"The Greatest Gift: A Season of Renewal"

December and January are months filled with noise, light, and movement. The shops are busy, our calendars are crowded, and the days seem to rush past in a blur of preparation and celebration. Yet amid the glitter and bustle of the season, Christians are called to something deeper, to prepare our hearts for the true gift of Christmas, and to enter the new year with a renewed sense of hope and purpose.

May we receive that gift with joy, and may our lives reflect it in kindness, service, and faith throughout the year ahead.

This month we meet Mark Salter.

Age: 76

Marital status and family:

Married to Phil 53 years 3; grown up children; 6 grandchildren and 2 great grandchildren.

Could you please explain your role in the church?

I am a Licensed Lay Minister with PTO (Permission to Officiate) I preach or teach about once a month. I am the Parish Safeguarding Officer. I am also a Lay Member of the Chatham and Rochester Deanery Synod as a representative for the Parish.

Otherwise: general dogs body.

Where are you from?

Born in Rochester, Kent

What did you want to be as a child? A Missionary, believe it or not.

Could you share any precious childhood memories with us?

At primary school I was a very naughty boy. As my father was the Group Scout Leader, I was brought up to be a cub, scout, senior scout and eventually a Queen's scout. I also attended a free church youth group (Open Brethren) as a Covenanter and made a commitment to Christ at the age of I I at a Billy Graham film.

What is your favourite food? Anything I cook.

What do you watch on television? The News, Quiz programmes, documentaries *Call the Midwife*.

What music do you listen to?

Anything by Bob Dylan, Bruce Springsteen, Folk Music, Paul Simon. Martin Joseph. Phil has also educated me to appreciate some classical music

I was a specialist PE teacher then primary teacher finally Head teacher. I am retired but still love teaching the Scriptures.

I joined St Justus, in the early 80's, All Saints with St Paul's in the late 80's, Holy Family at Gravesend in the late 90's. Then came to Holy Trinity South Chatham in 2012.

Do you have a favourite hymn?

No there are so many but if pressed: There is a Redeemer... Why? because it says so much in 3 short verses. It's easy to learn and sing anywhere.

Do you have a favourite Bible reading? No except perhaps the
book of Romans, because it reveals the
struggles the Apostle Paul had and how
he overcame in Christ by the power of
the Holy Spirit.

What do you draw from spiritually? Obviously from Scripture, but also reading Richard Rohr, Brian McClaren, Rob Bell, Henri Nouwen, Walter Brueggermann, Rev. Sam Wells and also walking in the countryside and listening to people.

Have you ever had a profound spiritual experience? Yes, many. The most profound was being made alive to the Holy Spirit and filled, sometimes referred to as 'Baptism in the Spirit' at the age of 20.

Where do you see yourself in ten years time? Now that is quite a question! A bit slower, less hyperactive, hopefully growing in grace, if I'm still here!

Is there anything else you would like to tell us that not many people know about you? I still hold the school record and My college record for high jump.

What are your hobbies?

Photography from time to time and I own a Land Rover enough said!

Reading & Praying: December 2025 & January 2026!

From Advent 2025 we begin a new liturgical adventure! For many years in the Parish we have unswervingly followed the Revised Common Lectionary with its three-yearly cycle of readings from the Gospels of Matthew, Mark and Luke plus accompanying texts. This practice has served us well, but I am always left wondering about the passages in the Bible that get left out.

Our Service Leaders, Preachers and Clergy have therefore decided on an experiment. From this Advent onwards, we will be following an alternative lectionary; one prepared by Wilda C. Gaffrey, Hebrew Biblical Scholar and Episcopal Priest. It is titled 'A Women's Lectionary for the Whole Church' and attempts to recover the voices and stories of women and those on the margins of the Bible that the Revised Common Lectionary often misses out. Gaffrey's lectionary also comes with a fresh translations from the Hebrew and Greek which you may hear preachers refer to from time to time.

Each week we will continue to have two readings during Sunday worship as has been our custom, but I hope God leads us into new territory as we listen to parts of the Bible that perhaps we've never heard before. Gaffrey notes:

'... our Daily Bread...'

'Most simply, these translations seek to offer and extend the embrace of the scriptures to all who read and hear that they might see and hear themselves in them and be spoken to by them. Similarly, taking seriously that we are all created in the image of God, these translations seek to display a God in whose Image we see ourselves reflected and reflecting.' (Wilda C. Gaffrey, A Women's Lectionary for the Whole Church,' p. xv.
