

Advent

The Rt Revd Jan McFarlane Dean of Lichfield

Much as I'd prefer not to think about Christmas presents and cards until the week before Christmas, the reality is that as soon as Bonfire Night and Remembrance Sunday are over, I must procrastinate no longer! Poor Advent. It's lost in the mists of time, its season of spiritual preparation for Christmas overtaken by ever exotic Advent Calendars, their numbered windows promising expensive 'treats' to help us to get through the stress of Christmas preparations. I've even seen a cheese-a-day Advent calendar. Seriously, who thought of that one?

Instead of moaning about the commercialism of Christmas, here at Lichfield Cathedral we do all we can to keep the Sundays of Advent special, beginning with the hauntingly beautiful Advent Carol Service. But then we go 'full bling' with the Christmas Light Show and the Christmas Tree Festival. They're ever popular, a seasonal 'must' in many people's diaries. And at the heart of both, is a search for the light in the midst of the darkness. Physical light in the long nights of winter. And spiritual light in a world which feels chaotic and dark.

One of my favourite worship songs is 'Christ be our Light' by the Roman Catholic songwriter Bernadette Farrell. It's beautiful. If you don't know it and have access to the internet, do search for it. You'll soon be singing along to its gentle tune and meaningful lyrics.

Longing for light, we wait in darkness. Longing for truth, we turn to you.

This is why, I think, so many people turn to the Church at Christmas, on the shortest days of the year. Our ancestors prayed that the sun would return. We search for the Son – the one who is the Light of the World. Even those who don't yet know him for themselves. But light and truth are in short supply at the moment – and in the Church we know both.

Many the hearts that yearn to belong. Let us be servants to one another, making your kingdom come.

So many people are lonely at Christmas. So many are searching for somewhere to belong. As Christians we belong to one big family, made brothers and sisters through our baptism. Who might we 'serve' this Christmas by simply inviting them to 'come and see'? Invite them to a carol service, or a social event at church, or bring them to their cathedral to see the Christmas Trees or Christmas Light Show. You might make someone's Christmas, and it might be for them

the first step to joining the church and finding faith. The worst that can happen is that they say no, so what's to lose?

A blessed Advent from us all at Lichfield Cathedral. Your Cathedral.

Stafford Poppy Appeal Launch

Stafford Branch of the Royal British Legion launched their 2025 Branch Poppy Appeal on Monday 13th October 2025 with a spectacular show in the Gatehouse Theatre. The Poppy Appeal is the RBL's biggest fund-raising event held every year in November and this year the theme and message of the RBL appeal was 'a combination of commemorating significant anniversaries and celebrating community spirit'.

This is the 10th time that Paul Milgate-Scarrott, Churchwarden at St Mary's, has delivered the Stafford Poppy Appeal Launch and it was by far his most ambitious. He wrote, produced and directed a show that took place in the Gatehouse Theatre and involved over 70 school children, a specially written song by Jim Milgate-Scarrott and Carol Lake with other music performed by the very talented Maria Kelly and flutist Ailish Steele. Along with many parents, families and friends of the performers also in attendance were his Majesty's Deputy Lieutenant, Mrs. Philippa Jane Gee, the Worshipful the Mayor of Stafford Borough, Councillor Jenny Barron and the RBL Stafford Branch Chairman, Lt Col (R) EC Dale OBE, soldiers from 22nd Signal Regiment, aviators from the Tactical Supply Wing, veterans and interested spectators.

As Chaplain to the Stafford Branch of the Royal British Legion Rev. John Davis began the Poopy Launch with prayers, and a reflection on George



Wright BEM, who is one of the remaining veterans who served in the Second World War. George was a boat boy, serving with the Royal Navy from 1943, too young to fight, so his job was carrying the ammunition up from the ship's hold for the firing of the guns. Probably far more dangerous than being on deck. He served in the Sicily and Italian campaigns, and on Operation Dragoon, attacking the Germans in Southern France, to relieve the D Day landings.

Holy Interruption

Craig Newton, new director of Shallowford House, our diocesan retreat centre, mulls the season of mistletoe and wine.

There's a certain stillness in the air as the year begins to draw to a close. It's a quiet that sits beneath the busyness of December, beneath the shopping lists and Christmas parties, beneath the deadlines and the expectations. It's the solemn quiet of winter. Of early nights and frosted mornings. Of candles lit against the dark.

If we allow ourselves to listen, Advent has a different rhythm to the world around it. Where the world demands we speed up, Advent invites us to slow down. Where the world grows loud, Advent gently whispers. Where the world requires more, Advent offers rest. Advent, in its truest sense, is a season of holy waiting. A time not to strive, but to receive.

In the Gospel stories, before the multitudes of the heavenly host praised God, there was silence. Before the light of a star broke into the night sky, there was anticipation. Before God came close in the vulnerability of a child, there were ordinary people going about their ordinary lives. It was in that stillness, unnoticed by most, that Heaven touched earth.

This is the fulfilment of Advent: God interrupting the ordinary. The Incarnation is the great holy interruption; the Creator entering creation, the Eternal One stepping into time, Heaven colliding with earth. It didn't arrive with prestige or power, but in the stillness of the night, in a place where most weren't looking.

This is how God so often moves. Not through the sensational and spectacular, but through quiet, unassuming moments. A whispered prayer. A small act of kindness. A pause in the rush of the day.

As Dietrich Bonhoeffer once wrote, "We must be ready to allow ourselves to be interrupted by God." Perhaps this Advent, we might learn again how to make room for those interruptions. To pause, long enough to notice where the light breaks in. To listen, for the whisper beneath the noise. To create for ourselves and for others, spaces of stillness in which the God who came at Bethlehem might meet us again.

Craig Newton joined the diocese in August as director of Shallowford House, our diocesan retreat and conference centre and is looking forward to welcoming people through his first winter of retreat days, workshops and hosting church weeks/ weekends and other groups stays. 



Cross Laying Ceremony

Have you ever wondered, like me, how the Cross Laying Ceremony came about? Well finally I have an explanation.

In the early 1920s, after the first world war, widows, widowers and family members were not allowed to join the Armistice or Remembrance Services held at the Cenotaph in London to pay tribute to their lost



loved ones. This led to them running across the road to lay crosses at the foot of the Cenotaph.

This very dangerous practice was noted by the RBL and branches soon started to hold their own cross laying services so that families could be included in the national act of remembrance.

Stafford is one of the few branches in the UK that continues to observe this
