#### Paul's Piece

As I write, this week I have been in conversation with people and organisations, friends, who are being attacked because they are, or they are helping someone from a different culture. Attacked verbally, physically, emotionally and mentally. Being called derogatory names, having bricks thrown through the windows of their homes, feeling scared, living in fear of their lives, and having to increase security around the places they meet and work. The aggressors are those who live on this same island as I, the United Kingdom. It is incredibly disturbing. It is not part of the faith in Christ that I know, that our church, or the Christian denominations that are our partners in this area of Sinfin Moor, Stenson Fields and the Infinity Garden Village housing recognise. Yet the Christian faith is being used, by some, as part of the reasons for the aggression.

The rhetoric behind the aggression simplifies, for some, very complex issues that are not only within the UK borders but beyond and affecting many other people around the world. Issues that need to be engaged with and worked through, not avoided or dismissed. Aggression, whatever form it takes, is not going to be part of any sustainable solution. The Christian faith trusts in Jesus Christ, who suffered unjust violence to bring about a just and lasting peace that we can experience now, and experience fully, when as the bible puts it, 'God is all in all' (1 Corinthians 15.8). We are called to receive and give of that peace now and be part of Gods story, reflecting His identity of love, even in what can be an unloving time and place. The Christian faith also extends our actions and words into all our futures, raising our heads, hearts and hands to a beautiful time and place of being with "a vast crowd, too great to count, from every nation and tribe and people and language, standing in front of the throne and before the Lamb". (Revelation 7.9)



Julia Kendal, has spent over a decade working for and with NGOs, universities, think tanks, faith and grassroots groups to engage people locally, nationally and internationally with social and environmental justice. As a writer and social justice advocate Julia writes

"Reflecting on the news, I find myself thinking about the signs of a different kind of kingdom, one that transgresses national borders. In the Bible there's the story of one man who died once for all the world. And in dying, he brought forth his kingdom – one that crosses boundary lines to be truly global. The signs of this kingdom are not division or disconnection but peace and justice, joy and comfort, healing and presence."

......... As Harvey Kwiyani, a theologian from Malawi, puts it: "We are all welcome to God's kingdom with our unique cultures. Being in the kingdom of God does not erase our cultural differences... The kingdom of God finds its fullest expression in intercultural mutuality. It is a multicultural kingdom." The kingdom of God in all its richness – that's a tempting proposition.

It's easy to see that we aren't living in the fullness of this yet. But the world is not a static place. One metaphor used to describe the kingdom of God is yeast; living cultures filling the dough, making it rise. This is an image that is expansive, generous. The kingdom isn't wholly realised yet, but we can see more and more of it.

...... The kingdom is bigger than our individual lives, churches or communities; recognising this helps us to break out of a fortress mentality. So far, this century has been marked by fortification. As well as the raising of flags, there have also been walls. At the end of the second world war there were fewer than five border walls; there are now more than 70, most of them built in the last two decades. But the kingdom of God offers a view of home that is not about defence, not about perimeters, or even places. It's a relationship with God, who made and sustains this world, who crosses the divide to meet each of us. In meeting him, we can partner together in seeing more of his kingdom on this earth."

On our new signs outside the Church Centre building there is a watchword - 'You are always welcome'. What do we mean by this? - whichever culture, social class, country you were born in, God welcomes you into His kingdom. You are welcome whenever, we welcome you into His kingdom.

Drawn by the courts of kindness.


I bind myself today.

#### Heath Court

One thing my daughter and I have in common, spart from loving her children and grandchildren, is Charity shops. In an article in the monthly newsletter at Heath Court I read the following:-

Fashion is the worlds' second largest polluter after the oil industry. The clothes we buy have a hidden cost. Fabric production creates an estimated 1.2 billion tonnes of CO2 equivalent per year - that's more than international flights and maritime shipping combined,

Polyester, which is the most common fibre in modern clothing, is a plastic made from oil, and takes 200 years to break down. Polyester microfibres are released in every wash and account for 85% of all human debris found on shorelines around the world.

Even natural fibres such as cotton have a heavy footprint, using tens of thousands of litres of water to grow just a kilo at a time. It is estimated each time a new pair of jeans is made, an estimated 16.2kg of CO2 is emitted - the equivalent of driving 58 miles in a car. And yet, every second, a lorry-load of clothes id discarded to be burnt or sent to landfill.

Patric Grant, from The Great British Sewing Bee, is recorded as saying "We have enough clothing on the planet right now to clothe the next six generations of the human race: we have to find ways of using what we've got."

I, a self-confessed clothes-aholic, found this a shock to my system. David Attenborough says that we are the generation who can see what we and previous generations have done to this lovely planet, and we are the generation who can do something about it. Even a small individual change in habits can make a difference.

Mountains can be moved, albeit only one rock at a time. Too many people use rocks to hide under or toss at the unwary. Whilst curtailing my shopping may only be a pebble, it is one of the things I can do. Let's show the younger generation a good example when it comes to saving the plant God has given us.

space within Ash Croft Primary Academy - this is the third year we have done this. But as in all things - especially in schools - things change very rapidly as numbers of students rise and fall and different needs emerge.

This first picture shows the reflective space, which is called Pause, back in June.

But, because of building work we lost our space - here it is as I took it all down in July. But as well as losing our permanent space, we also faced another change as the headteacher went on maternity leave. We prayed over the summer that we would be invited back in September and for the uncertainty of where our space may be.





In answer to our prayers, the new headteacher welcomed us again and we started the term in a temporary space in the Library with a small wall space. But we make the most of what is offered.

Please pray for the Reflective Space - needs have changed again within the school and we may once again need to rethink how we provide this space but it continues to be a joy to go into school every Thursday and those children who come into the space really appreciate the time to stop and chat and reflect.
