## PRAYER DIARY JANUARY



### EPIPHANY

Many people only think of Christmas ending after Boxing Day and some think it extends to New Years Day. For most it has long been traditional to take down our Christmas decorations on Epiphany.

I keep my crib up until the Presentation of Christ in the Temple, which we celebrate at the beginning of February. It seems a shame to banish the Wise men to the cupboard when they have only just arrived!

The clip art I picked for this month's Prayer Diary says. "Wise men seek him still". The period of Epiphany is a good time for us to be wise, to think and pray about seeking our Saviour Christ in our individual lives and in our world today.

This month also contains the Week of Prayer for Christian Unity, which extends from a feast dedicated to St Peter to the feast of the Conversion of St Paul, two of the important Apostles in the early church. We should follow their example (and that of the Wise Men) of searching for Christ in our own lives and what that means.
