December 2025 for St Paul's Newsletter

Eternal God,
as Mary waited for the birth of your Son,
so we wait for his coming in glory;
bring us through the birth pangs of this present age
to see, with her, our great salvation
in Jesus Christ our Lord.

The prayer above is one of the Additional Collect prayers for the Church of England, suggested for the Fourth Sunday of Advent but also put forward to be used on any day in Advent.

Might we make it a prayer that we turn to repeatedly during this season, to fend off the distractions of the secondary 'stuff' of Christmas (budgeting, buying, bustling) and the racket of our noisy, violent world, and keep us focused on what truly matters. To keep us steady in hope and expectation.

A couple of years ago in Advent, I found it really helpful in having a go-to prayer or comment stored in the back of my mind, to be brought forward whenever required to help me refocus amidst the clamour and busyness. In that case, it was a quote from the then Bishop of Crediton, Sarah Mullally, now the elected Archbishop of Canterbury. In a book called *A Good Year*, edited by Mark Oakley and with chapters from different Anglican figures, on the various seasons of the Church's year, I was struck by – and duly highlighted in fluorescent yellow – words from Bishop Sarah.

They were: 'We seem as adults to lose our sense of anticipation and wonder.'

All through that Advent, whenever the bustle and unceasing demands of preparing for Christmas weighed on me and threatened to dim my sense of wonder, Bishop Sarah's words helped me pause and brought me 'back to my senses', back to recognising the wonder of God becoming human for our salvation.

This Advent I'll be keeping this Collect is whatever's left of my mind to once more teach me what is true and real, and a reason for hope.

That the God of love and mercy is eternal – not diminished or dimmed by the folly of our human failings.

That the Blessed Virgin Mary, through the example of her life, constantly points us to her Son, Jesus. She teaches us to wait: as she waited to give birth to the Lord, and as we wait for his return in glory. His return to set things right, to fulfil the Kingdom of love and mercy, despite the best efforts of the arrogant, the self-important, the divisive, the racist, the war-mongering, the genocidal, the exploitative, the abusive, the rich (the list goes on) to starve us of hope and deflect us from the truth.

That the trials and turbulence of how things appear now are not how they will always be. They are 'birth pangs' of an age that will pass, to give way to the joy of the new heaven and new earth.

That, in the words of the prophet Isaiah, 'sorrow and sighing shall flee away' to make way for joy and gladness.

Watching, waiting and working as best we can for the Kingdom, we will – with Mary – see the salvation found in Jesus Christ.

Might we each hold on to this Collect this Advent? And bring it to mind often in the coming weeks – especially when the way of the world makes us groan – and let it refocus our minds and hearts on what is true and eternal.

Its language and images are somewhat dated now, but I've always had a soft spot for John Betjeman's poem *Christmas*. At this time of year, I always seem to come back to its repeated refrain: 'And is it true? And is it true?', followed by the lines: 'The most tremendous tale of all... The Maker of the stars and sea / Become a Child on earth for me?'

Yes, even with my sometimes world-weary and scarred heart, I do believe it's true. And that it is the hope we can cling to with confidence.

Wishing you a blessed, hope-filled Advent and that you will know a sense of true Christmas joy.

# Tutbury Rural Deanery Synod, Thursday 13th November 2025 at St Paul's Church Hall, Burton upon Trent

The Lay Co-chair, Dr Doug Brown warmly welcomed synod members to this, the last convening of the year, hosted by ourselves in St Paul's Church Hall.

Doug reflected on the observation of Remembrance Sunday in the current, rather contentious social climate with its' emphasis on national identity and subsequent disrespect for our national flags and their significance in the last two world wars along with armed conflicts involving our armed forces personnel since.

The minutes of the September meeting at Rolleston were read and accepted; the guest speaker from St Mary's House in Lichfield, Rev Prebendary Dr Jeanette Hartwell, was highly commended for her very positive and enlightening address.

Matters arising: We have a new Deanery Synod treasurer in Phil Coleman, deanery Standing Committee member who takes up the vacant post after being

proposed by the rural dean, Rev Dr Robin Trotter and seconded by Rev Dave Collier; we wish him well as he seeks to keep our finances in order.

Main item: Discussion on finance.

Having been newly appointed, Phil Coleman opened the synod up to a number interesting and important elements of church finances which the synod was encouraged to explore:-

- · PCC 's; directly and collectively responsible for all income and expenditure.
- The setting of budgets and fund-raising.
- The Common Fund.
- Diocesan tasks: What are parishes doing to engage with the community, 'on-line' returns, prompt payment of fee returns.
- St Mary's House: any assistance afforded: provision of more support for parochial church councils., 'Go Fund Me' account system, independent account checking.

Other important issues: contactless giving, Gift Aid take-up, hire of church halls.

Synod members discussed with Phil as to how best to give these matters the attention they deserve and at the close of his address he offered his services in an advisory capacity to any parish regarding their accounts.

Brief reports given on the following:-

Treasurer's: awaiting report from Phil Coleman in Feb, 26.

Deanery Standing Committee: 2026 Synod meeting dates agreed. 2 x venues to be arranged.

Diocesan Synod: awaiting.

General Synod: will give fuller report next Feb, 26.

#### **Pastoral Matters**

Rev Tony Williams had a new post. Tutbury Deanery has at present, four parishes in interregnum; a, situation carefully noted by Rev Philip Jefferies who

offered some perspectives in the light of fewer people coming forward for ordination to the priesthood.

The state of affairs at St Chad's was touched upon by the rural dean Rev Dr Robin Trotter; challenging both financially and pastorally to all concerned.

#### The Common Fund

The Lay Co-chair Dr Doug Brown was pleased that the deanery had attained a 97 per cent collection rate, asking synod members to convey sincere thanks to all PCC members and the congregations they serve. He emphasised the need to avoid leaving paying into the Common Fund until the end of the year as this affects the ability of the diocese to pay clergy etc. 2026 will see the Common Fund requests rising by 3.3%.

#### **Seeking the Kingdom**

The Diocese of Lichfield is due to receive £3 million c/o a designated investment fund, fed in over 5 years, from the Church Commissioners which will specifically target urban parishes in particularly challenging situations. This follows on from the 'Seeking the Kingdom' initiative with a view to assisting 'front-line' churches with specific demographic issues and where congregations reflect the communities they serve.

The synod concluded with prayers and the grace (2 Corinthians 13, vs 14)

Next meeting: Monday 23rd February 2026 at St Modwen's


#### **BORN IN THE NIGHT, MARY'S CHILD**


