Vicar's Voice

As I write I am away for a few days in the Glencoe region of Scotland. Today the weather is wild—driving rain and storm-force winds—so I'm indoors enjoying the warmth and peace. Yesterday, by contrast, it was better and I had a good walk over the snow-covered mountains. The beauty was breath-taking; but climbing icy slopes and walking over steep sided ridges, sometimes buffeted by 50mph gusts of wind, was also a reminder of how fragile life can feel. The fact is that we never quite know what lies ahead or what challenges will meet us on the path.

As we move into February, the Church marks the Feast of the Presentation of Christ in the Temple. Mary and Joseph bring the infant Jesus to be offered to God, an act full of hope and dedication. Yet the moment is made more profound by Simeon's words. He recognises Jesus as the light for all people, the one who brings salvation. But he also speaks honestly about the cost of that light—the struggles, the revealing, the piercing truth that will shape Jesus' life and the lives of those who follow him.

Our own journeys hold that same mixture of beauty and uncertainty. Perhaps Candlemas invites us to pay attention to the opportunities we have now: to bring light where we can, to shape our communities with compassion, and to live more fully into the values of God's Kingdom, whatever the weather around us may be.

The Presentation of Christ in the Temple (Candlemas) - **Feb 1st** (from Common Worship intro to season): The Fourth Sunday of Epiphany 'The Feast of the Presentation (Candlemas). The child who has been manifested to the magi at his birth is now recognised by Simeon and Anna, when he comes to be presented in the Temple according to the Law of Israel. He is both 'a light to lighten the Gentiles' and 'the glory of God's people Israel'. But the redemption he will bring must be won through suffering; the

Incarnation is directed to the Passion; and Simeon's final words move our attention away from the celebration of Christmas and towards the mysteries of Easter.'

Lent

Lent (the 40 days before Easter) is a journey of pausing, breathing, and making space for God.

Lent is a Christian annual period that starts on Ash Wednesday lasting for 40 days (not including Sundays) representing the 40 days Jesus spent fasting in the wilderness. This 40 day period for Christians is a time to reflect, fast, and give penance in preparation for the resurrection of Christ Easter Sunday.

Is Lent 40 days?

Lent for Christians starts on Ash Wednesday and ends on either the evening of Maundy Thursday or on sun-down of Holy Saturday (day before Easter Sunday). However the practices of Lent do not end until sun-down on Holy Saturday for all Christian denominations. So it is 44 days from Ash Wednesday to Maundy Thursday and another two days with Good Friday and Holy Saturday added to give a total of 46 days for Lent. But Sundays are excluded from fasting during Lent and with 6 Sundays removed from the count we get lent being a 40 day liturgical period.

During Lent, there will be study groups offering the opportunity to explore our faith together. They will be looking at the Gospel of Matthew, which is the basis of our weekly Sunday readings.

The groups will meet as follows:

10.30am on Saturdays in **Old Glossop Vicarage** from 21st February for 5 weeks.

3.00pm on Sundays in **St Andrews Church** from 22nd February for 5 weeks

News from the Bellringers

On the afternoon of January 4th, the Sunday closest to the feast of Epiphany, the bell ringers rang a Quarter Peal, the first by a mostly tower band in a very long time. This was a moment of huge excitement for all the ringers at the tower, for such a feat has not been attempted, let alone attained by the tower band for at least half a century.

Quarter Peals are a recognised achievement in the world of bell ringing. A record of them is still publicly kept, and they are published by the main ringing journal, The Ringing World. Today they are probably the most common way of celebrating ringing, and approximately 420 Quarter Peals were rung last year across the county of Derbyshire, and about 16,000 nationally in the UK.

To ring a Quarter Peal demands a series of 1,260 unique changes among the bells, and usually takes around 45 minutes to complete, without interruption. Each Quarter Peal follows a couple of clear rules, well known to ringers, but few outside of ringing circles, of which the main ones are: the ringing has to start and end in what is called 'rounds', the bells sounding 1-2-3-4-5-6; in-between those rows of rounds, each row of the 1,260 'changes' cannot be repeated; and all of this has to be rung from memory, without visual aids.

Our Quarter Peal of Plain Bob Minor—a well-known method—lasted about 50 minutes, and was rung on the 'back bells', the heaviest of our quite heavy 8 bells. Father David

rang the Tenor, as well as conducted us through the performance, calling the other bells into position. Upon leaving the church at 4pm, having drafted a dedication to accompany the performance, the six ringers, emerged into the dusk, elated, relieved, and amid a light dusting of early January snow.

It might interest to know that the longest peal ever rung at All Saints' Glossop took place in 1885 and consisted of 10,176 changes (of Kent Treble Bob), lasting over 6 hours. I suspect it will have to remain for at least another half century before that record is matched.

Tubs2pubs

Congratulations we have saved nearly 400 plastic tubs from landfill.
