From The Ministry Team

The Revd Ashley Henderson writes:

Time like an ever-rolling stream bears all its sons away, They fly forgotten as a dream dies at the opening day

Familiar lines from Isaac Watts' hymn "O God Our Help in Ages Past" which will be sung in many churches and cathedrals on Remembrance Sunday as we pause to remember that at the 11^{th} hour of the 11^{th} day in November 1918 a peace treaty was signed to end 4 years of bitter war in which almost every nation in the world was involved and very few families remained unaffected. In silence we will remember those who gave their lives in the cause of freedom, justice and peace so that those left and future generations might have a better life — a life of opportunity, a life free of violence and terror.

How many names on the war memorial in St Marks churchyard could you name? War memorials are a visible reminder of the cost in human terms of war. They stand as a mark of the bravery of those who fought, a symbol of the thanksgiving of a grateful nation and a beacon of hope. And they remind us that each casualty of war is more than just a statistic or a name on a monument or memorial wall - there is a real-life tale behind every one, the personal story of a son, husband, brother, sweetheart, one which with each passing generation is in danger of being forgotten......just as a dream dies at the opening day.

Memorials, whether ritual acts or physical objects, commemorate formative events in our history and are symbolic of those values which underpin our society and give life its meaning: honour, integrity, decency, justice, generosity, self-sacrifice, freedom, love - values which also shape our future and values we lose at our peril. If we cease to care about the cost of war and the price of peace, in time our war memorials risk becoming little more than strange relics of the past. We must never allow them to be just objects of historical interest any more than we should allow the Cross - a symbol of the cost of God's love to become just an ornament or a piece of decorative jewellery. Remembering reminds us of how much we owe to those who have gone before us and how much we in turn owe to those who come after us.

The prophets of the Old Testament taught justice and mercy and none moreso than Micah — "what does the Lord require of you but to do justly, love mercy and walk humbly with Him". And Jesus came to bring peace, pushing the boundaries even further by asking who our neighbour was and encouraging us to love our enemies and those who hate us.

As 11th November comes round again and we wear poppies on our chests and our hearts as a symbol of thanksgiving, new life and hope for the future, let us ensure that familiar words such as "they shall grow not old as we that are left grow old" and "for our tomorrows they gave their todays" are not mere empty platitudes but foundation stones for a continual striving for peace, a peace for which so many fought and for which too many paid the ultimate price.

The massacre at Oradour – "Remember"

"Down this road on a summer's day in 1944 the soldiers came. Nobody lives here now. They stayed only a few hours. When they had gone a community which had lived for a thousand years was dead".

Those of you of a certain age and with good memories may recognise these as the opening words to ITV's award winning 26 part documentary **The World at War** from the 1970s. The village of which they spoke was Oradour sur Glane, a quiet rural commune in central France. The events at Oradour on 10th June 1944 remain some of the most barbaric acts of WW2. I am sure some will know the story and indeed some may have visited Oradour either with family or as part of a school trip. 4 days after the D Day landings the German SS moved into the village. They systematically rounded up the residents, separated the men from the women and children and then proceeded to herd them into barns and garages where they were shot and the barns set on fire, burning alive those who might have survived the shootings. A similar fate awaited the women and children in the village church. Only 6 villagers survived; 190 men, 247 women, and 205 children were massacred - 642 people in total.

A memorial plaque in the cemetery bears the names of all those who died, many from the same family, most poignantly of all a baby only 8 days old who had never even been given a name. There is also a glass coffin which contains thousands of bones of those who were never identified

General de Gaulle ordered the village to be left as it was as a reminder of what had happened that fateful day. Today, side by side with the new village of Oradour, lie derelict buildings, the desecrated church, burnt our cars and rusted machinery to provide a permanent reminder of the atrocities carried out that day.

We have visited Oradour twice. Here people walk in hushed reverence amid the ruins, lost in their own thoughts at the total devastation that lies before them, for Oradour's martyrdom has become a tangible focus of remembrance and reconciliation for people of all nations.

For me this begs a number of questions. Is it right that children as young as Key Stage 2 are introduced to WW2? Is it right that war poetry is still an essential part of the secondary school curriculum? Is it right that scores of school parties every year visit the war cemeteries of Northern Europe, where graves are loving tended and Christian, Jew, Muslim, and indeed atheist lie in peace?

It must surely be right for the past informs the present and the present gives shape to the future, our future; we owe it to those who paid the ultimate sacrifice - for our tomorrows they gave their todays.

After WW1 there was a collective determination among the nations that such slaughter should be forever a thing of the past. The League of Nations was founded to work for peace and disarmament; the Geneva Protocol was signed prohibiting the use of biological or chemical weapons; the first Geneva Convention laid down rules for how prisoners of war should be treated. And yet despite these treaties, less than a generation later, most of the same countries were embroiled once more in warfare.

Its questionable whether we are any closer to making a reality today of Isaiah's vision in Chapter 11 of a peaceable kingdom, free from violence and hostility, where natural enemies coexist in harmony and reconciliation. We must never turn a blind eye to the costs of war, the human pain and the human grief, the sacrifice of young lives, the physical and mental scars still borne, for we have a duty to honour and remember.

In one of the most moving pieces of tv footage ever the 26th and final episode of **The World at War** ends as it began with more aerial shots of the

devastated village of Oradour, this time interspersed with family photos of some of the victims. With the Kyrie from Haydn's St Nicholas Mass playing in the background, the narrator (Sir Lawrence Olivier) speaks one final sentence and then one final word which should be a clarion call for all as November 11th comes round again —

"At the village of Oradour-sur-Glane, the day the soldiers came, they killed more than six hundred men, women ... and children.Remember".

An update on my trip to Malawi....

I would like to say a very big thank you to everyone who donated towards the cost of the medicines which I brought to Malawi two weeks ago. I was able to purchase 18,000 tablets plus other medical supplies. Nobody at Security in the UK or at Malawi Customs was the least bit interested, but the Palliative Care Support Staff were delighted and within 15 minutes of my arrival they were prescribing some of the drugs for a small child in the clinic. The knitted teddies, dolls and elephants were received with great enthusiasm and laughter. Thank you everyone.

In addition to the drugs a further £2,300 pounds had been donated for medicines. Using a cash voucher generated from my bank the PCST accountant and I withdrew 10 1/2million Malawi Kwacha at a Currency Exchange. It was a **LOT** of bank notes which we then paid into the PCST bank. The PCST were absolutely delighted. They have been busy ordering other needed drugs from a local pharmacy. The hospital pharmacy is very short of everything, they even have no laxatives, so the clinic will dispense directly to the patients. Supplies of the food supplements for those who are destitute will also be topped up. I have a lovely letter of thanks from the clinic which I am happy to show to anyone.

I soon knew I was back in Malawi: when I got to my lodgings and there was no electricity, so, a cold shower by torchlight. Then there were ants in the teapot and a blind baked pastry case was liberally sprinkled with them. Shortly after I finished my cup of tea a cockroach climbed unseen into my cup to mop up the dregs. And of course there are mosquitos hoping for a feast.

The first patient I met in the adult clinic had come with a bleeding tumour the size of an orange on her neck. One of the drugs I had brought was Tranexamic acid. This arrests bleeding so we were able to give her some, and ease her pain too. Sadly she was 32 weeks pregnant. I don't know what the future will be for her or her unborn baby as I am not sure there are any chemotherapy options but the staff will continue to support her. I have seen several other sad cases but at least the team are able to make people comfortable and give emotional and spiritual support.

I was with the Team on the Paediatric ward this morning for the oncology round at 7am. There were quite a number of young children with leukaemia and other illnesses which in the UK would be curable. It is sad.

Then from 8am until 1pm we were in the clinic seeing patients. One young boy of 8 had had meningitis earlier in the year resulting in brain damage, blindness and

deafness. He was unable to walk or to have any meaningful interaction with his surroundings. His Mum was desperately praying for healing. The clinic nurses, the social worker and the Chaplain spent an hour chatting with the mother, listening to and counselling her. The staff were so gentle with her, then, led by the Chaplain we all prayed together.

Another clinic attendee was an angry young mother who was single, on her own, not supported by any of her family. Her 3 year old had congenital heart disease causing heart failure requiring frequent hospital admissions for oxygen and medication adjustments. The mother was angry that the hospital staff weren't making her child better. Again the nurses in the clinic patiently explained the situation and of course the mother's anger was hiding her tears which the staff gently encouraged her to shed. The social worker will try to help with some practical support and she will get continuing counselling from the clinic.

The final patient of the morning was a delightful 7 year old with a big smile. At the age of 5 he had swallowed a large Malawian coin .. about the size of a 50p. He didn't tell his Mum. Within 18 months the coin had caused ulceration from his stomach right through his abdominal wall. It made a very, very inflamed hole and he was getting no nourishment. He was in pain, had lost a lot of weight and had become very ill. His condition was so serious he was referred for Palliative Care. However surgery in early September was successful and he is doing really well. The offending coin was removed and the hole has nearly healed. He and his Mum came to tell us how well he was, so we had a lot of fun with him and gave him one of the teddy bears I brought with me. It was a nice case to finish the morning.

It is hard for the staff to be dealing with so many sad cases but they do appreciate the support you have been able to give them with the medicines and it really encourages them to know that other people value the work that they do, so thank you all.

As those driving around the village at the time of school drop off and pick up will know, it can be quite challenging, with blocked junctions, impatient manoeuvres and residents having difficulty leaving and returning to their homes. It can also be an anxious time for the safety of children walking to and from school.

Therefore the school is suggesting a voluntary one-way system. This would mean entering the village from Burton Road and down Oxenholme Lane and to leave the village via Helm Lane. This will only need to happen during school term times as listed below and between 8.45-9.15am and 3.15-3.45pm.

It is hoped that with everyone's support for this system (those dropping off/collecting children from school and residents) the roads around the village will be safer for everyone. Please be assured that this isn't about imposing restrictions on residents but about cooperation and caring for each other. With your support there can be a real difference to daily life in Natland – less stress, improved safety and the fostering of a considerate community spirit.

After last winter, I'm really worried about falling behind on my energy bills again as we head into the colder months. What can I do if I'm struggling to keep up with payments?

If you're struggling to afford your bills, it's important to act quickly - support is available. The first thing is to contact

your energy supplier - they're responsible for helping you come to a solution, like setting up an affordable repayment plan if you've fallen behind.

Check that your bills are based on accurate readings. If you see the letter "E" next to the readings on your latest bill, that means it's estimated. Send an up-to-date reading to get an accurate bill. Smart meters sometimes stop working – contact your supplier.

You might be able to apply for support with the cost of energy efficiency upgrades like insulation, a new boiler or a heat pump via your energy supplier or government scheme.

If you're behind on your bills, you might be able to get a grant to help you pay off your debt via your energy supplier. You'll need to get full debt advice before applying and can do this through South Lakes Citizens Advice. (If you are disabled or of state pension age, you can also apply for non-financial support from your supplier through the Priority Services Register.)

Remember, you don't have to face this alone. If you're struggling to afford your energy bills, contact South Lakes Citizens Advice.
