#### From the Rector.....

It's no secret, I suspect, that I love autumn. While many were reluctantly moving away from the warmer months, I was joyfully putting on my jumpers and jackets and rejoicing in the turning season, the colours in the trees and the opportunity for longer evenings curled up with a book and a warm drink. When I have time!

Now the season is moving again, and winter is close upon us. The temperature is dropping quite rapidly (I may even put the heating on soon) and just to really rub it in, this weekend the clocks move back, bringing even longer evenings, and for many a lowering of spirits with the loss of the light.

I suspect that one of the difficulties we have with winter that we try to keep going as though it is summer. But nature shows us otherwise. Much of God's creation wisely hunkers down for a rest, takes life slow, and works on regaining its strength ready for the time when spring arrives again. We, on the other hand, turn on our artificial lights and try to make the days the same as those at the height of summer.

I would like to say to you all - it's ok to slow down. Seasons are a gift. I would miss them terribly if (as is threatened with climate change) they disappeared. But they are a gift we need to take. Relax into winter, find its pace and its beauty.

In our churches we are moving through our seasons too. We have the last Sunday after Trinity at the end of October and then we move into the Kingdom season, with the celebration of the Feasts of All Saints and All Souls, followed by Remembrance Sunday, and Christ the King, moving on to Advent which starts on the last Sunday in November; the start of a new church year, and our time of preparation for Christmas.

Life has its seasons too. We all see them in our lives. The light and easy seasons when life is good, the road ahead of us is sun filled and straight, and the harder times when the way before us is darker and harder to walk, and each step costs us.

We aren't the first to find this. The Psalms were written thousands of years ago, but still speak to our lives today. One of the best known and most loved is the 23rd Psalm - The Lord is my Shepherd - and it speaks into this idea of seasons of life. There are seasons where we walk beside still waters, in green pastures; and then there are times when we know

ourselves to be walking those difficult paths we would rather have been able to avoid. But whichever season we are in, the psalmist reminds us that we are not alone. 'Though I walk through the valley of the shadow of death' he says 'I will fear no evil, *for you are with me...*'

It would be lovely to be able to find a reason why life sometimes seems to throw awful things at us; to be able to have only good things happen to good people, and the evil get their just rewards. But life isn't like that - it just happens, for good or bad. Our choice is in how we decide to walk through it, and with whom. I choose to walk with God, to know myself held and supported when the bad stuff hits - and no, that's not always easy. But I know of no other way to live.

#### Norwich Cathedral Services and Events

Here are some of the events and services that may interest you in the coming weeks.

#### Exhibition: Edith Cavell in her own voice

Tues-Thurs until 23 Dec 2025 Location: Library

Edith Cavell in her own voice aims to tell the story of Norfolk nurse and First World War heroine Edith through her own words, paintings and possessions, rather than through the propaganda that followed her execution by the Germans on October 12 1915 for helping some 200 Allied soldiers escape occupied Belgium.

#### Art in the Close

Sept 2025 to Spring 2026 Location: Cathedral Close

Ancient architecture and contemporary sculpture combine in an exciting new exhibition of outdoor art at Norwich Cathedral.

Art in the Close will run from September 2025 to Spring 2026 and sees the Cathedral Close become the inspirational setting for a mix of works by artists Lynn Chadwick and John Maine.

The free open-air exhibition is planned to be the first in a new rolling programme of art at the Cathedral and it will give visitors the chance to enjoy discovering works in three different areas of the Close.

Join us for a brief but silent haven from the concerns of daily life. The only sound will be music playing at the beginning and end of the silence. #### **Candlelit Advent Procession**

Join the Cathedral for Advent carols and readings in a candlelit procession as we begin our preparations for Christmas.

## **Evensong with the making of a Chorister Bishop**

05 Dec 2025, 17:30

Reviving a custom from the Middle Ages, one of the Cathedral's choristers will be made the 'Chorister Bishop' during this special Evensong celebrating St Nicholas, the patron saint of children, concluding with the blessing of the outdoor crib outside the Hostry. We will be joined by the Bishop of Thetford for this special service.
