Collect:

A reading from the Book of Ecclesiasticus

his children, and he confirms a
mother's right over her children.

Those who honour their father atone
for sins, and those who respect their
mother are like those who lay up
treasure.

Those who honour their father will
have joy in their own children
and when they pray they will be
heard. Those who respect their father
will have long life, and those who
honour their mother obey the Lord;

Therefore, as God's chosen ones,
holy and beloved, clothe yourselves
with compassion, kindness,
humility, meekness, and patience.

Bear with one another and, if anyone
has a complaint against another,
forgive each other; just as the Lord
has forgiven you, so you also must
forgive.

Above all, clothe yourselves with
love, which binds everything together
in perfect harmony. And let the

peace of Christ rule in your hearts, to
which indeed you were called in one
body. And be thankful.

Let the word of Christ dwell in you
richly; teach and admonish one
another in all wisdom; and with
gratitude in your hearts sing psalms,
hymns, and spiritual songs to God.

And whatever you do, in word or
deed, do everything in the name of
the Lord Jesus, giving thanks to God
the Father through him.

Wives, submit yourselves unto your
own husbands, as it is fit in the Lord.
Husbands, love your wives, and be
not bitter against them. Children,
obey your parents in all things: for
this is well pleasing unto the Lord.
Fathers, provoke not your children to
anger, lest they be discouraged.

Gospel according to Matthew

Now after they had left, an angel of
the Lord appeared to Joseph in a
dream and said, "Get up, take the
child and his mother, and flee to
Egypt, and remain there until I tell
you, for Herod is about to search for
the child, to destroy him."

Then Joseph got up, took the child
and his mother by night, and went to
Egypt and remained there until the
death of Herod. This was to fulfil
what had been spoken by the Lord
through the prophet, "Out of Egypt I
have called my son."

When Herod saw that he had been
tricked by the magi, he was
infuriated, and he sent and killed all
the children in and around
Bethlehem who were two years old
or under, according to the time that
he had learned from the magi.

Then what had been spoken through
the prophet Jeremiah was fulfilled:
"A voice was heard in Ramah, wailing
and loud lamentation, Rachel
weeping for her children; she refused
to be consoled, because they are no
more."

When Herod died, an angel of the
Lord suddenly appeared in a dream
to Joseph in Egypt and said,
"Get up, take the child and his
mother, and go to the land of Israel,
for those who were seeking the
child's life are dead."

Then Joseph got up, took the child
and his mother, and went to the land
of Israel. But when he heard that
Archelaus was ruling Judea in place
of his father Herod, he was afraid to
go there. And after being warned in a
dream, he went away to the district
of Galilee.

There he made his home in a town
called Nazareth, so that what had
been spoken through the prophets
might be fulfilled, "He will be called a
Nazarene."
