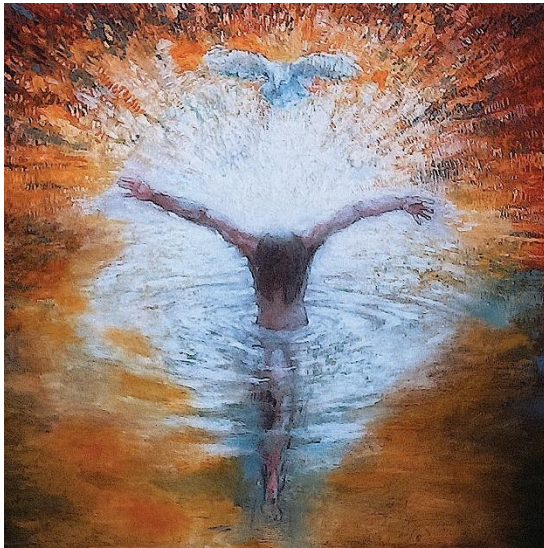

Jan 4th: Epiphany

Creator of the heavens, who led the Magi by a star to worship the Christ-child:

Saint of the Month

St. Rumon of Tavistock: January 5th



You may well have seen this school in Tavistock. Just before you come into the town from this side, it

is there on your right: St. Rumon's School. The only trace of St. Rumon left in Tavistock.

But centuries ago he was as well known as Francis Drake. Actually better, since Drake hadn't been born! In medieval times he drew the pilgrims to the abbey at Tavistock. They came to view the relics of St. Rumon.

Or Ruan as he is known in Cornwall.

Quite possibly a monk from Glastonbury, he set up a community on The Lizard in the 6th century. In that area there are a collection of places with Ruan in their names.

From there he went to Brittany, where he died. Initially buried there, his relics were brought back to Cornwall.

Until the abbot of Tavistock wanted some relics to draw the pilgrims to his new abbey. Apparently Ruan's would do. So on 5th January, 981 they brought them to Tavistock. The abbey was jointly dedicated to the Virgin Mary and to Rumon.

Rumon – or Ruan – remains the patron of Tavistock today.

This year's Gospel

The Gospel according to Matthew



The story of Jesus doesn't begin with Jesus. God had been at work for a long time. Salvation, which is the main business of Jesus, is an old business. Jesus is the coming together in the final form of themes and energies and movements that had been set in motion before the foundation of the world.

Matthew opens the New Testament by setting the local story of Jesus in its world context. He makes sure that as we read his account of the birth, life, death and resurrection of Jesus, we see the connections with everything that has gone before. 'Fulfilled' is one of Matthew's characteristic verbs: such and such happened 'that it might be fulfilled.' Jesus is unique, but he is not odd.

Better yet, Matthew tells the story in such a way that not only is everything previous to us completed in Jesus; we are completed in Jesus. Every day we wake up in the middle of something that is already going on, that has been going on for a long time: genealogy and geology, history and culture, the cosmos – God. We are neither accidental nor incidental to the story. We get orientation, briefing, background, reassurance.

Matthew provides the comprehensive context by which we see all God's creation and salvation completed in Jesus, and all the parts of our lives – work, family, friends, memories, dreams – also completed in Jesus. Lacking such a context, we are in danger of seeing Jesus as a mere diversion from the concerns announced in the newspapers. Nothing could be further from the truth.

Week of Prayer for Christian Unity

18th – 25th January

Each year we are invited to pray for our working and living together as Christian people. Through the centuries, it has been the curse of the church that we fall out with each other. At times it has been extreme with persecution and killings.

In the early days, there were fierce disputes between Christians with different understandings of the person of Jesus. Before long the church in the West fell out with that in the East focussed on Constantinople. The Reformation period of the 16th century and beyond was a terrible period of religious antagonism between Catholic and Protestant. We still its remains in Northern Ireland. And then the fragmentation of Protestantism into umpteen denominations, be they Methodist, Baptist, Churches of Christ, Assemblies of God, etc, etc. Two chapels not so far from here were within spitting distance of each other. 'I know,' said a neighbour, "because I have done it.'

So praise God that we work so much more closely today. There is much to give thanks for. But it can't be taken for granted. Hence the annual prayer for Christian unity. If we are to be anything, we are rooted together in person of Jesus Christ.

- to seek God's continued purpose for us together, and
- to pray for our mission to our communities.

Praying for Venezuela.

Firstly, where is Venezuela? It is not a country most of us know much about at all.

Venezuela is in South America at the very top, facing on to the Caribbean.



Why is it in the news? Most immediately, because the extraordinary raid by the US to capture its president. Maduro was re-elected in 2024, in what is widely regarded as a rigged election. Under his presidency, the economy has collapsed, corruption is rife, repression is considerable and the drug trade is thriving.

This has all resulted in a significant migrant exodus from the country, many ending up in the US.

And then there is the oil. The country has the biggest reserves in the world.

What about the Church there? Over 90% of the country claim to be Christian, most Catholic. For many of those, that is a traditional family faith. It goes back to the Spanish conquest in the 16th century. But Evangelical/ Protestant churches are growing significantly as in many parts of Latin America.

The regime has often labelled the Catholic Church as 'evil'; but unless they co-operate with the government, evangelicals are just as much likely to be oppressed. There is a small evangelical group which works with the government, and hence has access to grants, social aid, etc. The key is support of the government.

Oppression has been very real: long delays in church registration, prison, discrimination, etc. Violence has been less in recent years, but is still very much there with the criminal gangs. Society is dominated by fear.

What has been the reaction? Many Christians have welcomed the overthrow of the President. They have been praying for his removal for years. Proverbs 11: 10 describes their feeling: *'when the wicked perish, there are shouts of joy.'* But it is a hard road ahead. Maybe the Church can be a healing agent in a deeply wounded nation. Pray for the country in the weeks ahead, especially.
