

View From The Vicarage This Month (November 2025)

am sure I have started my November "View from the Vicarage" every year with the same statement! "The nights are drawing in" and they certainly are. The clocks go back in October and November means dark mornings and dark evenings. I am not sure your hothouse flower of a Vicar is really looking forward to winter. It's wet and cold already, after a bit of a false hope with a very dry and mild early part of the month. The vicarage is already being heated to a comfortable 23 degrees, my vest is on, the thermal leggings are ready, hats and gloves sorted and ready and my jumpers are out and already being well used.

October seems to have passed in a bit of a blur, partly because Emma's knee did not heal properly after her operation (she was allergic to the stitches they think!) and we had to spend a huge amount of time at the Spire in Macclesfield. It really drives home how important good care is when something does go wrong, and the Spire Team were, without exception outstanding. Thank you to the NHS who funded the whole gig!

Of course, October was Harvest month. 29th September Onecote Pie Supper and Sale; 6th October Ipstones Pie and Pea Supper and Sale of Produce; 12th October, Warslow Harvest and giveaway and 13th October Butterton Pie and Pea Supper and Sale of Fruit & Auction. And every single one a triumph too. People organised, turned out, donated, sang, prayed, and ate pie and peas as well as buying generously at each sale. We were also blessed with an address from Lindsey Stockton from Leek Foodbank at Ipstones, and action singing from the children. Add in a couple of other harvests across the Deanery and your vicar was in danger of turning into a pie herself!! I was rather grateful to Bishop Matthew who visited the Waterfall Family Group on Butterton's Supper Night meaning I only got to the auction – and scored a great jar of chutney too. And there were of course also 2 very joyful school harvest services which I loved. Imagine my shock when I heard radio 2 playing Cauliflowers Fluffy this morning!

October also included the whole range of special services, baptisms, weddings and funerals. It is such a privilege to walk alongside people at such key times in their lives, and to serve as best I can. Anyone who says the church is no longer relevant to our lives needs to see how church can bring joy and care, support, comfort

and laughter into people's lives.

I can sometimes feel a bit topsy turvy when moving from a joyful event to a sad one but am so glad we are still sought out when needed.

November is a big month too. As well as marking the inexorable march towards the Christmas Season, it hosts two very important services in the month. Sunday 2nd November is the Feast of All Saints and is traditionally when we hold services to commemorate the departed (otherwise known as All Souls). I find All Souls incredibly moving and always cry, sniffing as discretely as possible whilst leading the services that are taking place at Ipstones (6.30pm), Onecote at 9.30am and Warslow 11.00am. As the candles are lit the churches fill with a sense of warmth, love and comfort. We remember always with both sadness and hope and cherish the memories the service brings.

And then its **Remembrance Sunday**, with the mix of formality, respect, tradition, and poignancy. Starting with Ipstones Schools Service at the Cemetery at 10.00am on the 7th November with songs, readings and prayers led by the children, and the Cornet played by Mike – all are welcome. Remembrance Services at Onecote and Ipstones on the 9th and a service at Butterton at 11.00am on the 11th November. Wearing our poppies is one way to show our respects, and being at one of the ceremonies is another. As the world gets more and more mired in war and tension and threats we need to look forward praying for peace as well as backwards with thanks for what was done previously. Our service personnel are right out there again, working to maintain peace quietly and without fuss day by day.

And last but not least at the end of November its Christmas tree Festivals and Lights Nights, Christmas Markets and the packed run up to Christmas via the 4 weeks of Advent. It may be dark and dreary outside, but in November our lives are full of activity, reflection, thoughtfulness, hope life and light, thanks be to God.



What an amazing Harvest Festival we had. The flower arrangement and displays were fantastic, and the



Church smelt fabulous. Huge thanks to Jackie and her small and talented flower team for all they did. It was way beyond anything we could ask for. The service was great too, with a lovely group of children and their families leading the singing, readings and prayers and a great address from Lindsey Stockton, the Manager at Leek Foodbank. Lindsey said she thought I enjoyed the action song more than the children and she was right!! Thank you to everyone who brought goods to offer. We donated all the tinned and dried food to the foodbank – about 60kg worth, and the fresh produce went to the Harvest Supper Auction, raising funds for St Leonards and for Mary's Meals – a charity that feeds 8,000 children across 8 countries every day at their schools.

And as for the **Harvest Supper** – a great night, with 90 plus folk sitting down to eat Ann Mace's fabulous pie and peas (thank you Ann as always for being such a brilliant chef) and the wonderful desserts ALL produced by Pam Ramsay...a true treat with apple crumble, trifle or roulade! Julie Riley and Jackie Worrall were great door-keepers and raffle sellers. Jackie Wibraham sorted the flowers and a lovely team set up, washed up and cleared away. Thank you too to the Watkins family for so generously sponsoring the event through a huge offering of fruit, vegetables and flowers and to Rob Watkins for auctioning everything so skilfully. We are still finalising the accounts, but we think we have made about £1,200.

We are looking forward to a busy November at St Leonard's. We start with our All Souls Service at 6.30pm on the 2nd November. This is a service to commemorate those we have lost and loved, I will read out all the names of those people I am requested to, as well as light a candle for each one. A quiet service, with quiet music, incense, thoughtful prayers and readings, all are welcome, whatever your faith or belief.

The following Sunday is **Remembrance Sunday**, although we begin with a night making poppy wreaths

and flags in church on the 5th November with the rainbows, brownies and guides. Our Remembrance Services begin on Friday 7th November at 10.00am in the Cemetery, with the children from St Leonards and their families. The children will lead that service and will plant 130 crosses to commemorate all who have served in our armed forces. On Sunday 9th November, we begin at the Memorial Hall, at 10.15am with an Act of Remembrance and the laying of wreaths in the Hall. This will be followed by the procession down to St Leonards ready to begin the service of remembrance at 10.50am. The service is jointly led by our Methodist colleagues and ourselves, and as always we will be joined by the Royal British Legion, Parish Council, Fire Service, uniformed organisations and a wide range of colleagues. Please do join us if you can.

We celebrate **Advent on 30th November** in a church fully decorated with the Annual Lights Night Christmas Tree Festival. The Festival itself is opened on Friday 28th November from 5.00pm, with mulled wine, mince pies, and glorious Christmas trees all displaying memories of Christmas. It's a brilliant event and having had a sneak preview of some of the plans I know it will look beautiful. As it is the same night as the famous Ipstones Christmas Market it will make a great night out for the whole family. It also marks my 4th anniversary here in this glorious village and part of the world. Remember the SNOW that night. I hope we do not have a repeat!!

During Advent the Fellowship Group is meeting on 18th November, 2nd December, 9th November and 16th December, at 7.00pm at the vicarage (except 9th December at the schoolroom) to continue to explore Luke's Gospel, as well as socialise, laugh, catch up and pray together. Anyone is very, very, welcome to join us for good or just for Advent.

Beer and Blessings (our new roving pub service each month will be on 25th November from 7.00pm at the Old Red Lion Ipstones. Join us for a good social night, ending with a little prayer service.

We have gratefully received 2 substantial donations in memory of Rita Wainwright (£375) and Marion Sale (£290) following their funerals.

May they both rest in peace and rise in glory.





Ipstones Methodist Church

November 2025



In my previous articles I noted that there were in the past two branches of the Methodist Church in Ipstones – Wesleyan and Primitive.

What were the essential differences between these two branches of Methodism?

- Both groups trace their theological roots to John Wesley, focusing on personal salvation, holiness, and scriptural authority.
- Primitive Methodists emerged in the early 1800s as a revivalist offshoot, seeking to restore the original fervour of Methodism, which they felt had become too conservative and formal under Wesleyan leadership.
- Wesleyan Methodists practiced chapel-based worship with more formal liturgy and ordered governance, appealing to middle-class and artisan communities.
- Primitive Methodists favoured open-air preaching, spontaneous worship, emotional revival meetings, and a more democratic, locally governed structure, attracting poorer groups such as labourers, mill workers, and miners.
- Primitive Methodists were closely linked to working-class activism and social justice, with members involved in early trade unionism and local politics.
- Their chapels were less ornate and their religious meetings often included enthusiastic singing, testimony, and revivalist practices such as camp meetings, most famously at Mow Cop just a few miles from here.
- Wesleyan Methodists promoted education and self-improvement, often aligning with the values of middle-class society.

 Over time, differences softened, and both branches joined with United Methodists in 1932 to form the Methodist Church of Great Britain.

I wonder which branch of Methodism we would most closely identify with today?



Ipstones Historical Society



The Ipstones Historical Society met on 25th September 2025, in the Memorial Hall extension for a talk by Jenny Lingham on the subject of eyesight correction through the ages.

Our speaker began her talk by explaining to the group the practical reasons for eyesight problems and how the eye focuses light, depending upon certain factors. Myopia (short sightedness) and Hypermetropia (long sightedness) is caused by either the shape of the eye ball or the loss of elasticity of the lens to correct sight.

In ancient history Seneca the younger discovered that letters could be seen better by viewing them through a globe or a glass filled with water. The Roman Emperor Nero wore emerald glasses to view the gladiator games. Even the Vikings produced lenses out of rock crystal however, it is generally accepted that the Italians invented modern glasses in the thirteenth century.

Early lenses were convex and two magnifying glasses were riveted together. Improvements came later with the evolution of 'Pence – nez' or nose pinch joined lenses. The first bifocals were developed in 1784 by Benjamin Franklin and by 1825 George Airy corrected Astigmatism. Edward Scarlet invented modern style glasses which hooked behind the ears and by the 1930's glasses were seen as medical appliances. It wasn't until the 1970's that the wearing of glasses became more fashionable and designers began to create their own ranges.

The development of contact lenses began in the Victorian era and by 1880 Adolf Eugen fitted the first ones made of blown glass. Obviously these were quite dangerous and by the 1930's the lenses were made of plastic.

Eye surgery has been attempted as early as the 5th century BC for correcting cataracts and many other horrible procedures were undertaken. In 1748 the first surgical removal of a cataract was made in Paris and more modern advancements occurred in 1978 when implants were inserted. Today lasers are used routinely to correct problems.

Ipstones Gardening

Jobs for November

- Raise planted containers on to pot feet, bricks or similar to prevent them sitting in water, and the compost from becoming waterlogged during the winter, which can kill your plants.
- Sow broad bean seeds for the earliest crops next year. For best results, plant in well-drained soil in a warm, sheltered spot. In colder areas, cover the soil and developing plants with cloches.
- Dig up, or bring in pots of cannas and dahlias once their leaves are blackened by frost. Cut back the stems to 2.5cm/1inch from the base and overwinter in a frost-free place.
- Take hardwood cuttings of shrubs, such as roses, dogwoods (Cornus), mock orange (Philadelphus), flowering currant (Ribes) and forsythia.
 They're the easiest cuttings to root.
- Don't slip up this winter! Make patios, paths and steps safer by cleaning them and removing moss and algae with a pressure washer or a chemical cleaner.
- Get the mower serviced soon, before the rush starts after Christmas.
 If the weather's mild, the grass will still grow, so you might need it back sooner than you think!
- This is the perfect month to move deciduous small trees, shrubs and climbers that are growing in the wrong place. Dig up a large rootball, replant with lots of compost and keep well watered.
- Rake up fallen leaves from flower borders and the lawn. If left, they'll look a mess, damage or kill plants underneath them and provide ideal shelter for overwintering slugs and snails.
- But don't waste those leaves. Put them in a thick black bag, mix in some grass clippings and make a few holes in the bottom. In 12 months you'll have a wonderful compost to enrich your soil.

This is one of the best months to plant garlic.
 Make sure to buy autumn planting/overwintering varieties from a reputable supplier. Barlic bought in supermarkets is not suitable for our climate.

HELP Appeal: improving emergency care beyond hospital helipads

When people hear about the HELP Appeal, many immediately think of lifesaving NHS hospital helipads that enable air ambulances to land directly at hospitals, dramatically improving patient outcomes in emergencies. While this remains a cornerstone of its mission, the charity's impact extends far beyond helipads. The HELP Appeal is also a vital funder of another essential resource in emergency care: **critical care cars.**



Advancing emergency care beyond the helipad

Critical care cars are a lifeline for emergency medical teams, ensuring rapid response times and the highest level of care for patients in urgent need. They provide support when helicopters can't fly due to inclement weather or when an incident has occurred in a built-up area where a helicopter cannot land. They ensure specialist teams reach patients quickly, no matter the circumstances. Each car represents not just a vehicle, but a crucial piece of a larger emergency care network that saves lives across the country. The HELP Appeal has funded over 30 to date with more in the pipeline.

Hospital grade treatment at the scene

Equipped with advanced medical equipment and staffed by air ambulance teams, or volunteer emergency medics (from the British Association for Immediate Care, who support the ambulance service in critical incidents), these vehicles bring hospital grade treatment directly to the scene. In

many cases, this rapid intervention can mean the difference between life and death, whether it's responding to a major road traffic collision, a cardiac arrest or a complex trauma in an urban environment.



Filling in vital gaps in emergency services

The HELP Appeal's funding of these vehicles reflects a deep understanding of the challenges faced by emergency services. Helicopters, while extremely fast, are not always available, especially during poor weather conditions. Moreover, urban environments often pose logistical issues that make helicopter landings impossible. Critical care cars step in to fill this vital gap, ensuring that no matter the time or place, expert medical help is never too far away.

In extending their support beyond helipads, the HELP Appeal demonstrates its wide-ranging support for emergency care charities, going wherever it is needed to ensure more lives are saved. Through the continued funding of critical care cars, they ensure that support is not only airborne, but always accessible, regardless of the terrain or weather.

Dear Friends and Supporters. Welcome to the latest copy of our newsletter.

As usual, I will start with the figures for last month with a comparison to the same month in 2024:

Total vouchers fulfilled = 106 (86)

No. of Adults fed = 158 (118)

No. of Children fed = 92 (71)

Total no. fed = 250 (189)

So, as you can see, a much busier month than September last year, and I think that this is going to be the way things are from now through the winter. We are seeing a greater number of people who are having to use the Foodbank on a regular basis, and we have 30 clients who have had more than 3 vouchers in 6 months. Although some of these clients are sadly substance dependent, more than 50% of them are not, but just struggling with the cost of day to day living. We continue to support all our clients with as many different agencies as we can persuade to come to the Foodbank and chat to them about their issues, but for some there are few if any answers.

One of the things I am highlighting in my harvest talks is that the need for Foodbanks is a year round thing, not just at harvest and Christmas when we get our most generous donations. So, I am, even in the midst of this season of giving, still attaching our regular shopping list.

Little Ipstones Kitchen

Driving into the village one afternoon at the beginning of October, beautiful warm colours of orange, gold and red on the trees at the top of the High Street, caught my eye- a welcoming archway back home. Yes, Autumn had arrived, a favourite time of the year. A time for comfy clothes and tasty food.

A warming Parnsip and Apple soup, and a delicious slow cooked hearty Chicken, Bacon and Potato stew, to enjoy with a cuppa, using items most folk will have in the store cupboard, are the recipes selected for this edition of the Communities Newsletter, which have all been produced in the 'Little Kitchen' recently.

PARSNIP and APPLE SOUP

Ingredients to serve 4

1 tablespoon of olive oil and ¼ oz butter

½ Spanish onion, finely chopped and 1 garlic clove, crushed

2 teaspoons mild curry powder, sea salt and freshly ground black pepper

2 ¼ lbs parsnips, chopped

1 large Bramley apple, peeled, cored and chopped

1 ¾ pints of hot chicken stock

6 tablespoons single cream and 2 tablespoons lemon juice

Heat the oil and butter in large saute pan over a gentle heat. Add onion, garlic and curry powder and sweat gently, stirring frequently, for 2-3 minutes until onion has softened. Add parsnip and season lightly with salt and pepper. Turn up heat and fry for 5 minutes or so, until the parsnips are golden.

Add apple and stir for 1 minute, then pour in the stock and bring to the boil. Lower heat and simmer for 10-12 minutes until parsnips are tender. Take off heat and cool for several minutes, then transfer to a blender or food processor and whizz until smooth and creamy. Add a little more water if the soup is

too thick for your liking. Reheat gently, then stir in the cream and lemon juice.

Adjust seasoning to taste and serve piping hot with a drizzle of cream if you wish.

CHICKEN, BACON & POTATO STEW

Ingredients for 4-6 servings.

I cooked this in a slow cooker, but could be adjusted to oven cooking if you don't have one.

1 tablespoon of olive oil

6 bone-in chicken thighs, skin removed

12 rashers smoked streaky bacon, chopped

7oz finely chopped onion

12oz baby new potatoes

Few thyme sprigs,

7fl oz white wine and l8fl oz hot chicken stock

280 ml pot of buttermilk (optional)

Squeeze of lemon juice

and brown these, too.

1 tablespoon of dried tarragon

Small tin of sweetcorn (optional)

Heat oil in large pan and brown the chicken thighs for about 10 minutes until lightly golden. Remove and set aside. Add bacon and onion to pan,

Tip everything, except buttermilk and lemon juice into slow cooker. Cover and simmer on high for 4–6 hours (or most of the day on low), until the chicken

is really tender and falling off the bone.

Check the sauce, and if you like it a little thicker, strain it into a pan and boil until thickened and return to the pot. Stir in the buttermilk, and sprinkle in the lemon juice...adding a small tin of sweetcorn if you wish.

Serve with something green on the side.


