
Did you spot the fabulous flower pot people made by our Uniformed Groups for the Harvest Services?

REVEREND'S REFLECTIONS



As the month begins, we hold in our hearts the tender memories of All Souls' Day. Although our All Souls' Service has already taken place at St Paul's, it was a truly moving occasion, beautifully led by Canon Veronica. We gave thanks for those we love but see no longer, and for the assurance that they rest in the eternal love of God. It is always a poignant moment in the life of our church family — a reminder that we are surrounded by "a great cloud of witnesses" who have walked this path before us.

Shortly afterwards, we turn our hearts and minds to Remembrance Sunday on 9th

November, when we gather once again — young and old together — to honour those who have given their lives in service of others.

Our All Age Service, with the participation of our uniformed groups, will help us reflect not only on the cost of war, but also on the call to live as people of peace in our own generation. The act of remembrance is never merely looking back; it is also a promise to live differently because of what we have learned.

Then, as the leaves fall and the days shorten, the rhythm of the Church year draws us onward to **Advent Sunday** — which this year falls on 30th November. Advent is a season of waiting and of promise, of holy anticipation as we look forward to the coming of Christ — both at Christmas and in the fullness of God's kingdom.



Our 10.30 am Advent Communion will give us space to reflect not only on that divine promise, but also on our own response to it.

Advent invites us to consider how we give of ourselves — our talents, our time, and our treasure — in gratitude for all that God has already given us through the gift of his Son. May this month of remembrance and expectation deepen our faith, strengthen our hope, and renew our love, as together we journey towards the light that no darkness can overcome.

ARCHBISHOPOF CANTERBURY

Canon Veronica shares an article from The Observer on the appointment of the new Archbishop of Canterbury:

She is an answer to the prayers of all those who long for change in society

She has said she feels both peaceful, and at the same time excited. I can't believe that she isn't daunted too. Sarah Mullally, the first woman to be appointed archbishop of Canterbury, is a trained midwife, has worked as a cancer nurse and has already exercised senior leadership in not one but two national institutions, overseeing complex and diverse communities in the NHS as chief nurse and in the Church of England as bishop of London.



For "diverse" read "polarised" – within the church, anyway. Theologically, archbishops are required to be what the church calls "instruments of unity".

She has much experience of leading in this way, having been one of the female leaders who has most closely supported what the Church of England has decided are "five guiding principles" governing the relationships between ordained women such as her and the priests or bishops who do not accept that women can be ordained at all.

She holds to the Church of England's traditional teaching about marriage while at the same time welcoming the prayers for couples in same-sex relationships as "a moment of hope for the church".

The 63-year-old is a person who understands the levers and cogs of a historic institution such as the Church of England or a national institution such as the NHS. She is the first archbishop of Canterbury for a generation who has already had experience of the House of Lords, and her speeches on assisted dying have been informed by her life as a medical professional as well as a religious leader.

But she takes up her role at a time when the church, in common with many historic institutions or areas of public life – including the BBC, the NHS, the judiciary, banks, political parties, police and the armed services – all continue to face, to varying degrees, an erosion of trust in their work and leaders.

When women take up historic roles previously unavailable to them, there is often a disproportionate level of both opprobrium and expectation. The appointment of the first woman as the leader of the global Anglican communion will by itself neither destroy nor save a church subject to the same deep and persistent challenges that face other cultural, religious and political organisations in a world more conflicted and siloed than ever before.

But in this situation, the church has a unique vocation as articulated by one of the new archbishop's predecessors, William Temple, who believed that the church is the only institution in society that exists for the benefit of the people who do not belong to it.

The real and enduring impact of Anglican churches is felt in villages, towns and cities across the UK, across the world, where people gather to pray, run food banks, host AA meetings, reach isolated elderly people, invite parents and toddlers to play, and offer shelter for people who are hungry or homeless.

The challenge for the established church, praying for every soul, not just those who come to Sunday services, is to get our doors open, keep them open, welcome everyone without exception and never allow the church to become a cosy club of the already initiated.

To that end, our trailblazing archbishop is a sign of hope for all who long for change in society that things don't have to be as they are.

The roof appeal fund total is: £47,716.43 (end October 2025)

A reminder of what our thoughts for 'first phase' of the project are:

- · Re-roof the upper and lower rooves of the church, including modifications to the guttering to prevent water getting into the building in the future
 - · Replace and re-plaster all internal ceilings panels
 - · Re-plaster internal walls where needed
 - · Redecorate the building internally
 - · Re-light the building with energy efficient lighting
 - · Modernise the sound and media system
 - · Reheat the building in an energy efficient way
 - · Repair the spire where issues are arising

Matt, Nick and Vicar Simon had a positive meeting recently with Architect Ed Kepzyck and Sheena Wilson (Diocesan Buildings Advisor) about how to really begin to move the project on. Lots of discussion was had around what stages we need to complete to feel ready to move to the next stage. From the meeting we are going to do the following:

- Create a project brief (what do we want and why)
- Gain PCC approval for a Feasibility Study for the project to be completed by the Architect. APPROVED BY PCC IN JULY 2025.
- Arrange for Quinquennial Inspection to take place to aid the study. This is taking place on 25 November.
- Re-meet once completed and look to send the study to the Diocesan Advisory Committee (DAC) for first thoughts and then wider sharing to all stakeholders.

The PCC have approved the undertaking of a Feasibility Study by the Architects, Butress of Manchester. This is a costly piece of work (Approx £13,000) but a vitally important part of any project to be completed. The study will look at what we want, consultations completed, a survey of the building (above and beyond the Quinquennial inspection) options of project style including re-ordering. It is looking likely that this is something that we will have to consider extremely seriously to ensure the future of the building, ensuring worship space remains the focus but with a flexible community space to help us become a beacon of light in our community.

If anyone wishes to have a look an example study then please do ask and we will ne happy to show you.

The study will take 2-3 months to complete from start date and we anticipate the start to be happening soon.

This is really an exciting time for St Paul's as we move towards the biggest refurbishment of the building in it's 180 year history and look to secure the future of the church and have a legacy to pass on to future generations. We are both genuinely excited by the opportunities that await us.



Please do raise any questions with us (Matt, Nick, Vicar Simon) as we want to ensure everyone has the opportunity to have their say and share their feelings.

Family History Research

Would you like to know more about your UK ancestors?



How I can help you:

If your ancestors lived in England and Wales, I can carry out an online search. This will usually trace families back to the late 18th century, although this can be tricky for very common surnames. Some online records go back further.

Searching in Ireland, Northern Ireland, Scotland, Isle of Man or the Channel Islands will usually incur additional costs, and records are not so readily available.

Health Warning:

If you would be offended to find examples of ILLEGITIMACY, INSANITY or CRIMINALITY in your family, then do not search for your ancestors or cousins. These phenomena can be found in practically ALL families!

(But it can be quite interesting!)

- Tell me as much as possible about your parents and grandparents.
- (If you have any birth or marriage certificates it would be helpful if I could see them.)
- I will do the research and produce a report and a family tree at no charge to you.

It was lovely to welcome Kasia, (wife of Piotr, our Cub Leader) to hold a photoshoot for families in the church recently.



BUILDINGS UPDATE



The recent rain found its way in in the usual places when the wind is in a certain direction! Bailey Steeplejacks are arranging to come and look at the tower and see if they can assist with the issue of the water coming in. In the recent windy weather (Storm Amy) some masonry was dislodged outside and fell over the vestry doors. We are monitoring this closely.

An issue of the rain coming into the tower has meant that the Bell Rope gets wet and as such the rope has frayed meaning that we cannot ring the bell at the moment. We will look to a temporary repair to the rope so that we can ring it.

We continue to monitor the plaster work in some parts and you may have noticed a few pews roped off. This is due to damaged plaster that has dried out and gone powdery falling. We are looking at what remedial work we can do to remedy this. Please bear with us.

We are still awaiting Bailey Steeplejacks to come along with their big ladders to replace some of the upper level lightbulbs for us. We are hopeful that they will complete this when they come to do some remedial work on the lightning conductor that failed a recent inspection. The necessary work to repair the conductors is booked in.

Electrical testing has been completed and there is some remedial work to be completed which is in hand with the contractors.

PAT Testing has also been completed. Lots of electrical items that failed the test have been disposed of. It is very important that nothing electrical is brought from home to be 'donated' to church now that we have the testing in place. **PLEASE DO NOT THINK CHURCH WILL HAVE IT!** We have to ensure its electrical safety and then if we can't use it we then have to dispose of it. The office will be instructed not to take anything electrical unless prior discussion has taken place with us first.

Services of the church boiler and centre boiler have been completed.

We also have had a visit from Ecclesiastical Insurance conducting an inspection. We await the report from this but suspect there are a few areas that will need some reviewing and work completing.

We need to look into doing some work on the Louvres of the south side of the church as these have become incredibly dislodged and will almost certainly be letting rain water in. We have been in contact with a contractor who could help and they are fully booked up until early 2026! We are going to ask for a quotation so we can have an idea of cost.

The Quinquennial inspection of the church has been arranged for 25th November with the architects.

Thanks to everyone who helps in anyway with the upkeep of the church and Parish Centre.

RAMBLINGS OF A READER

As we are moving quickly to the end of the year, my mind is thinking back to all we have done during the past twelve months; people we have met and places we have visited and holidays we have been on, which started me thinking of my childhood and all the holidays I had been on with my Dad and sister, one holiday in particular comes to mind.

My Dad's cousin Doris, along with her parents were over from Canada, and they came on holiday with us to Folkestone where we were staying for two weeks. I don't remember much of that holiday except one exciting trip my sister, Dad, his cousin and myself did, we went on a day trip to France!

My sister and I were so excited that we were going to a foreign country! But the first thing we had to do was go to the post office to get a day passport. Yes such things did exist in the late 50's. Passport in hand, the day arrived and we set off very early to get to the port and to board the ferry. I don't remember much of the ferry crossing, but I remember walking off the ferry along a road to get on a coach. By the roadside was a stall selling very large fresh peaches. Dad bought one for my sister and I to share,

> we had never had a fresh peach before; tinned yes, but not fresh. I have loved fresh peaches ever since, but not the furry skin!

I don't remember a lot about the day but I do remember our final destination before we

came home, and the real reason Dad wanted to do the trip was for the war grave cemetery at Dunkirk.

Before the second World War, my Dad learnt to play the accordion and joined an accordion band.

Winister Fran Hiles and Apparently, they were very popular around the Manchester area and played in many venues. When the war started my Dad was too young to join up but some of the band including their band leader was called up. The group continued for a while, but as more and more were called up the band finally closed. Dad knew that his band leader, who's name I can't remember, was killed at Dunkirk and he wanted to see if he could find his name on the monument, which he actually did. The only time I had seen my Dad with tears in his eyes.

Since that first visit to a war cemetery, I have been to others including Vimmy Ridge the Canadian National Memorial for those who lost their lives in the 1st world war. Tyne Cot the largest Commonwealth war cemetery near Passchendaele in Belgium and the Menin Gate in Ypres.

Each time I am horrified by the rows and rows and rows and rows of headstones, and the list of names. Each one is moving in its own way, but it always makes me sad at the loss of so many young lives, and the phrase that is sometimes used, that we won the war, grates on me, no one wins a war, everyone loses in one way or another.





That doesn't mean we should never forget, and as Armistice Day and Remembrance Sunday comes around, it's even more important that we remember the sacrifices of so many. I believe our world is in a very scary place at the moment, where leaders of many of the countries of the world seem to be on a power surge to prove they are bigger and better than others.

I have been asked on a number of occasions how I can believe in a God of love and peace when such horrible things are going on in our world and to be honest, I sometimes find it hard to answer, and many times I have been angry at God and cried out to him why. But I do believe one day the words written in Isaiah will come true. 'Wolves and sheep will live together in peace' Isaiah 11:6 'He will settle disputes among the nations, They will hammer their swords into ploughs and their spears into pruning knives. Nations will never again go to war, never prepare for battle again.' Isaiah 2:4 I hope and pray it will be soon. Love Fran. X

Cranmer **Awards** Chester

ARCHBISHOP CRANMER AWARDS FOR YOUNG PEOPLE AGED 11 - 18 AT CHESTER CATHEDRAL

Young people aged 11 - 18, from the Diocese are invited to take part in this year's Archbishop Cranmer Awards for the Diocese of Chester.

The competition is one in which young people are invited to read aloud short sections from the Book of Common Prayer.

The aims of the competition are to introduce young people to the beautiful devotional language of the Prayer Book and to encourage the skills of reading aloud with fluency, enjoyment, expression and confidence.

The young people, accompanied by their sponsors and families compete in two age groups, and the winner of each group is invited to represent Chester at the National Final, which will be held early in 2026 at Hampton Court Palace.

As in previous years there will be a distinguished panel of judges for the local heat, including the High Sheriff of Cheshire.


