A MESSAGE FROM BIRTLEY PARISH COUNCIL

From January 2027, the analogue Public Switched Telephone Network will be switched off. If you are not already on the internet, or you have poor/ unreliable internet provision (including satellite internet, slow broadband, etc.), you will need to speak to your telephone provider as soon as possible and ask how your phone will work on the new digital voice system. If you have an alarm or anything else connected to the phone, please make them aware.

If you are an internet user already, you will also need to check with your phone provider and also with your internet provider to make sure your current internet provision will be sufficient. Further advice is available from the following websites: Northumberland.gov.uk; Age.uk; Gov.uk and Which.co.uk

One important point is that a power back up is required to maintain service in the event of a power cut, and this is not something which is guaranteed. It is also important to let them know if your mobile phone network is patchy or nonexistent, as this may also affect your ability to contact necessary people and/or providers in the event of an emergency.

GREAT NORTH AIR AMBULANCE COLLECTION

The next twice-yearly collection in Upper Redesdale, Corsenside, Kirkwhelpington and the North Tyne, in aid of the Great North Air Ambulance Service (GNAAS), will be held on Wednesday, 17 September.

The GNAAS now subcontracts all collections to Clothes Aid, a national charity founded in 1996. Notably, Clothes Aid doesn't receive a single penny from its charity partners. In fact, the GNAAS anticipates a substantial increase in its income from upcoming and future collections, primarily due to the expanded range of items that can now be donated.

Since the first of the twice-yearly collections in 2005, the GNAAS has received tremendous support from communities across Redesdale and the North Tyne totalling £127,106.60 plus further donations from coffee mornings, afternoon teas and other events organised in its support. The GNAAS will welcome your continued support on 17 September.

The list of exactly what can and cannot be donated was updated in August 2025, and there are some changes, so you will need to be aware of what you can and cannot donate. The full list (and it's quite a sizeable one now) of what's acceptable and what's not wanted can be found here:

GOD'S WORLD - OUR WORLD

What a glorious summer we have had this year, enabling us all to get out and about in God's wonderful creation! Making the best use of this dry weather, several groups have been caring for God's creation in our benefice.

At the end of July, St Cuthbert's Bellingham hosted a group of folk from the Northeast Hong Kongers club for a second time, in the Sharing our Wild

Spiritual Spaces scheme. They generously gave their time helping in the churchyard in the morning, and in the afternoon we all enjoyed a walk to Hareshaw Linn, which was looking its best in the sunshine. It is always a joy to share our beautiful village with these interesting and hard-working city folk.

At the beginning of August, the first working party for *Friends of Bellingham Glebe* took place. Six eager folk (just look at those beaming faces in the photo) and one helpful cat (!) met up to begin to create an entrance to the



Glebe through the high chest nettles and garden debris beyond the gate. Wielding strimmers, loppers and saws, our aim was to start work on reclaiming both an entrance to the Glebe and some space at the top of the hill - with the work hopefully being completed by the end of the season. being well, we will

begin some more serious conservation work next year, and will hopefully be able to use the newly available space for outdoor worship and community nature events.

A third group of people involved in creation care this summer were, of course, *The Friends of Corsenside*. The hot weather in August gave ample opportunity for traditional haymaking on the meadows in the church yard at St Cuthbert's (see the photo on the cover of this magazine - if you subscribe to the online version of the magazine, you will be able to see that the sky was a stunning, cloudless blue) and a good number of hay bales were provided to local folk. The bees at the churchyard have continued to be productive and some lucky folk have enjoyed their delicious honey!

The *Climate Action Group* have also been busy lobbying the government about the Global Plastics Treaty talks which were held in August. Every year, the world produces over 462 million tons of plastic, 60% of which is single use

but only 10% is ever recycled. As I write this article 6, 900 000 tonnes of plastic have been dumped in our oceans this year. Find out more about this shocking situation at https://www.worldwildlife.org/pages/global-plastics-treaty

About 100 countries, including the UK, have been pushing for curbs to plastic production in the treaty and more consistent design globally to make recycling easier. Whilst no treaty was forthcoming this time, we are glad that the UK is taking a strong stance and not agreeing to a watered-down treaty which will not tackle the problem.

PRAYER WALKING DOWN THE VALLEY

As part of the North Tyne Pilgrim Prayer journey, Mary and I prayer walked down the North Tyne valley over the course of four days - from Wed 16th to Sat 19th July. It was forty-nine miles in total, from the source, near Deadwater, to the Meeting of the Waters, using the Tyne Trail developed by the charity 'Daft as a Brush'.

Mary and I were joined each day by different people on route, who walked sections of it with us. We had a few breaks to meet with others along the way, in various tearooms and homes. Voluntary drivers dropped us at our starting point each day. Helen Adamson, Donna Carr, Chris and Joan Davenport, Russell and Edith Dick, Joan Gladders, Phil and Frances Hardy, Brian Hastings, John Martin and Wynne Potts were all a part of the walk in different ways. We said hello to Fr Jim Dunne in Bellingham and to Revd Sarah Lunn in Chollerton as we walked through. Each day, we posted photos on social media, and realised others were praying with us online, and sending encouraging messages.

At one point, near Kielder Water, we missed a turn and walked along a redundant tarmac road for a few yards before it disappeared into the reservoir! It was the old road through the now flooded valley. We were very surprised to see two adders there, basking in the sun beside the road!

Later, we sat on a lovely bench, carved with animals – an otter, an eagle and

a salmon. We liked the two wooden sets of Noah's Ark on display by the fonts at Falstone, St Peters church. We ate the fruit of the land – raspberries growing on the roadside at Falstone and Redesmouth. We had to be brave a couple of times walking carefully by some bullocks! At one point, the path suddenly became very obscure, but we hacked our way through in faith, believing the path was still there, hidden in the undergrowth.

On the final afternoon, we had a very wet walk down to the Meeting of the Waters. It was raining so hard, we felt the waters had met us! We loved standing by the water's edge, looking down the Tyne and then up the respective tributaries of North and South, as they flowed in together.

We stayed in Brown Rigg, the former school in Bellingham for some of our accommodation, and later at a friend's house. After walking all day, we really appreciated the hot showers! We weathered the walk well with just a few insect bites and a few blisters.



The day after we completed the walk, we attended the early morning communion service at Gunnerton, St.Christopher's, as a way of saying thank you to God for such an amazing four days. We felt that the experience God had given us had brought a calmness and a slowing down to our lives; an element of timelessness and disconnect from our normal routines, which we very much appreciated!

Our aim throughout the 'Pilgrim Prayer journey' year has been to pray and bless the communities in the North Tyne valley at five different prayer gatherings over the course of the year. Our final two prayer meetings will be:

RAY WIND FARM NEEDS YOUR HELP...

With the help of grant funding available from the Ray Wind Funds since 2018 the communities have been able to transform village halls into more welcoming spaces, local schools have benefitted from funding for extracurricular activities, broadband infrastructure is currently being installed and jobs have been created, along with many other initiatives. Match funding has been sought for many of the grants and secured additional funding for the area.

Since the beginning of the Ray Wind Funds Community Interest Company in 2017 your communities have been served by Directors with our rural population's best interests at heart. Some of our original Directors will be standing down next year, therefore we are looking to bring more diversity and different skills to the Board of Directors. If you believe that you have something to offer and have a desire to support your local community and businesses, then we would like to hear from you.

The RWF Board comprises a representative from the six main parish councils within the area of benefit – Bavington, Birtley, Corsenside, Elsdon, Kirkwhelpington and Otterburn, and additional Directors that have been brought in for their unique skill set. Several other parishes fall within the boundary or cross it – Chollerton, Whittington, Capheaton, Wallington Demesne, Rothley, Hollinghill and Hepple. NEWS FROM BYRNESS

It's been a busy August in Byrness and at St. Francis. We have had many walkers through the village on short day walks and more ambitious souls walking the Pennine Way, (or parts of it at any rate). It's also been a busy season for the Forest View (the walkers' Inn in Byrness).

Martin Gainsborough the Bishop of Kingston, in the Diocese of Southwark recorded his visit to St. Francis. The bishop was running (yes running!) the Pennine Way with his Border Collie dog to raise funds to support Children's Education in Zimbabwe. Lovely comments in our visitor's book thanking God for the respite at St. Francis.

This week we were visited by the lovely family from Howson France. Benoit Howson had researched the crash of Lancaster DS650 plane during WW2. The flight tragically ended with a crash near the Catcleugh Reservoir, which killed all seven of its crew members. All were very young men both Canadian and British. Benoit has written and published a



lovely book in which he gives details of the men and their families. The Howson family have visited each burial place of the seven crew this summer and presented plaques to each Community: Harrogate, Edinburgh, Dunston, Pontefract, Bristol and Byrness. All the men were buried in the UK, as the Imperial War Graves Commission had a policy which did not allow repatriation of the remains. We held a small ceremony, with the Howson children playing the last post to honour the brave airmen.

A copy of Benoit's book is in St, Francis and is well worth a look. The plaque (see photo) is currently in our village hall, but we hope it will eventually reside in St. Francis.


