Advent Joy and the O Antiphons

Advent is a season of waiting, of quiet hope, and of joy. This year, our theme is joy, and we're exploring it through one of the most beloved Advent carols, *O Come, O Come, Emmanuel*.

Many of you will know this carol from its haunting, beautiful melody and its repeated plea: "O come, O come, Emmanuel." But have you ever noticed the verses? Each one begins with a different title for the coming Messiah: *Wisdom, Lord of Might, Root of Jesse, Key of David...* These are known as the *O Antiphons*, and they have been sung in the final days of Advent for more than a thousand years.

Originally, the *O Antiphons* were short prayers or chants used in monasteries and churches across Europe. Each antiphon addresses Christ in a different way, highlighting one of the many hopes we place in him: wisdom for the wise, freedom for the captives, light for those in darkness. They were sung in the evenings leading up to Christmas, building a kind of spiritual journey through longing, hope, and anticipation.

When we sing them today, even without knowing all the history, we participate in that journey. Each verse invites us to reflect: What do we long for in our own lives? Where do we seek God's presence? And, ultimately, how is our joy shaped by this hope?

This Advent, as we light our candles and sing these verses, we are reminded that joy is not just a fleeting feeling. It is a deep, steady hope that carries us through the waiting. The *O Antiphons* guide us to see the many faces of Christ's coming, and in doing so, they help us discover joy that reaches far beyond our circumstances.

I so look forward to singing, praying, and excited waiting together this Advent season, with hearts open to the joyful gift of Emmanuel: "God with us."

Paul's Piece

Here we are in Advent, 2025. That time of year when we are waiting for the joys of Christmas, when we are waiting for a break from work, waiting for the family get togethers, waiting to celebrate with food and drink, waiting to rejoice again the wonder of the birth of a Son who has changed the world, waiting for the completeness of love shown to be fully comprehended.

Waiting can be hard, despite our cultural preference to stand in queues. The frustration of not knowing how long, the patience needed to carry on and not arriving yet, the demanding self-control of not trying to attain a fulfilment when it is not in our gift to give. Yet, the season of advent is a time and space that Christians have given to allow all these, very real, feelings and thoughts to emerge. Why is this necessary ? what does it achieve ?



In the Christian Celtic tradition It is believed that the 40 days of Advent were split into three segments, informally termed the three comings of Christ. The first was the incarnation, the birth of Jesus where we all tend to focus upon at this time of year; the second is Christ coming into our lives; the third is the coming of Christ at the end of all things, as depicted in the book of Revelation.

The incarnation, as the gospel writer John says ' the word became flesh and lived among us' (John 1:14). Jesus has always existed, even before creation, historically ' he came from heaven to earth as the gift of love to us, for us, to be with us that we may know his love. We don't have to wait, this has happened. Our challenge here, is continuing believing. Knowing and trusting that although these things happened many years ago they are still for us now. '...everything of God finds its proper place in Jesus without crowding. Not only that, but all the broken and dislocated pieces of the universe - people and things, animals and atoms - get properly fixed and fit together in vibrant harmonies, all because of his death, his blood poured down from the cross' (Colossians 1: 19-20).

The coming of Christ into our lives, some know, some are asking for, some are unsure about and some not wanting to know. Again we do not have to wait, if we know - we know, if we're asking Jesus is coming. If unsure, what will it take for us to Know? Advent is an opportunity to explore, to ask questions, too wonder and to discover. Where there may be a sense of irrelevance, Jesus continues to wait with a loving ache.

The third coming of Christ ' when all things are made new' (*revelation 21: 5*) When a voice from the throne says ' Look , God has come to dwell with humans! He will dwell with them and they will be his people, and God himself will be with them and will be their God' (*revelation 21:3*). This ' second coming' of Jesus is immeasurably wonder - full, its beyond our words and imaginations, but we get a sense of it in the words and vision of Johns revelation - ' no more tears, no more death, no mourning or weeping or pain any more - the first things have passed away' (*revelation 21:4*). We're not there yet and the waiting cry, the prayer of Advent is ' Come Lord Jesus !'

In the challenges of waiting, we have an assurance God is before us, we have the significance of knowing God is with us in our lives, and we have the hope there is much more to come, to know, to be transformed by and to be lived in. Help us God to see our waiting isn't wasteful or wearing, that it is wonder - full, wise and for our well-being.

Community Meals and Connect

There are now over 5500 Warm Welcome Spaces in the UK. What started as a crisis response to keep people warm through the winter has blossomed into a movement to reconnect individuals and communities across the country all year round. The Warm Welcome Campaign and local spaces have created what former Prime Minister, Gordon Brown calls a 'Chain of Hope.' Warm Welcome Spaces are places full of human warmth, belonging, connection and hope. Thousands of lives are being touched by Warm Welcome Spaces - they are the heartbeat of local communities, buzzing with life and bringing people together.



At the Warm Welcome Spaces Champions event in Birmingham we were able to share about Sinfín Moor Church Community Meals and Connect and learn from other Warm Welcome Spaces experiences. The national team gave helpful insights and information to continue working with local community partners and where to find further support.



"It is one thing for Warm Welcome to have supported a crisis response last winter. But to see the way that this movement has developed, speaks to something deeper and more significant - the potential that often lies latent in our communities. By harnessing this potential, Warm Welcome now has the opportunity to start to change the culture of this country, beginning to turn the tide on both poverty and isolation and connecting individuals and communities."

Treasurer's Update

Eleven months have gone and just one to go before we reach the end of our financial year. Our financial situation has not really changed from last month in that we are just about holding our own, but we have now entered what are the three most expensive months of the year i.e. December to February when our running costs rise. These are cushioned a little bit now that we have the solar panels fitted.

Whilst we have benefitted from a reduction in our electricity bill thanks to our solar panels, we have not yet got them registered for the export of any excess electricity to the National Grid. Our Supplier, British Gas Lite decided after two months of trying, that we needed a new meter to be fitted to record the figures. This is because they did not accept the figures shown on the meter we had. This new meter has now been fitted, a suitable photograph sent and we are now awaiting them to respond. They seem to take about a week to respond each time, though this time they are taking much longer. It is not all gloom and doom, because at this time of year any excess electricity is topping-up our batteries. It will be next year before we start to reap that benefit of exporting to the national grid.

Recently one of our senior citizens informed me that after years of being exempt, she is now paying income tax because the tax-free allowance is now frozen. She enquired about Gift Aid. The rules for Gift Aid say that I can claim back 25p for single £1 that is given in the offering envelope. As long more tax is paid than I can claim back, there is no problem. In the new year, I will make our claim to the Inland Revenue and tell her and everyone else who takes part in Gift Aid what I am able claim back on their behalf. As a result, she promptly signed our Gift Aid form. What about you? Do you now pay income tax on your income/pension? Why not speak to me, don't let His Majesty's Inland Revenue keep all your tax contribution when we can claim some of it back. It costs you nothing more but helps us immensely.

On another matter close to my heart, may I commend to you the Church Christmas Card this year (see elsewhere in this Newsletter) and help us make it a slightly more 'GREEN' Christmas and help you save a bit of money along the way.

Happy Christmas to you all. I hope you find my updates informative and interesting as well.
