitarist Kate Yanovskaya moved to England aged 12. Her interpretation of Domeniconi's difficult 'Koyunbaba' piece was sublime. With hints of eastern mystery and exoticism this romantic performance had echoes of the great Spanish composer Rodrigo. Kate's technique was faultless and, amid the beauty, jarring interludes reminded us that there are dark forces in the world. A deeply engaging performance.

Kate was joined on guitar by 18 year old Ukrainian Kate Pavlenko. They performed a second 1980s piece, Mario Gangi's 'Suite Italiana'. With its Turkish - influenced opening themes the work moved lightly and rapidly, transitioning into beautiful, lyrical, harp-like, glistening music. Two tremendously accomplished young guitarists, playing with great delicacy, precision and coordination through a difficult but hugely rewarding piece.

A thunderous piano performance followed from 17 year old Cypriot Anna Avramidou – musicianship of the highest order from an incredibly skilful young pianist. She rattled through Scarlatti's sonata in F sharp major with flamboyance and at times incredible speed. The famous Chopin Sonata in B flat Minor followed, with its doom laden 'death march' – sorrow never to be ignored but juxtaposed by the chaotic, headlong Scherzo which preceded it. The strange, evocative finale was beautifully executed bringing an exciting performance to a deeply satisfying resolution.

Great pianists have appeared at the Music Festival and this amazing young musician can stand proudly alongside all of them. The performance by 19 year old Ukrainian Shlomi Shahaf, a BBC Young Musician of the Year finalist, was astonishing and incendiary. In the Bach Sonata no. 1 in G Minor he combined deep lyrical beauty and flair while maintaining Bach's metronomic rhythm even in the more challenging passages. The Debussy Sonata for Violin and Piano was skilfully played and reflected the pain and anguish from his homeland in the dark, angular passages, especially in the second movement.

Shlomi's finale was truly wonderful. He performed the incredibly difficult showstopper, Bazzini's 'Dance of the Goblins' with pizazz, great showmanship and outrageous skill – this took real nerve but we were never in doubt that he would pull it off.

This was a great concert which will live long in the memory.

The festival finished with a Sarratt Jazz event with the **Chris Garrick Quintet** – a triumph filled with musical excitement! Many of the audience had been delighted and amazed by Chris Garrick's previous visits, so expectation was high. The 'Homage to Grappelli' did not disappoint. To see and hear such accomplished musicians was a true pleasure honouring and celebrating the versatility of the maestro of the jazz violin.

As band leader, Chris with his easy manner and humour expertly revealed the individual talents of the four other players. Andy Crowdy gave great rhythmic support and wonderful entertainment on his splendid double bass. Eddie Hession calmly produced magic from his button accordion with flying fingers. Jez Cook was outstanding on his guitar and Tom Hooper for his physicality on drums and percussion.

These musicians are much in demand all over the world – we are so lucky to see them in Sarratt Village Hall. It is hard to find the necessary superlatives for the brilliance of Chris Garrick's wonderful and unusual improvised techniques on his violin. Dazzling just about expresses the virtuosity, dexterity and speed. Before the interval we were treated to some exciting African rhythms. These were passed from the violin and repeated by each player – exchanging fours, then threes, twos, and ones. This was a humorous and entertaining conclusion to the first half. The second half of the performance was equally entertaining – the interaction of the players continued, enabling all to shine. This created a dynamic and thrilling atmosphere throughout the programme.

Thanks to Chris and his group for so much pleasure, and true and respectful 'Homage to Stephane Grappelli'.

On Sunday October 12th we had a change of venue, and were at Dawes Common last worked over a year ago. The weather was a



bit cloudy but dry and warm, just right for our task. We were towards the bottom of the Common, near the glade and the wooden seat, where in the Spring there are carpets of bluebells. We decided to remove vet more of the scrubby brambles to allow even more bluebells to come through – you can't have too many bluebells!

The bramble roots came up fairly easily either by pulling or by digging; thank goodness we now have a batch of strong gauntlet gloves. But the plants had amazingly long stems and of course root wherever they touch the ground, so we had yards and yards of prickles to deal with. We ended up with several piles of brash which we put alongside the far hedge: this will provide cover for small mammals and birds and will of course eventually rot away.

It was a very satisfying morning and we were pleased with the areas we had cleared, hopefully we shall see the beautiful results in the Spring.

Next time, on Sunday November 9th we shall be at Penmans Green, up the track from Belsize. Meet there at 10am, tools provided but bring your own refreshments.

Do join us if you can, we are always looking for new volunteers, it's fun, good exercise and in our small way we are helping our environment.

Sarratt WI



The intriguing title of our talk in October was 'Quilting Codes - The Underground Railroad and the

Patterned Path to Freedom.' Our speaker was Kay Goddard who has a background in textiles and teaches patchwork. Each different pattern in patchwork has a name and about 10 years ago, Kay was asked to find out more about their origins.

Her story began in Ethiopia where men make textiles, weaving patterns in blocks that record the everyday happenings in their villages. They are designed to communicate in silence. In the early 1800s thousands of African people were being taken as slaves to work in the plantations in the southern states of America. Some of the women worked as seamstresses and were allowed to keep scraps of material. They began to use these to make quilts for themselves and their families, incorporating the designs that were familiar to them from home. Symbolism was embedded deeply in the African Tribal DNA so it was natural that when the need arose, they were able to adapt this silent communication.

Many slaves who tried to escape were killed but there were compassionate people who wanted to help them get to the northern States or to Canada where they could be free. Over time, 'the underground railroad' evolved – not an actual railroad but a system of secret routes, safe houses and guides, using railroad terminology as code words. These were brave people because the penalty for being caught sheltering a slave was public hanging.

Those who wanted to escape needed information to help them on their journey. Quilts were used as maps - a 2"x2" grid represented 5-10 miles. Different coloured squares were used to show fields with different crops but a red square always represented danger. The squares sometimes had knots in the middle as an indicator of distance.

The slaves came from different countries and spoke a lot of different languages and dialects but they learnt to understand the meanings of the patchwork patterns which could also be scratched into the bark of a tree or drawn in the dust and wiped away if anyone was coming. Some examples are the Flying Geese – 'it's time to go': when the geese

started to fly north, they could follow their direction and find water where they landed. Drunkard's Path was an instruction not to walk in a straight line which would leave them vulnerable to detection.

Jacob's Ladder was reminder that God was with them and the Log Cabin denoted a safe house. When they reached their destination. the Dresden Plate in a church window sent the message. "you're welcome, free and in a safe harbour." What a relief that must have been after travelling on foot for hundreds of miles. often without shoes.



Kay brought a patchwork quilt with her that she had made to demonstrate the different patterns. We were grateful to her for a very informative talk.

We meet at **2.15pm** on the second Wednesday each month in the **Village Hall**. Newcomers are always welcome. Our next meeting will be on **Wednesday 12th November** when Paul Barwick will speak about a New Zealand lady who was part of the French resistance. The title of his talk is The White Mouse, so our competition will be 'a mouse'!



On the fourth Wednesday of each month, we organise a walk ending with lunch at a local pub. Our September walk started and ended at the Two Bridges in Croxley Green, taking us through Cassiobury Park. While the 'long walkers' went over the golf course and back along Little Green Lane, some of the 'short walkers' had fun on the gym equipment in the Park! Our walk in October starts and finishes at the Artichoke, another Croxley Green pub.

NEIGHBOURHOOD PLAN REFERENDUM UPDATE

- <u>24/0094/COMP The Boot Public House, The Green Erection of static caravan and tent (David Heighton)</u> Officers served Planning Contravention Notice and received response. Currently considering next steps alongside marquee.
- <u>24/0116/COMP</u> Crestyl Barn, Watercress Farm, Moor Lane (Nick Withers) Works consented by Environment Agency, not development. Area of site currently in an untidy condition, owner to make improvements to clear/improve condition. Works underway.
- <u>24/0132/COMP</u> Bucks Hill House, Bucks Hill (Alannah Stringer) Letter sent to owner to improve and secure property by 20 December. Works to be completed by end of April. Officer to organise visit in coming weeks.
- <u>24/0137/COMP</u> <u>Coltspring Farmhouse, Sarratt Road</u> <u>Material Change of Use of Building for Home boarding for dogs (Alannah Stringer)</u> Planning application submitted via 25/0162/RSP. Planning

permission granted retrospectively subject to conditions requiring action within 6 months. Officers to visit in November.

<u>25/0022/COMP: The Lodge, Redhall Lane - Unauthorised Operational Works; erection of buildings (Nick Withers)</u> Planning permission required and application submitted, 25/0579/RSP (currently invalid).

<u>25/0053/COMP – Popes Croft, Chandlers Lane – Removal of trees</u> <u>(Scott Volker)</u> Site visit to take place. Planning app received -<u>25/1648/FUL</u> (invalid)

25/0070/COMP: The Woodyard, The Green - Works not in accordance with planning permission 24/0046/FUL: Fenestration and material detailing not as approved. (Nick Withers) Officers reviewing.

25/0103/COMP: 2 Flint Cottages, Solesbridge Lane, Use of Outbuilding as Dog grooming Salon (David Heighton) Officers gathering evidence.

<u>25/0139/COMP:</u> Red Lion Cottage, The Green - Unauthorised works: Window replacement without listed building consent or planning permission Officers reviewing submitted information.

HIGHWAYS - (CLLR DIGGINS AND CLLR ZERNY)

Meeting with Herts County Councillor Louise Price: Cllrs Diggins and Zerny met with County Councillor Louise Price on 29th September. We discussed the following:

- Scheduled works for 2026/7 most important of which will be resurfacing, as opposed to just patching, North Hill; we asked Cllr Price to let us know when it will be scheduled. We also asked that Bucks Hill be included; it has been unexpectedly patched up, but not resurfaced.
- More broadly, we have asked that, in planning in-year and next year priorities, we are consulted. We believe, with some justification that we have much better sense of priorities than an algorithm-driven, planning cell in County Hall.
- We also raised with Cllr Price the broader, more holistic review of our highways, combined with a Traffic Regulation Order (TRO) to establish a parish-wide 30 mph limit, to benefit all road users. Disappointingly, Cllr Price appeared not to have read our strategy paper. She then cited resources and the possible changes to the

strategic authority as a reason not to advance this work. Cllr Diggins pushed back, explaining that this paper was sent-out over a year ago and it will be a while before we have clarity over the new strategic authority; we cannot sit around doing nothing until then. It was eventually agreed that we will re-send the paper to Cllr Price and arrange a meeting with the County Cabinet Member responsible for Highways.

- M25 night-time closures/HGVs using local roads: SPC has asked Herts Highways for appropriate signage with weight restrictions on the points of egress into the village, and to provide confirmation of their current signage assets
- Old School Lane Potholes. Correspondence was received from a parishioner regarding the state of Old School Lane where potholes had caused damage to her car and very nearly badly injured the parishioner herself. Soon after, Herts Highways repaired the road.

Cllr Diggins explained the legal position to the parishioner, has promised to raise it with Cllr Price, and will write to Herts Highways, yet again deploring the state of our roads.

- Cllr Price commented that the damage criteria is being changed at Herts Highways department but the practice of working reactively to complaints will continue.
- It is not known how the Local Government Reorganisation will affect funding.
- Good news about M25. When it is closed, the managers of the M25 remove Solesbridge Lane from SatNav information, thus diverting traffic away from it.
- The speed limit on Sarratt Road was discussed, and it was agreed that targeted reductions in speed limits on key dangerous sections of road is likely to get implemented more quickly than trying to get a blanket change implemented across the Parish.

ENVIRONMENT AND SUSTAINABILITY

CRICKETERS POND: Works Completed. We now need to allow nature to take its course, So, the fencing will remain in place over the winter to help the coir mats settle, enable the reeds and lily pads to regrow, encourage the grass seed on the new bank to flourish, and allow the ducks to return to their restored duck house. Total cost: £10,700.00

(Grant received: £3,000.00, Filming Revenue received: £3,650.00, rest from SPC funds)

WOODLAND MANAGEMENT PLAN PHASE 2: To source free saplings for planting. To approach local volunteers with support from former Councillor FG. Continue to seek grants.

POLICY AND RESOURCES – (CLLR LOWRY)

The bank transactions for September were reviewed and approved

- Grant application forms have been distributed to prior applicants. Replies must be received by SPC by the 24th October.
- The new account with the CCLA Bank is now open, and SPC will make a small deposit this month to commence transactions.
- The 5 year forecast was presented. Increases in precept charged is in line with an anticipated 2.5% annual increase in inflation.
- SPC is preparing for the Chancellors changes to Council Tax banding, anticipated by pundits in the next budget.

REPORT FROM DISTRICT COUNCILLOR REED

The TRDC Local Plan is it is final stage, with Regulation 19 reached by the end of the year, the result of which will be communicated to all Councillors. The final site allocations will be made at the December meeting.

The beneficial result of the Local Plan Sub-committee Green Belt review is that it has been established that Sarratt contains no Grey Belt land. So direct over-development is not such a threat; but urban sprawl may be.

The Church End Conservation area review is at #2 on the list of reviews. The Green is at #5. The meeting thanked Dist. Cllr Reed for his attendance and information.
