Give thanks with a grateful heart

"Blow, blow, thou winter wind, Thou art not so unkind as man's ingratitude".

(William Shakespeare)

I have thought about those words in the high winds and heavy rain of January. Also, as the media carried the disturbing story of the disregard of one of our world leaders for the enormous sacrifices made by our own troops in allied conflict. Disregard and disrespect also of the enduring and intolerable pain of all whose lives have been irrevocably changed by that conflict, including those within our own community. Ingratitude writ large and barely acknowledged.

I am immensely grateful that we have within our village several different places where such inestimable sacrifice is honoured. In recent years our Village War Memorial within the cemetery, alongside the cross of sacrifice, has enabled us to know the names of those from Englefield Green who have given their lives that we might continue to enjoy the peace of this beautiful village from which they came. And, behind every name, unseen, there are loved ones and comrades, bereaved, disabled and beset by trauma, who every day continue to wrestle with the consequence of their sacrifice.

Please pause with me, as we acknowledge our own gratitude and the debt of thanks we owe. Thank you to John Scott MBE and to others alongside him, who help to keep these painful and uniquely precious memories alive in the heart of our community. Please especially remember Richard Scott, who sadly died just before Christmas. Richard served as Treasurer most recently of the Englefield Memorial Trust, and before that of EGVRA. We give thanks for him.

At a recent New Year Service, we prayed that, in 2026, we might "choose gratitude". In the world as so often we see it today, thankfulness does not always spring easily to our lips or to our minds. But poignantly, the world's pain can sometimes ignite gratitude for our own good fortune, and make us glad for the legacy of stability, security and hope that is ours in so many ways.

So, for what I am especially grateful today, still just about at the beginning of 2026? I am thankful that January has given the St Jude's congregation, and some members of our wider community, the opportunity to benefit from the ministry of another local priest. The Revd Holly Byles, at present Curate at St John the Baptist Church in Egham, has spent a month on placement with us. Her ministry has been joyous and inspirational. We are looking forward to a closer partnership with her in the not-too-distant future. Please pray for Holly as she returns to her present full-time ministry at St John's and please pray too for the Revd Lydia Corbett who takes up her new appointment as Vicar of St John's from 16th February. May God bless them both as they serve him together.

Holly spent some time in our St Jude's Schools. Thank you all for the welcome she received there. We are so aware of the tremendous commitment invested by the staff and leadership teams of all our village schools, pre-schools and nurseries, and by the staff of Royal Holloway University College. Thank you to all who devote time, energy, vision and love to ensuring our children and young people receive the best possible holistic education.

Some of you may know the Radio 4 magazine programme "Saturday Live". A regular "thank you" slot provides an opportunity for individual listeners to say thank you for some random act of selfless kindness, given to them, sometimes years ago, by a stranger never seen again. Their stories are often moving and thought-provoking. They remind me how good it would be to say "thank you" to people who have touched my life in different ways but never knew the extent of my gratitude or saw how they have influenced and blessed me.

But by far the greatest debt of gratitude I owe to the Lord Jesus Christ, who gave his life that we might live eternally. His faithfulness and love day by day know no limits. "How can I repay the Lord for all his goodness to me?" (Psalm 116). As Lent and Easter approach we warmly invite you to come and worship with us at St Jude's and join us in thanksgiving and praise.

St Jude's School

Another step towards the change-over to being a Middle School in September was made in February. The contractors handed over the two classrooms which have been converted to provide rooms for teaching crafts, science and home economics. What was a classroom has become an area for teaching languages. The benches and equipment are now ready for use. Meanwhile we wait to see what effects the proposed cuts in spending on schools will have on us.

Somehow a sentence was omitted by accident from last month's account of Mr Leigh's retiring party. We are sorry that no mention was made — after all they had done — of the Headmaster and Mrs Pascoe, who arranged the evening and welcomed everyone.

The affection and respect felt for Mrs Win Smith who died suddenly last month brought a large number to Church for the service. Gifts made for her sake to St Jude's Appeal Fund (at

She had been an active member of the Women's Institute (being particularly interested in the drama section), and of Runnymede Art Society. She also had much to do with crafts, particularly in connection with Egham Old people's Welfare. When there was anything to be done in or for St Jude's she was there, and she had very many friends.

We congratulate Mrs W, Russell on celebrating her ninetieth birthday. Mrs Russell is a member of the MU and of other local organisations. Our choir was taken to the pantomime at Windsor in January as a Christmas outing after their hard work. In January Peter Selby was admitted after a time of probation and received his surplice.

High winds last month caused a stone cross to fall from a gable on St Jude's. Fortunately no other damage was done, and an inspection has shown no further danger at present.

Fair Shares

This name has been given to the plans for sharing out in a better way that the Church of England has in resources and especially in clergy. Our deanery is now working on the first stage, that of finding out what the needs of our parishes and hospitals and colleges are. We shall also try to discover what 'lay' people are doing, and what more they could do. For this exercise our parish is grouped with Egham and Egham Hythe since they obviously have much in common in this area.
