Posada 2025

Advent is a special time in the church calendar when we prepare for the coming of Jesus. It is a period for us in the church to reflect and wait. Our annual Posada (Spanish for 'inn') begins on Advent Sunday on 30th November. During the Posada our figures of Mary and Joseph stay with a different host household each night before moving on and eventually returning to church for the Crib Service on Christmas Eve. Each host takes them to the next host but for those with mobility issues we can make arrangements for someone to collect the figures from you. We minister to one another at the handover with some very simple prayers that are already written down for you to say together. The Posada is open to all ages, and it offers an opportunity to include

Lest we forget

Last Sunday morning the Remembrance service took place as usual by the memorial gates in the park, and was attended by about 135 people with a very wide age range. The weather was dry and mild. David Pickup spoke about how this community responded to the Second World War and how the words of Jesus undergird our commitment to peace. Lee Buckingham played the trumpet fanfares of the Last Post and Reveille, with two minutes silence between. Stone choir members led the singing of hymns of remembrance. In addition to four wreaths laid to remember those who gave their lives in the two great wars, there was an array of poppies made by church members in front of the memorial gates, and a display of poppies made by the children of Joyfull Juniors.

In Bishopstone the Act of Remembrance was led by Revd Tim Harper and 40 people were in attendance. Then on 11th November a party of children and staff from the school, as well as several villagers, came to the Memorial Gates and observed the two minutes silence as part of their own act of Remembrance.

¹⁶ Once when we were going to the place of prayer, we were met by a female slave who had a spirit by which she predicted the future. She earned a great deal of money for her owners by fortune-telling. ¹⁷ She followed Paul and the rest of us, shouting, "These men are servants of the Most High God, who are telling you the way to be saved." 18 She kept this up for many days. Finally Paul became so annoyed that he turned around and said to the spirit, "In the name of Jesus Christ I command you to come out of her!" At that moment the spirit left her.

¹⁹ When her owners realized that their hope of making money was gone, they seized Paul and Silas and dragged them into the marketplace to face the authorities. ²⁰ They brought them before the magistrates and said, "These men are Jews, and are throwing our city into an uproar ²¹ by advocating customs unlawful for us Romans to accept or practice."

²² The crowd joined in the attack against Paul and Silas, and the magistrates ordered them to be stripped and beaten with rods. ²³ After they had been severely flogged, they were thrown into prison, and the jailer was commanded to guard them carefully. ²⁴ When he received these orders, he put them in the inner cell and fastened their feet in the stocks.

²⁵ About midnight Paul and Silas were praying and singing hymns to God, and the other prisoners were listening to them. ²⁶ Suddenly there was such a violent earthquake that the foundations of the prison were shaken. At once all the prison doors flew open, and everyone's chains came loose. ²⁷ The jailer woke up, and when he saw the prison doors open, he drew his sword and was about to kill himself because he thought the prisoners had escaped. ²⁸ But Paul shouted, "Don't harm yourself! We are all here!"

²⁹ The jailer called for lights, rushed in and fell trembling before Paul and Silas. ³⁰ He then brought them out and asked, "Sirs, what must I do to be saved?"

³¹ They replied, "Believe in the Lord Jesus, and you will be saved—you and your household." 32 Then they spoke the word of the Lord to him and to all the others in his house. ³³ At that hour of the night the jailer took them and washed their wounds; then immediately he and all his household were baptised. ³⁴ The jailer brought them into his house and set a meal before them; he was filled with joy because he had come to believe in God—he and his whole household.

³⁵ When it was daylight, the magistrates sent their officers to the jailer with the order: "Release those men." ³⁶ The jailer told Paul, "The magistrates have ordered that you and Silas be released. Now you can leave. Go in peace."

³⁷ But Paul said to the officers: "They beat us publicly without a trial, even though we are Roman citizens, and threw us into prison. And now do they want to get rid of us quietly? No! Let them come themselves and escort us out."38 The officers reported this to the magistrates, and when they heard that Paul and Silas were Roman citizens, they were alarmed.
