From the Vicarage . . .

As we come to the close of another year, we once again find ourselves on the familiar and beautiful road of Advent. It is a season that gently invites us to pause, to breathe, and to notice the longing in our hearts for God's renewing presence. I've planned this year's Advent Group around the traditional themes of the Advent Candles—Hope, Peace, Joy, and Love. This will offer space for conversation, prayer, and fellowship, reminding us that God's light grows steadily among us as we prepare to welcome Christ once more. Even in a world full of uncertainty, Advent gently teaches us that the light shines in the darkness, and the darkness does not overcome it.

For many, **Christmas** is a season of warmth, welcome, and celebration—of gathering with family and friends, exchanging gifts, and remembering the child born in Bethlehem. Yet Christmas is also a time that can sharpen the edges of loneliness or grief. Memories can become heavy; pressures and expectations can feel overwhelming; some may find the season difficult for reasons known only to them. As a church family, we hold all these experiences tenderly. No one should feel alone at Christmas. Our **Pastoral Care Team**—who share more about their ministry later in this magazine—continue to offer support, prayer, companionship, and practical help. We can all encourage someone else who may need a word of comfort or a friendly presence.

I warmly encourage you to join us for **Holy Communion on Christmas Eve and Christmas Day**. There is something profoundly beautiful about receiving Communion at Christmas, surrounded by candlelight and the familiar words of the liturgy: a reminder that God comes close.

As the Christmas season draws to an end, we then turn our attention to the great feast of **Epiphany on 4th January**, celebrating the visit of the Magi. Moving out of Bethlehem, Epiphany reminds us that the good news of Christ is for all people, in every place, and that God's light draws us—like the wise men.

The following Sunday, 11th January, brings the Baptism of Christ, which is also Plough Sunday. Later in the month, is the Week of Prayer for Christian Unity. It As we pray for reconciliation, shared mission, and

deeper fellowship throughout the global Church we also pray for that continued unity among our six church communities. As we look ahead to 2026, let's do so with gratitude and with hope for how God will continue to shape us as one body in Christ.

As January unfolds, don't be surprised to feel God's renewed call on your life. The diocese is offering a range of short courses early in the year—excellent opportunities to deepen faith, explore new topics, reflect prayerfully, or connect with others from across the wider church. Listen out for those gentle nudges of the Holy Spirit urging you into the fullness of what God has made you for. I am certainly looking forward to my first Christmas with you, and beginning a new year together.

Christ, who by his incarnation gathered into one all things earthly and heavenly, fill you with his joy and peace; and the blessing of God almighty, the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit, be among you and remain with you always. Amen.



Pastoral Care News for the South Tamar Mission Community

Since the arrival of Rev Gill, the Pastoral Care Team (linked to the local churches) is becoming much more focused on the wider needs of our parishioners and those people who can no longer physically get to church for whatever reason . Already spiritual support is regularly offered at Venn House and Camplehaye Residential Homes, increasingly we are finding that illness and age related mobility are preventing people living in their own homes, from being able to attend church services.

If you, or a member of your family would like to attend church but cannot get there, do let us know and it may be possible for us to provide a solution (giving a lift etc).

Alternatively we have a small team of people, male and female, who would be happy to come and visit you at your home. This would involve a member of the pastoral care team coming to your home, initially for a chat whilst we get to know each other, and then providing for you whatever you may feel you need. it could be a chance to read the Bible together, listen to favourite passages, say a prayer together, listen to or sing a favourite hymn and even receive Holy Communion at home if you should so wish. Of course you may feel that you don't wish for any of those things but simply a chance to have a cup of tea together and a chat about life in general!

Anyone who comes to visit you will always have been approved by Rev Gill, and will be one of our trained pastoral care team members. All pastoral care team members have successfully completed their safeguarding training and have their DBS certificates. Two of our team are Anna Chaplains who have been trained and commissioned to do this support work by our Bishop.

Thanks Annie! If anyone is interested from the other angle, the Diocese happens to be offering a short GROW course in March for people undertaking (or considering undertaking) pastoral care in their churches or communities.

This course covers the basics of why and how we care, the practicalities of this work, operating in a team and looking after yourself. I know that many of our pastoral team have done the more detailed Anna Chaplaincy or Anna Friends course—this is probably from a slightly different angle but might be useful for some.

A CHILD'S FOOTSTEPS TO FAITH

Seeking the Saviour (Matthew 2:1-12)

If we were planning to go visit someone in another town, we might first ask someone who knew how to get there to give us directions. They might give us some general directions and suggest the best roads to take. Another thing we might do is look at a map or use our Satnav to show us exactly how to get where we want to go.

After Jesus was born, some wise men, also called Magi, saw a star in the sky which they believed announced the birth of a king. They travelled to Jerusalem and began to ask, "Where is the new -born king of the Jews? We saw his star as it rose, and we have come to worship him."

Herod heard about the Magi and their search for a king and he was deeply disturbed. So Herod called for a private meeting with the wise men and said to them, "Go to Bethlehem and search carefully for the child. And when you find him, come back and tell me so that I can go and worship him, too!"


As you know, the wise men did not have a map to guide them to Bethlehem, but they had something even better — they had a star to guide them. So the wise men followed information that the priests had given to Herod and the star that God had given to guide them and it led them



right to Jesus. When they found him, they gave him gifts and bowed down and worshiped him. (Matthew 2:1-12)

NATURE NOTES BY BLUEBELL

'Let choirs make frosty nights sing, let them tell stories of shepherds

caring for sheep, a stable, a donkey, a star in the east, while you remember

the road to the church in the woods. the battened door, timber trusses."

from "Sing" (The River) by Jane Clarke 2015

Bluebell has seen a huge flock (known collectively as 'a deceit') of lapwings on Gibbet Hill near Brentor. They are moving in towards the coast in the West from bad weather in Eastern Europe.

There must have been nearly a thousand of them, swirling about showing their pale, white breasts and underwings against the dark sky when they turned.



They gather in these huge numbers in winter, though there are many fewer than there used to be.

The 'deceit' collective comes from the Lapwing parents' tactics when protecting their shallow ground nests and young. When danger approaches they fly near, feigning injury or pretending to defend a false nest site at a safe distance away from the real one, to lure the predator away.

There is a sudden glow in the woods, where sunlight lies on golden beech leaves, the last on a young tree, reflected in a puddle on the track.

A clump of gold bracken catches the light.


The leaves usually fall from the canopy before those on young trees and low branches.

Trees withdraw the valuable chemicals and minerals in green leaves back into the branches, then seal off the leaf by a process called 'abscission'.

This process severs the leaf's attachment to the tree, which is why leaves fall in autumn, when days grow shorter. (How to Read a Tree by Tristan Gooley; 2023).

The Tawny Owls (as seen on the front cover) call at dusk, and also before dawn.

Bluebell has seen a little Devil's coach-horse. It bravely threatened her by raising its tail like a scorpion and opening its jaws. Bluebell caught the little black beetle and took it into the dark garden to scuttle away and hide under wet fallen leaves.


Be Alert for Asian hornets!

Asian or yellow-legged hornets (scientific name *Vespa velutina*) were accidentally introduced into France in around 2004. Now they have spread through much of Western Europe. They are serious predators of honey bees, and also attack bumblebees, solitary bees and other insects.

They defend their nests aggressively and will attack anyone who gets too close: **never approach a nest**. Since 2016, there have been sightings of the Asian hornet in the UK, and a few nests have been found.

Asian hornets are generally smaller (25-30 mm head to tail) than our native hornet, the European hornet (*Vespa crabro*), which is 30-35 mm head to tail (but can seem much bigger!). They are easy to distinguish because Asian hornets are mostly dark brown/black, with yellow 'socks' and an orange-yellow band near the tail. Native hornets look like very large wasps, with brown legs and bright yellow and black/brown markings. Native hornets fly both night and day, while Asian hornets fly only during the day.

GARDEN NOTES BY DOUG



Well, the water butts floweth over!

Bonfire Night gone and Christmas is a-coming.

Then we can settle down with Spring: get ready is

Then we can settle down with Spring; get ready to welcome the daffodils.

I had the last of the tomatoes in the greenhouse in early November. There is still some kale, some chard and a few lettuce in there. Mustn't grumble. But, one thing to grumble about is Honey Fungus.

We had a Cedar tree which in recent years has been a little surrounded by the fruits, or mushrooms, of Honey Fungus. It lost its bright green colour, got rather dull, then very soon after, was dead. Honey Fungus may not have been fully responsible; it may have just stepped in and taken advantage of the poor condition. Honey fungus is very difficult, or impossible, to manage. There is no chemical treatment and even if you think there are very few mushrooms, there could be - or will be - a lot of activity under ground which you

can't see and also under the bark around the base of a tree.



The RHS has a lot of information on its website. This photograph is from that site and shows the characteristics of the mushrooms.

Lots of fungi are to be admired and celebrated. Most are harmless and beneficial to the garden and us humans too.

Clearing up and getting ready for next year is a job that we should all be pursuing. I have had

more success with dahlias in pots than in the beds due to the slugs.

I have now got to dry store those tubers and repot them in the spring in some fresh potting compost - then hope the slugs don't find them.

I also need to restore some of the beds in the 'so called' kitchen garden area. The wood boards have rotted and the soil needs a good digging over and some compost and nutrients adding.

Putting out some battery operated LED string lights is a good idea. Then you can see there is still a garden out there when it has gone dark so early.

Rhododendron buds are already here. Spring is coming. Hang on and enjoy thinking how your garden will delight you.

The discovery that Henry is a pharmacist who believes he has found the female viagra pill makes Bud try and spike the girls drinks so he can [insert your imagination!].



They have a complete personality change as they appear to be going through the menopause!


The audience were in hysterics, every line was a laugh, the ladies got their own back. Bud the Stud is now Bud the Dud.


