St. George's Church - Bicentenary Celebration Year

This year, 2025, is the bicentenary of St. George's Church. One special activity, among various other events and activities to celebrate the bicentenary, is to create a time capsule.

The primary purpose of a time capsule is to preserve objects and information from a specific point in time for future discovery and reflection. It serves as a snapshot of the present, intended to be opened and examined by people in the future, often with the aim of providing insights into our life experiences from the past.

One consideration has been regarding how long a time span before the capsule should be opened. The longer it is sealed, the more difficult it can be to choose items to be included. A span of 100 years is often a popular choice, however, previous experience has proved choosing a shorter time such as 50 years allows some of the original participants to experience the opening, and for the items included to bring back memories. As such, it is planned for the capsule to be opened in the year 2075.

It is planned to collect a number of appropriate items to include within the time capsule that will provide a view of what life was like in 2025, with an emphasis on our local community, parish life and St George's Church.

If you wish to include any items, please discuss with me. It is hoped as many appropriate items offered will be included, but space will be limited, and items will need to be suitable to avoid deterioration or damage over the next 50 years.

Safeguarding Sunday offers space for honest conversation and learning, helping us to grow into communities of care, transparency, and trust.

Safeguarding is everyone's responsibility. Together, we can create environments where all feel valued, respected, and safe.

Our vision is for a world where every child and adult can feel, and be, safe. It's a big vision, and we can't do it alone. Through this campaign we hope to inspire you, and our church, to take part, and talk about safeguarding. Safeguarding Sunday is an opportunity to show your community that you take safeguarding seriously as an outworking of your faith in a just and loving God.

Thank you for your support with this campaign. It's an opportunity to raise awareness of safeguarding, encourage volunteers to step forward and most importantly, whole congregations are learning that safeguarding is everyone's responsibility, which in turn creates safer

places for all.

The History Page November 2025

The account of the first public service at St George's in October's issue, completes our month- by-month story of the church's birth. Despite the first public service being held at St George's chapel of ease in October 1825, the early years of the church's existence were not easy. Any additions to the basic shell of the building had to be found by the church rate payers or donors. There was no organ until 1837. The clerk doubled as a cleaner. Pew rents, for the remuneration of the minister, did not yield as much as was expected, largely because not all the pews were let. Fundamentally, the hope that the availability of some two thousand seats would attract many more to Church was wishful thinking. Chorley contained a population of more than 7,000 but around 2,000 of these were Catholics and another 1,000 committed Protestant Dissenters. The very young and the infirm could not attend.

The creation of District powers in 1835, allowing baptism, marriage and funeral services at St George's, was a boost. Then in 1856 it gained full parish status, the minister John Stock becoming the first vicar. His bible is still held in the archive. However, the near complete filling of the pews took another forty years and was due to two factors: the vast increase in the numbers of houses in the parish due to the selling off of the Gillibrand estate and the

dedicated work of the schoolmaster Thomas Brown in creating a large cohort of young men identifying with the Church.

Next year's issues may well see us look at Thomas Brown in more detail. For now, here is our one image of John Stock, the first vicar.
