A PASTORAL LETTER FOR FEBRUARY 2026

I am writing this on Plough Monday - the day after Plough Sunday, when traditionally, hand ploughs (or the village plough) would be dressed in flowers, blessed at church, then taken around the village both to mark the start of the new working year and to ask for blessing on the land.

Plough Sunday and Plough Monday are the first of the agricultural festivals in the year, but there are days set aside throughout the year when the land, the flocks and herds, the crops, and communities of people are prayed for and remembered and blessed.

This is the time of year when folk are thinking of their plans for the coming year, and maybe considering their holiday destinations. It is also a time when folk think about planning Life Events such as moving house, getting married or having a child christened. Baptism is the start of the Christian journey, and we have also just remembered Jesus' baptism in the river Jordan. From that start, Jesus went out to preach and teach and heal, and as Baptised people we are each sent out to live and learn more about faith throughout our lives. Currently we are in the church season of Epiphany where we learn more about Jesus being made known to the world, and about people realising that Jesus was both special and different.

The church year moves on and at the start of February, the Season of Christmas and Epiphany comes to an end with Candlemas, when Jesus was taken to the Temple by Mary and Joseph to be blessed. After that, we look towards Lent and the journey to the cross and to Easter. There will be Lent talks and discussion groups open to everyone in the area, if you would like to try something different.

There are also lots of friendly, informal community groups around the area, where we can meet and have a chat over a coffee, or soup and a pudding. Maybe we can all try something new for the New Year!

WORLD DAY OF PRAYER - FRIDAY 6TH MARCH 2026:

The World Day of Prayer is a women-led, global, ecumenical movement. This year the service will be held on Friday 6th March. The service has been prepared by an ecumenical group of Christian women from Nigeria (see poster above). As we take part in this service, we join a great wave of prayer which encircles the globe, beginning in Samoa and ending 146 countries later in American Samoa, all praying with and for the country and people of Nigeria.

In this service, our Nigerian sisters call us to come closer to God and find rest in him. The theme of the service is "*I will give you rest, come*" (Matthew 11 28-30). When we totally trust and have faith in God our burdens become light and we find rest. As part of the service, we will hear the stories of four Nigerian women who inspire us to work towards a world without injustice, insecurity, marginalisation, religious persecution, poverty and despair. As we trust in God, our Burden Bearer, we become one body in Christ, receiving and bringing rest to the world.

We hope you can join us for this ecumenical World Day of Prayer Service, **Friday 6th March, 7pm at St. Oswald's Bellingham**. Refreshments will be available afterwards.

GOD'S WORLD - OUR WORLD



Campaigning for God's World: In an era where environmental concerns such as climate change, pollution, and loss of biodiversity are increasingly pressing, the Climate Action Group thinks that the Christian response to these issues is of paramount importance. Hence, we have been involved in two different sorts of campaigning before Christmas.

The first was a social media campaign asking the Church Commissioners to think more carefully about the biodiversity of the land **that they own**.

In the age of the climate and nature crisis, land is now our single most important environmental resource but land that is degraded, stripped of habitat or farmed intensively drives the decline of nature and the heating of our climate. Sadly, Britain is ranked in the bottom 10% of nations globally for biodiversity so big British landowners bear a huge responsibility to lead the way in rebuilding biodiversity in the UK. The Church Commissioners have the power to restore an area of land 99 times the size of Hyde Park (34,650 acres)!! This would be a truly significant contribution to the national effort. On a particular day in the Autumn, Christians bombarded the Church of England and the new archbishop's social media with pictures of themselves with encouraging messages (see photo!).

In December, some members of the Climate Action Group were involved in a Climate Roundtable meeting with our MP, where folk from a number of different groups were able to raise concerns. We spent 90mins with Joe Morris talking about local rivers, land use and home energy efficiency, in what was a friendly and productive meeting.

Top eco tips for January:

- When making a cup of tea, only boil the amount of water that you need. We waste electricity (and money) heating water we won't use.
- Stop using aluminium foil for cooking wherever possible and use a container with a lid that can be reused. Aluminium is a rare metal, and its extraction and purification uses a lot of energy.

NEWS FROM FALSTONE

I would first like to wish all the readers of the Meeting of the Waters a very happy and healthy 2026!

I LOVE Christmas time - I love the hustle and bustle and all of the preparations although the actual day just passes over so quickly. My Christmas Eve was rather different this year, though, as I was up super early to drop off The Maureen (aka my mother) to North Tyneside Hospital to get a new left knee for Christmas. While I was there, I collected The Aunty (Sheila Cowan) and brought her home, as she got a new right knee the day before (they were in beds next to each other)! The 'New Knee Gals' are both doing really well, you will glad to hear, and are happily comparing notes the healing process.

The Christmas Fair (I am glad to say!) was held in the village hall on the 22nd of November. As you may remember, it had to be cancelled last year due to snow! It was well attended, we had some new volunteers (who we were very grateful for), there was a wonderful smell of mulled wine and sweet mince pies, and lots of chatter. Over £1150 was raised for church funds, which was a record amount - so a BIG thank you to all of the stall holders, those who attended and those who volunteered on the day (see photos on the cover of this magazine). In a spirit of optimism: a date for your diary is Saturday 28th November 2026, which is the date potentially planned for the Falstone Christmas Fair 2026. I like to be organised!

St Peter's Christmas Eve Christingle/carol/noisy nativity service was as chaotic and wild as usual, and £120 was raised for the Children's Society. I wore my light up tiara but sadly, could not find the light up fairy wings in time! Rev Mike Wilkinson and I led the service, the church was packed and there were 20 children all dressed up as various nativity characters. Dylan Swan, aged 2, stole the show. He was dressed up as a camel holding a toy donkey (see photo on the cover of this magazine). Halfway through the service, he managed to wander into the pulpit and found the basket of chocolates, which he munched on, to his hearts delight, for the rest of the service. Falstone Toddlers made a super *Joy to the World* banner, which adorned the altar.

Between Christmas and new year, I was staying in Newcastle looking after The Maureen, so I attended St James parish church in Benwell. The church is nearly 200 years old and was designed by John Dobson, the famous 19th century local architect. The church opened for worship in 1833, on land donated by John Buddle, a famous mining engineer and colliery manager, who is actually buried in the churchyard in a vault designed by John Dobson himself. The developer of Newcastle's city centre, Richard Grainger, also lies in the churchyard in his family grave. I received a warm welcome in both senses of the word: the service was held in the hall attached to the church - which just happens to have a wonderful heating system.

Both the Revd Christopher Minchin, who is the Team Vicar for Mission (acting Team Rector of St James), and the regular congregation believe that Jesus calls them to keep two commandments in particular: to love God and to love their neighbour as themselves. They engage with hundreds of people every week, and work with many community partners and organisations to provide activities for anyone who may be isolated and vulnerable (which includes families in food poverty, asylum-seekers, those with poor mental health, the elderly, disabled, and others). I really think it does us all good to visit different churches and worshipping communities, so in 2026 I am going to try to do this.

Thank you to everyone who has donated to The People's Kitchen, which was Bishop Helen-Ann's Christmas appeal. This charity works incredibly hard to support and change the lives of people, including those who are homeless and vulnerable. I have a car load of donations to drop off at the end of January.

I end with the sad news another faithful member of our congregation, Brenda Meecham, died peacefully just before Christmas - aged 93. For a long time, she lived at the remote Hill House on the Donkleywood Road, and worshipped regularly at both St Peter's and St Aidan's until she went to live closer to her family in London before

the pandemic. Brenda was a skilled embroiderer and made the huge Last Supper Altar frontal at St Aidan's, as well as the special Remembrance kneeler at St Peter's. There will be a service in the spring where her ashes will be interred with her husband at St Aidan's, Thorneyburn.

She made the beautiful tapestry of the last supper that stands in front of the altar. Her ashes are to be interred provisionally at 1pm on Sunday 16th May, but I will confirm details nearer the time. May she rest in peace back in the valley she loved.

Services for February are: Communion Service on Sunday 8th Feb, with Rev Dr Ric Whaite, and Evensong on Sunday 22nd February at 6pm (the First Sunday of Lent).

You are always welcome to come to any service, to visit the church anytime as it is always open or come and enjoy the tranquillity of our churchyard and reflection area.


