Meditation

Jesus warns of wars and persecution, betrayal and division, being just round the corner. Perhaps we feel like this, or perhaps we feel Jesus is talking to different people at different times or different places to us. Jesus also said, "Love your enemies and pray for those who persecute you." So, when we gather, at Christ's invitation, at his table, we gather to commit ourselves to tearing down barriers between people that make enemies. We are to practice peace-making, to un-learn our abilities to make war, to shape communities and individuals to seek peace and harmony rather than division. We gather to affirm the peace that is ours in Christ. We are here to re-member, re-call, recollect the pieces of broken humanity, that they may be fully restored in Christ. The members of this body are one, even though we too easily forget and work against that reality. When you and I gather round this holy table of word and meal, when we gather for conversation and friendship, we begin to re-member the reality in which we already exist.

There is a great image of nations streaming to Zion to worship one God in peace, but it should challenge us. We cannot look around and find a full and perfect example anywhere in this world – there is too much corruption, too much selfishness, too much strife in cities and nations around us. Yet there is also hope, and glimpses of human community restored, if we are willing to look, however tentative and imperfect. Wherever people begin to look for the image of God in people they would rather see as enemy, Zion emerges in their midst, and nations begin to stream towards that metaphorical holy mountain. Wherever people gather in councils of peace rather than war, God's instructions bear fruit. Whenever people ask how a nuclear reactor can be an instrument of peace, how it can produce energy and treat cancer, rather than fashion weapons of war, there the Spirit of God is at work. When food and medical care and education are shared with those who have none, instruction is going out from this holy mountain.

Yet this is never a passive process. We don't just sit and wait for the Spirit to work alone. You and I, and everyone we meet in our daily rounds, can

share in that work of the Spirit. Each one of us can engender change, can forge weapons into instruments of peace. And, when we move in the power of the Spirit the earth begins to move as well. That work of shifting ground begins with our own attitudes, responses and actions. How do we perceive the stranger – as threat or as image of God? There is a part of each one of us that awakens to full alert at the presence of a stranger, an unknown, one who is "other". That reaction is an instinctual survival skill, and in itself is neither good nor evil. But what we do with that heightened awareness is a moral decision. When we become profoundly aware of the presence of "the other" we are confronted by a series of choices. Is this "other" a threat or a potential blessing – or do we need to gather more information before we decide? We would do well to remember that the unknown stranger just might be a divine messenger – an angel. I am convinced that every stranger may bear a divine message if we can discover and receive it. Certainly, every encounter brings an image of God, and image we don't yet know, and that meeting must thereafter be rich with creative possibility.

The choice between vulnerability and fear underlies the human ability to make both peace and war. That choice is what most profoundly underlies Jesus' witness, and his life, death and resurrection. Living is radical openness to the image of God in the other may lead to death, but it is also the only route to full and abundant life.

The human ability to make war has mostly to do with fear: people and their leaders live in fear of their neighbours or what they may do. Some use fear to control others and fill their own desires. Some live in fear of territorial expansion, or lack of access to resources and the basic stuff of life – like water, fuels, cropland or fisheries. Neighbours may live in fear of reprisals for old injustices – like Jacob and Esau, like Israel and Palestine, like Ukraine and Russia. If we do not settle or forgive those old disputes, we will continue to live with fear.

Living with fear only degrades life, for it leads inexorably to violence. Living in fear denies the fundamental hope we share, for it condemns us to remain in the grave of the past. Christians are not meant to live in fear. We are born anew in hope for a dream that we expect to become a reality. That great dream of God is for a restored and reconciled creation. We make peace now so that God's cosmic dream can be made real. Jesus says, love your enemy now, in the present, so that we might "be perfect as God is perfect." That perfection is becoming, undergirded by reconciling work in this age, luring us towards the vision of creation existing in the full presence and perfection of God. Peace-making requires confronting fear, both our own fear

and the fear that keeps others in that grave. Loving our enemies means letting go of our fear of their perceived difference; letting go of our fear that they will take something precious from us; letting go of our fear that they intend only evil towards us. Loving our enemies means insisting that each is made in the image of God, that each of us can only live in peace only when all live under their own fig trees, with vines bent low and heavy with fruit. Loving our enemies means insisting that there is an abundance for all in God's dream of a restored creation.

To make peace, we must feed our neighbours, both stranger and friend, with the same gusto with which we feed our own children. We must seek the welfare of all with the same energy we spend to provide education and health care for our own families. Loving our enemies is only another version of loving our neighbours, for in truth all God's creatures are our neighbours. We do not have the luxury of distinguishing stranger from neighbour or friend. Setting down our swords and spears and re-making them into tools for farming or learning or healing means we must meet those neighbours in all their diversity and see only the beloved image of God.

May we go forth and transform the world. may God's peace be made real. May God's peace spread over this earth like the blessing of a rain cloud in the desert.

Eternal God, fount and source of all authority and wisdom,
hear our prayer for those who govern.
Give Charles our King grace as the symbol of loyalty and unity
for all our different peoples;
give the parliaments in these islands, and especially our own Government,
wisdom and skill, imagination and energy;

vision, understanding and integrity,
that all may live in peace and happiness, truth and prosperity
through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

Almighty God and Father,

through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

Eternal God, in whose perfect realm no sword is drawn but the sword of righteousness, and no strength known but the strength of love: so guide and and inspire the work of those who seek your kingdom that all may find their security in that love which casts out fear and in the fellowship revealed to us in Jesus Christ our Saviour. Amen.

God, who from of old taught the hearts of your faithful people by the sending of the light of your Holy Spirit: grant us by the same Spirit to have a right judgement in all things and evermore to rejoice in his Holy comfort; through the merits of Christ Jesus our Saviour. Amen

Epistle 2 Thessalonians 3 v6-13

We command you, beloved, in the name of our Lord Jesus Christ, to keep away from believers who are living in idleness and not according to the tradition that they received from us. For you yourselves know how you ought to imitate us; we were not idle when we were with you, and we did not eat anyone's bread without paying for it; but with toil and labour we worked night and day, so that we might not burden any of you. This was not because we do not have that right, but in order to give you an example to imitate. For even when we were with you, we gave you this command: Anyone unwilling to work should not eat. For we hear that some of you are living in idleness, mere busybodies, not doing any work. Now such persons we command and exhort in the Lord Jesus Christ to do their work quietly and to earn their own living. Brothers and sisters, do not be weary in doing what is right.

Gospel of Luke 21 v5-19

When some were speaking about the temple, how it was adorned with beautiful stones and gifts dedicated to God, Jesus said, 'As for these things that you see, the days will come when not one stone will be left upon another; all will be thrown down.' They asked him, 'Teacher, when will this be, and what will be the sign that this is about to take place?' And he said, 'Beware that you are not led astray; for many will come in my name and say, "I am he!" and, "The time is near!" Do not go after them.

'When you hear of wars and insurrections, do not be terrified; for these things must take place first, but the end will not follow immediately.' Then he said to them, 'Nation will rise against nation, and kingdom against kingdom; there will be great earthquakes, and in various places famines and plagues; and there will be dreadful portents and great signs from heaven.

'But before all this occurs, they will arrest you and persecute you; they will hand you over to synagogues and prisons, and you will be brought before kings and governors because of my name. This will give you an opportunity to testify. So make up your minds not to prepare your defence in advance; for I will give you words and a wisdom that none of your opponents will be able to withstand or contradict. You will be betrayed even by parents and brothers, by relatives and friends; and they will put some of you to death. You will be hated by all because of my name. But not a hair of your head will perish. By your endurance you will gain your souls.
