The Newsletter

Prayer. How do I pray? What do I do? What do I say? Everyone knows about *perfunctory* prayer – telling God my wants, my needs, my views on life, my demands that he re-organise the world in the light of my wisdom.

But there's also prayer of a quite different sort: mental prayer - the descent of the mind into the heart, waiting on God, seeking his presence, standing before him, acknowledging my own frailty, and listening. Going deep takes preparation - except when tragedy hits. Bereavement, loss, divorce, betrayal, hurt or wounding, grievous illness - such things open up the depths and I just want to escape and return to the shallows.

I may also become aware of the depths when I've done wrong – guilt and shame bring stirrings within, turmoil, restlessness. There are strategies like denial, self-justification, and distraction - like entertainment or drink. Or just assuring myself I'm not too bad compared to others.

But such strategies have serious consequences: they harden the heart so deep prayer becomes difficult and God seems silent or non-existent. For I become less sensitive: conscience becomes muffled, indistinct – and my judgement becomes unreliable. Down that road lies loss of moral compass easy to spot in others, like in public life. But what if it's me?

I have to go deep. The depths have little appeal - avoided because there I encounter my past, the junk of my life, my hiddenness and shame. I cannot bear to let God into such chaos and disorder.

But in the spiritual life those who are sick of their mess have a head start on those who seem to have got their act together. Cry out 'God have mercy' and tell him how it is. The only rule in deep prayer is absolute sincerity. Jesus hears the cry of the heart - he knows me better than I know myself.

That's how peace and forgiveness are found, how joy is re-discovered, how sensitivity is restored in place of hard-heartedness, how brokenness gets healed, how new hope become possible, new identity, new Paul belonging – and all that Jesus means.
