Let your light shine before others Matthew 5, 16

Advent invites us into a time of reflection. We are getting ready and waiting as we prepare for the celebration of Jesus's birth and anticipate him making himself known among us. When I was young, I remember the joy. I relished the journeying towards Christmas with its childhood magic. I almost didn't want Christmas Day to arrive because I loved the anticipation and joy of the Advent season so much. Sadly, as an adult, it has too often felt like a whirlwind: four weeks filled with social commitments, shopping trips, school plays, gift lists and a depleted bank account. I have been guilty of feeling a sense of dread, followed by willing it along to reach the end point! I realise that I had lost the meaning. I could blame social media and consumerism (and I will a bit!), but I know deep down it is my responsibility.

In Church, we light a candle of the Advent wreath on each Sunday in Advent. Each candle represents key people in the story of God's coming to us as the Christ Child, Jesus. The first candle represents the fathers and mothers of faith, our ancestors. On the Second Sunday of Advent, we light a candle to remember the Prophets who foretold the coming of God's Son. The third candle is lit to remind us of John the Baptist, who showed the way to Jesus. On the Fourth Sunday, we remember Mary the mother of Jesus. Finally, on Christmas morning, we light the centre candle for Christ the Light of the World.

As each candle is lit, a little more darkness around the wreath is overcome.

We are all called to be the light of the world, to shine before others so that they can be given the light and know God. The Advent themes for each week can help us to reflect on how to live out Advent and guide those around us towards the real meaning and wonder of Christmas: hope, peace, joy and love. Perhaps we can ask these questions to help shape our mission:

Our ancestors of faith: As we look into the past, what can we learn from those who have come before us? How do we show hope?

The Prophets: Where do we see ourselves and our Church in the future? How will you share your faith?

John the Baptist: How do we show people what is here? How do we proclaim the Good News with joy?

Mary the Mother of Christ: How do you do all this with love and nurture?

Advent embraces the Way of Jesus and encourages us to live with hope, joy, love and peace in a world filled with darkness, fear and suffering. As we step forwards into Advent, remember to live it. Show hope, be peaceful, live joyfully, and spread love, remembering each time it is extinguishing a piece of darkness and making things new in Christ.

Their support means the work can be completed before winter, keeping St Mary's warm and welcoming for all.

In a thoughtful gesture, the donor also added Gift Aid, increasing the value of the gift by an additional £250. Such support helps sustain the life and work of St Mary's, ensuring the church can continue serving the community.

FASCINATING FACTS

P. G. Wodehouse

After the First World War people wanted to be amused and to be amusing to help them forget the war, and one Englishman of the pre-War generation became a supreme entertainer, amusing America almost as much as his countrymen. He had been one of the bowler-hatted crowd working in a bank before the Great War like T. S. Eliot. He played games with style, glowed with self-confidence and missed what his characters called the 'Varsity' only because his father lost most of his money. Unlike Eliot, he did not last long in the bank. He tore the front page out of a ledger and for this sacrilege was sacked on the spot.

No author probably had such a wide audience as P. G. Wodehouse. If you had not read at eleven his school stories, or met Psmith at fourteen or sympathized at seventeen with Lord Emsworth and his pigs, or seen yourself as Bertie Wooster attended by Jeeves, you were indeed a dull fellow. Wodehouse revived light English prose. He saw how the American vernacular revitalised the English language, and his metaphors and similes replaced the epigram. Adoring public school life he remained the irrepressible fifth-former to the end of his days.

Despite the fun that Wodehouse had at the expense of education he could turn out a copy of Greek or Latin verse at Dulwich with the best of them. The classical curriculum had some exalted achievements. It trained cryptographers who deciphered enemy traffic with all the skill of Housman in emending a corrupt text. During the Second World War the British often gained points in negotiation with the Americans

despite their inferiority in strength because they drafted documents more lucidly.

Gillie Potter

Gillie Potter appeared successfully in the Royal Variety Performance in 1930. Queen Mary was reported to have rocked with laughter at him. Within a year, he broadcast for the first time. His talks centred on the mythical village of Hogsnorton and its squire, Lord Marshmallow. He looked on Hogsnorton as 'England in microcosm, a reflection of the true heart of England. There was nothing in it that would offend a child or an adult.' The opening line of the sketch became Gillie's catchphrase: 'Good evening, England. This is Gillie Potter speaking to you from Hogsnorton in basic English,' and a typical exchange with one of his noble patrons would be: 'Au revoir, Lord Waterlog.' 'Reservoir, Old Dear.' In his private life Gillie Potter (real name Hugh William Peel) was a learned man, deeply interested in church history, archaeology and heraldry. He was a frequent contributor to the letters page of *The Times*.


