

The Heart of the Matter

My thoughts this month come whilst I am undertaking my placement with a parish in Taunton; this is something all curates undertake in their final year as part of their ongoing training. As you look to discern where your future may take you, you are encouraged to find a placement in a context different from where you currently are and as I was planning for this I reflected on the fact that I had experienced a variety of contexts prior to ordination, both in style of worship and in location. However, I have come to appreciate, now that I am ordained, both these things take on a different weight of relevance particularly in terms of how things are done and what they mean to different people. I realise too that as I have grown in confidence in the rural context, in a middle of the road tradition, I have come to appreciate my ministry could benefit more from exploring those areas both of tradition and location which appeal to me less.

The travelling to and from Taunton has given plenty of time to ponder on both location and tradition of a centre of worship, and have led me to consider not only what is important to me but why it is, which is something I think we still all at times take the time to do, but also to ponder on how as a church leader that impacts on the communities and congregations that we serve.

One thing I have found is that although the location is quite different, at the heart of that are the people, and it is the people that matter. I cannot with any honesty say I would prefer to live there than where I do, but it is the place those I have met call home and where they feel they belong. It is these people that make up the worshipping community that I have been made to feel welcome at. A worshipping community that does things in a slightly different way to what we are used to here but in some respects the way they do things is the icing on their cake, just as our way of doing things may be the icing on our cake. It works for them at this time; they have not always done things exactly the same and as time goes by maybe it will change again. The same may be true for our parishes here - we do things the way we do because it is comfortable for us at this time and in this place, but it may change and we should not be anxious about that but continue to pray and journey together.

As my time in Taunton comes to an end, as I prepare to lead a communion service in a different way to that to which I have become accustomed, I know I will continue to ponder on the experience and wonder about the future.

I do truly appreciate and feel grateful for the opportunities I have to walk alongside others considering what is important to them and finding God at the heart of the experience in the variety of contexts I encounter.

CHARITY OF THE MONTH NOVEMBER 2025 – RED CROSS UKRAINE

Three years of fear and uncertainty in Ukraine

For more than three years people in Ukraine have been living through a nightmare. The conflict, which escalated in February 2022, has affected millions of people, claiming lives and homes.



- 10 million people have been displaced and many are without access to food, water and electricity.
- More than six million have also fled the country, leaving behind everything they've ever known often including their loved ones.
- Homes, hospitals and schools continue to be damaged, forcing further evacuations.

The Ukrainian Red Cross Society has worked around the clock to bring hope and support to all those in need, from distributing food parcels to treating people at Red Cross mobile health units across the country.

Here in the UK, British Red Cross teams have been on hand to provide support, financial assistance and a friendly, safe place for people to turn to while they rebuild their lives.

To date, Red Cross and Red Crescent staff and volunteers have been able to support more than 22 million people impacted by the crisis.

But urgent needs remain. Families have been separated, loved ones lost and schools and hospitals destroyed. These are lasting impacts that will affect people for many years to come.

The situation in Ukraine remains incredibly volatile. We can't be sure what will happen next or where the need will be greatest. But with your help we can be ready to help more of the people who are suffering.

St Dubricius Open Day 2025

When I thought up the theme Hatched, Matched and Dispatched for this year's Open Day it seemed like a good idea. Of course, the church has over the centuries been the venue for thousands of family events — baptisms, weddings and funerals — so there should be so much material to share. And indeed, families from around the village approached me with photos,



stories, christening gowns and more to share with all those who would be attending on the day. Then I had to plan the talks. Baptisms and weddings were easy. But funerals? Hhhmm? That would be a more difficult subject to tackle. I wondered if I had picked a stupid topic instead of a good idea.



For any of you who haven't been to an Open Day at St Dubricius Church in recent years, the day comprises of entertainment – firstly music: this year there were superb lullabies and music for children and happy days from Gibby and Ruth; Friends in Harmony sang and Daphne organised a wedding themed singalong; and Stephen finished off with a rousing anthem on the organ. Secondly demonstrations: Nick and Rachel with other bell-ringers gave everyone the opportunity to try bell-ringing; Kim demonstrated her skills at flower arranging and

encouraged us to have a go at home. Then there were the talks...

Rev Ann and I did a double header about Elizabeth Courtenay, the lady in the Harington Memorial, who spent much of her adult life in Porlock. We spoke about her family, the men she loved and her two weddings; one of which was here at St Dubricius church. It is easy to talk about weddings, but what on



earth could be said about funerals that wouldn't upset someone? It was a dodgy path to tread, but one which I had still decided to go down. Fortunately, Councillor Duncan McCanlis, and Funeral Director, Kurt Luty, from Hedley Price came to my rescue.



Duncan's talk was about the ancient churchyard around the church. He touched on the fact that as a 'closed' churchyard it is now the responsibility of the Parish Council to maintain. He spoke about the involvement of the National Park in looking after the 1000+ year old yew tree and the prospect that there are likely to be far more people buried in the churchyard from centuries gone by than we have documented.

Kurt's talk was fascinating as he discussed traditions from the past. The influence of the Victorians and things that continue now and things that no longer apply. For example, when did you last go to a funeral where professional mourners were present? Kurt wore the traditional clothes of a funeral director and brought along his white gloves and top hat reflecting the solemn nature of the occasions




that he oversees. But his talk wasn't solemn, it was funny and informative.

So, to everyone involved in Open Day 2025 I thank you. For the generosity of those sharing their time, talents, memories, memorabilia, music and knowledge. For the kindness of all those who baked cakes and served refreshments. And if you are reading this and came this year to support us, thank you too. If you had a good time, please spread the word. Our church Open Day occurs annually in October and is for everyone to enjoy. If you have never been before, or haven't been in years, do look out for next year's date – you may be surprised by what you see and you will certainly receive a warm welcome.

The Porlock InSpired Project needs you to help please



The spire project needs your help to raise an extra £50,000 by June 2026.

This is our contribution which the National Lottery Heritage Fund have suggested we raise in order to unlock additional funding from them.

It is to mitigate the loss of an estimated refund of £150,000 over the life of the Capital works. This is what we could have received from the Listed Places of Worship Scheme. These changes were announced in the government's budget earlier this year and we are naturally very disappointed.

The Heritage Fund cannot be expected to underwrite all of this and they are keen to see how the PCC and congregation plan alternative ways to raise the money.

This is where we need you, the congregation, to help! Please think of ideas for events or other ways you can help. A timetable of fundraising events will be drawn up which I am encouraging all of you to organise and participate in. It is a huge target but with the right ideas and enthusiasm we can manage it and it means that we will be able to unlock that additional funding.
