Festivals and feasting, light and dark

Dear Friends,

In case you hadn't noticed, we have reached that time of the year when the darkness is occupying more of each twenty four hours than the light. It is also chillier, the season when my Australian relatives tell me I should "rug up" and get cosy in front of the fire. While I have not done it yet, I suspect it will not be too long before I do light my fire and draw the curtains against the darker evenings.

October begins with harvest festivals and feasting. We celebrate the bringing in of the crops, the fruits and vegetables and express our gratitude for all the gifts God bestows upon us. Harvest suppers and lunches take place and it is an opportunity to share in fellowship and hospitality; it is always a blessing to break bread together. At the other end of the month we have All Hallow's Eve and, here on Exmoor at least, the celebration of dark skies.

Darkness can be difficult- in the dark we find it hard to see the way forward and it is all too easy to stumble over obstacles unseen. In the darkness we sometimes feel uncertain and anxious. As a child walking in the lanes after dark I always felt fearful and kept tight hold on my mother's hand for comfort. There are times in our lives when we feel like we are wandering in the dark. There may be many reasons for this; perhaps we are mourning a loved one, maybe we have been or are sick, possibly we have lost our way spiritually and cannot see what to do. When we are in such darkness, artificial light may not be the best help, we need something more than that.

Jesus, in one of the 'I am' sayings in John's Gospel, says this, "I am the light of the world. Whoever follows me will never walk in darkness, but will have the light of life" (John 8:12). Whatever is happening in our lives, Jesus' light is always more powerful than any darkness we experience. If you consider the night sky, the darker it is, the more the stars shine; however dark our lives may be the light of Christ is always stronger and always will cast out the darkness if we trust him to do so. His light brings us the courage and warmth that I found in my mother's hand all those years ago.

As we move into the darker, colder months it is good to spend time in fellowship, learning more about our Lord and praising him for all that he gives us. Perhaps now is the time to think about joining in with the Bible study group, coming to a service that you have not attended before, sharing a meal - whatever it is, let us find ways to invite Christ's light into our lives and to walk with him through each day,

The East Stained Glass Window of Guarlford Church

I often find at Matins that my thoughts
By stained glass windows are the more absorbed
Than by the service and attendant hymns.
Each window has a message for us there

Tadelche's Story

Tadelche was married at 18. Soon after, she gave birth to her first child and her second child followed not long after. But it was during the birth of her third child that things went terribly wrong.



Tadelche experienced severe labour pains at home and she knew something was wrong. By the time she reached a health centre the damage had been done. Tadelche developed a fistula, a devastating injury that left her incontinent. She was ashamed. But she also worried about how she could care for her children while dealing with such a condition.

Fortunately, her family brought her to the Yirgalem Hamlin Fistula Centre, where she received specialised treatment completely free of charge. From the moment she arrived, her journey of healing began.

She was provided with a comfort package, which included one of the handmade knitted blankets produced by one of our dedicated knitters. The staff bathed her, fed her, and monitored her closely, all with compassion and respect.

During her treatment, naturally she was scared, but other patients reassured her that everything would be okay. After surgery, she felt something she hadn't felt in a long time: hope. Hope for her future and for her children.

For many women in Ethiopia, obstetric fistula remains a condition shrouded in stigma and isolation. But with hospitals like Yirgalem, staffed by people who care deeply and are trained to provide the necessary treatment that is both free and accessible, healing becomes possible.
