A NEW SEASON

Spring is on its way! As the days are lengthening we are beginning to see signs of spring and new life. Have you noticed the snow drops in the garden and the buds on the trees? In our homes we may start noticing cobwebs as the hours of daylight increase. It can be a time of spring cleaning, not only in our homes but also in our lives.

The season of Lent is approaching, the forty days leading up to Easter. We remember Jesus spending 40 days in the wilderness before he started his public ministry and for us it can be an opportunity to reflect on our lives as we spend more time with God.



The Church of England's theme this year is

**'Draw Near:
Life-giving habits for Lent'**

which help us grow as disciples of Christ day by day, especially as we prepare to celebrate the great mystery of God's saving love at Easter. In our sermon series in church, we will be exploring different aspects of Christian discipleship – exploring the Bible, praying, offering service, giving and sharing the good news with others.

We completed some guiding programme activities and had a final games and snacks evening to round off the term.

So once, again a busy time for everyone. We restarted our meetings again on 6th January '26 and have another packed programme for this term. AIM (Artificial Intelligence Missioners) Part TWO

A brief recap from Part ONE. Basically I was asking the question 'who, or what, is driving AI into our lives. What is their intent (mission) and what as Christians should be our response.

Personally I am concerned about the advancement of AIM and how it can be contained for good purposes. I see deception on a massive scale running unchecked, that leads me to realise the 'The Great Deceiver' (John 8:44 and Revelation 12:9) must be at the heart of AI and it's Missioners. But as I ponder the a, b and c scenario from Part One, (**motives of deception, illusionary living and ungodly wisdom**) I believe that all 3 criteria are already comprehensively addressed, not by AIM practitioners, but by I AM!!

Why? because 'I AM' has seen it all before when humankind (Pharaoh) tried to play god (see Exodus 3:7-15). It never works, as recorded in His word. The good news is we don't need to be tech savvy, but to simply and humbly accept the God given invitation to ask, seek, and knock (press in) to His Holy Spirit's wealth of understanding available to all who acknowledge Jesus Christ as Father God's one and only Son.

If you would like to delve deeper into the Christian viewpoint of AI and its implications, may I recommend more from Dr John Lennox (**Oxford University, Professor of Mathematics**) either on YouTube, or his books on AI. His latest book on the same theme is 'God, AI, and the End of History'. He admits the book title is a bit misleading as it's main arguments comes from the Book of Revelation. It's a bit pricy, and over 600 pages! I managed to get it as a Christmas present! Thank you Santa.


Finally, minimal AI was used in this article!


