#### Minister's Letter

As Advent begins, the world around us seems to hurry toward Christmas — shops glitter with lights, carols echo in the streets, and plans are made for celebration. Yet the Church invites us into something different: not haste, but stillness. Not noise, but quiet expectation. Advent is a season of waiting — a sacred pause — where we prepare not just for a day, but for an encounter with the living God.

To prepare for Christmas, in the Christian sense, is to prepare the heart. It is to make space for the Christ who comes to us in humility and love. The One born in a stable seeks to be born again within us — not in grand display, but in the quiet corners of our lives, where faith, hope, and love take root.

This preparation is not about perfection, but about openness. It might mean setting aside a few moments each day to sit in prayerful silence, to light a candle, to read the Scriptures, or simply to breathe and remember that God is near. It might mean offering forgiveness, sharing kindness, or carrying someone else's burden. In these small acts, Christ's light begins to shine through us.

Advent reminds us that the greatest gift we can offer God is ourselves — our time, our trust, our willingness to let His love shape our days. As we journey through this holy season, may we learn again to wait with hope, to prepare with joy, and to welcome with wonder the One who comes to dwell among us.

#### Ann Bramley's memories of Jacky Smith

Anita Eckersley and Kathleen Cooke each gave their eulogy and tribute to Jacky at her funeral, but here I write my own memories and those of we Manthorpians.

I start with a story she told me of her time in Russia and how she was asked to project manage the removal of an old building (a church?) to a new location. It was too fragile to be dismantled and rebuilt. Jacky took up the challenge to lift up the entire structure and move it to the new site. Did she do it? Yes, she did.

On another occasion the airliner in which she had travelled to Russia developed a fault once it had landed. The passengers would have been stranded until a replacement was flown in. Jacky strolled up and offered a doubting crew her help. Did she fix it? Yes she did. Eventually, having had enough Kirov and Bolshoi ballets and being followed around by the KGB, she came home.

Fate decreed that two like-minded people - one in a red convertible and one in a Vintage Fiat teamed up, got married and moved to Manthorpe.

We would enjoy hearing of their travels to car rallies all over Europe. Jacky and Ian would often be guests of the Fiat family and there is a newspaper cutting of them leaving a procession in Paris down the Champs Elysée.

lan encouraged Jacky to put her name forward for the Town Council. Once successful she was part of the initiative for Grantham to have a new cinema. She was also successful, after a plea by Ann Bramley on behalf of her late father Cliff Swallows, in placing a memorial to the men of Manthorpe who fought in WW II in the church.

The kitchen would be busy as we baked cakes, sausage rolls, made 100s of sandwiches for village events. A bi-annual Flower Festival was blessed by Jacky's gift for flower arranging. This she would continue weekly with the church flower team. Our Christmas Tree festival alternated with the flowers.

She and Ian enjoyed Open Gardens weekend, Scarecrow weekend, Red Cross weekend. The last photograph I took of Jacky was of her joining in the Easter Monday races now at the Manor House.

The best highlight of her year would be if her charming Philip came over from Canada. We saw how much she adored her brother.

The death of Ian was devastating: I don't think she ever recovered.

My annual contribution would be to help man Jacky's poppy stall at Asda when she would wear lan's medals.

She squeezed in a year as Chairman of Manthorpe WI. and who can forget when, after our Christmas party, we would set off very, very late to startle motorists who stopped to allow a group of ladies to trundle a fully decorated Christmas tree across Manthorpe Road and disappear into the darkness of the churchyard.

We were all very proud to have the Mayor of Grantham as our neighbour and enjoyed our invitations to many of her Mayoral events. How proud Ian would have been.


