EPHESIANS 1:11-23

All Souls' Day, a time of reckoning with the past

The early Church was slow to dedicate a liturgical day to offering prayers and masses to commemorate the faithful departed. But in time prayers were offered on behalf of dead monks, that they might attain 'the Beatific Vision' through purification, which the Church later described as Purgatory. Odilo, the powerful abbot of Cluny, (d 1049) decreed that All Souls' Day should follow the feast of All Saints' Day.

At least four ancient English dedications are known, the most famous of which are All Souls College, Oxford and the church in Langham Place in London.

In bygone centuries All Souls' Day was certainly uncomfortable for anyone who had wronged a person who had then died. For it was believed that souls in purgatory could appear on earth on this day, in the form of ghosts, witches or toads, to haunt anyone who had wronged them in life.

On a more cheerful note, it was also believed that you could help the dead on this day by almsgiving in cash or in kind. Some of these beliefs seem to have been caught up in the popular customs of Hallowe'en.

When the Reformation came, the Protestants disregarded the idea of Purgatory, and this feast day remained with the Roman Catholic Church.

4th November - Charles Borromeo, the un-ordained archbishop

Why should being a 'lay' person stop you from as full a ministry as being ordained? Here is a saint for all lay people who suspect they can do as good a job....

Charles Borromeo was an Italian who lived in Milan from 1538 to 1584. His uncle, Pope Pius IV, made him Archbishop of Milan three years before Charles even became a priest, let alone a bishop. Charles, however, was one of the ablest and most compassionate Christian leaders of his age. He established theological colleges to train future clergy, encouraged children to be taught the Christian faith, and increased the help given to the poor.

Look Back Look Forward

The month began with a visit from Rabbits class from Tuel Lane Primary School. The children always ask such interesting questions and really seem interested in what happens in Church. Anthea and I have also done assemblies every Tuesday and Wednesday, and we attended a meeting with the school about what more we can do to teach our faith to the students.

We had the pleasure of Tuel Lane and Christ Church School hosting their Harvest Festival in Church. The staff and children worked really hard and put on a great show. It has been said that the school is now the gathering place of the community, and I think that is true. These links with the school are a great way to teach the faith and connect with local families. The service was only able to take place because of the hard work by Peter and Dave Towler, and I would like to thank them again for all their efforts.

I had to leave the Harvest Festival a little early for the Clergy Study day. This day was bittersweet as it was very informative, but it would be the last event Bishop Nick would host. Bishop Nick spoke about setting up the diocese and the lessons learnt during that time. One of the key messages from Bishop Nick was that he wanted us to be bold. He wanted us to take more risks and remember that if we fail, what is the harm?

Messy Church started again this month and was very well attended. It is wonderful to see so many people in Church. It was very busy but everyone I spoke to had a really good time and appreciated us putting it on. We managed to feed all the children and the adults who wanted food, and I want to thank all of the volunteers, especially for covering the time I needed to go and pick up Tabitha. We also held movie night, and Fiona had the great idea of producing golden tickets to give out to the school with the dates of future movie nights on.

The Deanery Synod was held this month. There was a lot of positive news, but the main takeaway was the financial struggles across the diocese. The diocese has already reduced its staff by over 50% and the impact will start to be felt in the number of clergy that can be employed by the diocese. This does not mean vicars will be moved on or out of a job, but it does mean that future vacancies may be hard to fill. We all need to make sure we are doing all we can to encourage new members and to give all that we can.

Looking forward, we will continue to do Morning Prayer. I have started doing it in Church every Monday at 9:30. Please do attend if you can. I will start a BCP service every Thursday at 6:30 – unless Messy Church is on. I will also start a Church History/Theology course in November.

November is the start of the busy period in the Church. We have the Remembrance Day services and assemblies, which are always a humbling time of reflection. We have visits from New Road school and the Buble and Bubbles night as well.

What is Parish Share?

Following on from Revd Tommy's sermon last week when he mentioned Parish Share. This refers to the financial contribution our parish is asked to make to support the mission and ministry of the Church. It primarily covers the costs of clergy stipends and their housing.

With Parish Share the Diocese are able to ensure:

- Every communion is celebrated
- Every sermon is preached
- · Every bereaved family is comforted
- Every school assembly takes place
- Every baptism and wedding is ministered

Every person is shown the love of Christ through our compassion and comfort.

Parish Share Agreements Process

The Diocese are taking a new approach to Parish Share by opening up the lines of communication between the parishes and the diocese. We are going to do this by visiting every parish in the diocese on a rolling three-year basis. The joint meeting for Christ Church, Sowerby Bridge is January 2026.

The Bible and Parish Share

Using the Parish Share system means that the Diocese are able to offer mission and ministry across the whole of the Diocese. More importantly perhaps, resourcing the work of the church this way follows some principles we find in Scripture. God is our Heavenly Father whose nature as Father, Son, and Holy Spirit is to invite us to be in a relationship with Him, and with one another. Parish Share is one way we act, as Christians, to fulfil our calling and even reflect God's own relational nature.

Christ Church's Parish Share for 2025 totals £24,442. This needs to be paid by 31 December 2025. So far we have forwarded £12,250 and a further £2,100 will be sent by 2 December. This is a shortfall of £10,092.

On top of paying the Parish Share we have the normal energy/water bills, insurance, internet, photocopier rental and repairs to our Grade 2 listed building to name just a few.



Listening to the Music of the Soul -The Archbishop of York's Advent Book 2025 By Guli Francis-Dehqani, SPCK, £10.99

When it comes to inhabiting life fully, Mary is surely one of our greatest role models. 'My soul magnifies the Lord,' she sings in the Magnificat. Her spirited response to the Angel Gabriel's announcement that she is to bear the Son of God is rich in nuance, contradiction and paradox.

These very characteristics inspire Bishop Guli to make connections between the themes of Advent and her own experiences – and to invite us to do the same.



Bishop Guli's forced exile from her homeland has echoes of the flight into Egypt; the murder of her brother Bahram during the Iranian Revolution of the slaughter of the innocents. She writes intriguingly of how angels continue speaking to us today; how fear can prevent us from living well in the present; how pain and loss can be transformed by the power of beauty.

Deepening its resonance, each chapter is linked to a piece of music, prompting us to consider: what are the enduring melodies that sustain us as the vibrant stories of our lives unfold.
