Rector's Ramblings – November 2025 (Clearing the Clutter: Our path to Advent)

My dear friends,

As the vibrancy of autumn deepens into the muted hues of late November, we find ourselves standing on the threshold of a new Church year. The nights draw in earlier, the air has a crisp, frosty bite, and the comforting promise of warmth and light becomes ever more precious. This time of year, naturally invites us to slow down, to turn inward, and to reflect.

Soon we will step into the expectant quiet of Advent. No sooner have the Halloween decorations disappeared, and the Bonfires and Fireworks have burned out, then it seems the world around us begins hurtling towards Christmas, with decorations popping up in shops But for us, the Church, November is a vital time to resist that rush and instead, prepare our hearts and minds for the profound spiritual journey that lies just ahead.

Advent is a season of waiting, of watching, and of hopeful anticipation. It is a four-week period where we intentionally hold two moments of God's coming in tension: we remember the joyous, historical arrival of Christ as a baby in Bethlehem over two thousand years ago, and we look forward to His glorious, final coming at the end of time.

This dual focus makes Advent an inherently active season, not a passive one. It is not just about waiting but about preparing for the arrival. And just as we take time in November to plan our calendar, perhaps write our Christmas card lists, and start thinking about gifts, we must also take this time to clear the spiritual clutter from our lives.

How might we use these final weeks of November 2025 to prepare for our Advent preparation?

Firstly, I encourage you to embrace the **Quiet**. The world is loud. Find five minutes each day, perhaps first thing in the morning or last thing at night, to simply sit in stillness. Turn off the news, silence the phone, and invite God's peace into that space.

Secondly, take a moment for **Reflection**. Look back over this past year. Where have you seen God at work in your life? Where did you stumble? Our preparations for Advent must always be rooted in a spirit of repentance - a turning around and re-alignment of our will towards God's.

Finally, think about **Hope**. Advent is the great season of Christian hope. As the world grows darker, we are reminded that our true light, our hope, is not the sun, but the Son. As you prepare your homes for the winter and the festive season, commit to doing one small act of service or kindness this November that reflects the hope and love that Christ brought into the world.

Let us enter Advent this year not rushed and exhausted, but ready and waiting. Let us use these remaining November days well, so that when we light that first purple candle on the Advent Wreath, our hearts are truly prepared to welcome the coming King.

The late Poet Laureate, John Betjeman was a great lover of all things Victorian, churches in particular.
