A Dialogue between God and Little Agnes on the Blessings of Winter

AGNES: Dear Father, I love winter! Even though it's cold and dark, I always look forward to Christmas time and to playing with the snow! Did you create winter for that?

GOD: Dear Little Agnes, yes, I did, but there are also other reasons. Genesis 8:22 proclaims, "As long as the earth endures, seedtime and harvest, cold and heat, summer and winter, day and night, shall not cease" as a reminder that my promises endure. The reliable cycle of seasons represents my unchanging faithfulness, grace and devotion for My creation. Nature reveals My character. In winter, in the silence of the dark and the stillness of the cold, My voice can be heard, and – with it - My wisdom, and -through them- you will feel My eternal love and acknowledge My blessings to you.

AGNES: Thank you, Father. What are the greatest blessings that you give us in winter, then?

GOD: Forgiveness is one of them. In winter, the purity of the snow can serve as a symbol of forgiveness and catharsis from sin, as it is depicted in Isaiah 1:18, "though your sins are like scarlet, they shall be like snow." Another sacred winter blessing is spiritual pruning.

AGNES: What is spiritual pruning, Father, and why does it happen during the winter?

GOD: Winter is a time of pruning or 'cutting back', necessary for growth. Just like trees need pruning to remove dead or overgrown branches, different areas of your life need to be pruned to facilitate your spiritual growth.

In John 15:2, Jesus says, "He removes every branch in me that bears no fruit. Every branch that bears fruit he prunes to make it bear more fruit." Pruning is vitally important to grow in your walk with Jesus, because there might be things in your life which hinder your relationship with him. Ask yourself, "Am I carrying 'dead branches' in my life?" It could be a bad relationship, a past wound, a negative attitude preventing you from enjoying life, or looking for security in something other than Jesus himself. Many times, people are too afraid to give up what they know, for something new that they cannot see yet.

The truth is – people can choose to be unhappy carrying these ‘dead branches’, or they go through the pain of letting Me ‘prune’ them away, to feel joy and peace restored within their soul, and their relationship with Jesus renewed.

AGNES: Okay. So, how exactly can we improve our relationship with Jesus so he can help us grow during winter time?

GOD: In John 15:4, Jesus says, “Abide in me as I abide in you. Just as the branch cannot bear fruit by itself unless it abides in the vine, neither can you unless you abide in me.” In other words, you need to follow Jesus. I want you to be so rooted and grounded in My love that nothing can hurt you, so you will be able to bear good fruit even in the hardest, darkest and coldest seasons of life.

Winter holds space to silence, stillness, rest and contemplation. At Christmas time you have an opportunity to reflect, pray, deepen your relationship with Jesus, draw closer to him, grounding yourself in his love and truth, becoming mindful of his presence in your life and allowing him to refresh your spirit. True rest for your soul only comes from him. In Psalm 46:10 it is sung, ‘Be still, and know that I am God!’ By being still and in silence during the dark winter, you will hear Jesus’s voice and feel his presence. Trust in him. Surrender to Me, listen to the Holy Spirit, and let Jesus direct your path, trusting that he will always guide you and feed your soul.

AGNES: What is the best way to surrender to You and let Jesus guide us? And how can we best listen to the Holy Spirit?

GOD: Through gratitude, worship, purpose, and sacred sense of direction. “It is good to give thanks to the Lord, to sing praises to your name [...]; to declare your steadfast love in the morning, and your faithfulness by night” (Psalm 92:1-2) encourages you to start and finish each winter day with prayer, praise and thankfulness. “This is the day that the Lord has made; let us rejoice and be glad in it” (Psalm 118:24), invites you to rejoice in the winter days that I have made.

AGNES: Thank you so much, Father. From now on, I will pray more so Jesus becomes my best friend, and will spend more time in silence so I can hear the voice of the Holy Spirit. And I will come back here soon, to speak with You again!

GLUTEN-FREE LENTIL BREAD

Ingredients:

3/4 cup red lentils ground in coffee grinder

1 glass of water

1 tablespoon olive oil

2 eggs

salt to taste

1 teaspoon baking powder

1 tablespoon apple cider vinegar

40g psyllium husk

30g pumpkin seeds

30g sunflower seeds

Sesame seeds for topping

Method:

In a bowl mix together the ground lentils, water & oil.

Add the eggs & salt = mix well again.

Add the psyllium husk & cider vinegar & leave to soak for 15 minutes.

Meanwhile dry fry the pumpkin & sunflower seeds in a pan. Cool & add to the dough after the soaking time

Grease & line a 1lb loaf tin, flatten the dough & cut a deep opening through the centre & pour sesame seeds over the top

Bake at 180c, 350F or Gas mark 4 for 50-60 mins

MUSTARD STUFFED CHICKEN.

Ingredients,

125g ball of mozzarella, torn into small pieces.

50g strong cheddar, grated.

1 tbsp wholegrain mustard.

4 skinless, boneless chicken breast fillets.

8 smoked streaky bacon rashers.

Method.

Heat oven 200c/ fan 180c/ gas 6.

Mix the cheeses and mustard together.

Cut a slit into the side of each chicken breast,

then stuff with the mustard mixture.

Wrap each stuffed chicken breast with 2 bacon rashers, not too tightly but enough to hold the chicken together.

Season, place on a baking sheet and roast for 20 - 25 mins

RASPBERRY AND WHITE CHOCOLATE MUFFINS.

Courtesy Good Food Magazine

Ingredients

100g unsalted butter softened.

65g caster sugar.

65g light brown sugar.

2 large eggs, room temperature.

125g Greek yoghurt.

1 tsp vanilla paste. 5 tbsp milk.

250g self raising flour.

1 tsp baking powder.

200g raspberries (fresh or frozen)

75g white chocolate chips.

Method.

Heat oven 200c/ fan 180c / gas 6 and line a 12-hole muffin tin with paper cases.

Beat the butter and sugars together for 5 mins until pale and fluffy.

Add the eggs gradually and beat in until combined.

Stir in yoghurt, vanilla and milk.

Fold in flour, baking powder and a pinch of fine salt until you have a smooth batter.

Finally, fold in 150g of the raspberries and the white chocolate chips and fill the muffin cases three quarters full.

Put the remaining raspberries into the top of each muffin so they stick out slightly.

Bake for 8 mins then reduce the oven to 180c / fan 160 / gas 4 and bake for 20- 25 mins until risen and golden, and a cocktail stick inserted in the centre comes out clean.

Your monthly gardening checklists: Flowers

- Protect terracotta pots from cracking in freezing weather by bringing them indoors or wrapping in bubble polythene
- Rake up accumulated fallen leaves in borders that could be harbouring slugs and other pests
- Plant bare-root roses and other deciduous shrubs, plus ornamental trees
- Hang bird feeders near roses to attract hungry birds that will also pick off any overwintering pests
- Cut stems of berried winter shrubs, seasonal flowers and evergreen leaves for festive decorations and wreaths
- Move plants in pots to a sheltered spot if conditions turn very cold, as their roots are more exposed to the elements
- Pile straw or bracken around the base of tender shrubs and climbers to protect them from falling temperatures
- Plant fragrant winter shrubs in pots on the doorsteps, including chimonanthus, sarcococca and *Daphne odora*
- Prune climbing roses between now and February
- Hard prune overgrown shrubs and hedges while they're dormant
- Check stored bulbs and corms regularly for any signs of rot
- Prune climbing roses before February


