Epiphany January 6th

Why Is January 6th Called Epiphany?

January 6th is known as Epiphany because it marks the day Christians celebrate the revelation of Jesus as the Son of God. The word Epiphany comes from the Greek epiphaneia, meaning 'appearance' or 'manifestation'.

According to Christian tradition, this is the day the Three Wise Men, or Magi, visited the baby Jesus in Bethlehem, guided by the star that symbolised divine light.

Bells ring out for Epiphany - 4th January - quarter peel 3.00pm

On the afternoon of Sunday, January 4th, the Sunday nearest to the Feast of Epiphany, our bell ringers will attempt to ring a Quarter Peel, conducted by Fr. David. A Quarter Peel is “a notable performance, publicly recorded in *The Ringing World*” and requiring 1260 changes without mistake! Most take 45-50 minutes to complete. If the band of six ringers is successful in the attempt this will mark the first time in probably half a century, and possibly in more, that a predominantly home-grown band of ringers from our tower has attempted this feat.

December saint

I've chosen St Lucy for our December saint, again because we know quite a lot about her. She was born in 283 AD, in Syracuse, Sicily, to rich and noble parents, but her father died when she was just 5 years old, leaving her and her mother Eutychia, without a protector. The story goes that her mother, who had health issues, and who was unaware of Lucy's Christian commitment, arranged for her to be betrothed to a young man from a wealthy but pagan family.

Meanwhile Eutychia was persuaded to go on a pilgrimage which resulted in her being cured. Lucy having vowed her virginity to God, wanted to give her Dowry away instead of getting married. Her suitor, hearing of this accused her of being a Christian and she was executed during the Diocletianic persecution.

In some accounts she has her eyes gouged out before she is executed and for this reason, she is the patron saint of the blind.

Her name Lucy, shares a root (luc) with the Latin word for light, and so many traditions incorporate symbolic meaning in her as the bearer of light in the darkness of winter. She's particularly celebrated in Scandinavian countries where winters are long and dark. On her saint's day, December 13th, it's traditional for a young girl to be dressed in white, with a red sash, the sign of a martyr and to wear a crown or wreath of candles on her head.

Week of Prayer for Christian Unity 2026 – One Body One Spirit - Jan 18–25

This year's theme reminds us that the call to unity is a call to work for peace for all people everywhere.

The Week of Prayer for Christian Unity runs from Thursday, 18th to Thursday, 25th January 2026. It is appropriate that it always falls within the Season of Epiphany, the season in the liturgical year when we are reminded that the birth of Christ was revealed to the gentiles – the story of the visit of the far-travelled ‘wise men from the east’ in the gospel of Matthew – and always ends on the feast day of the Conversion of Paul, the apostle who is most associated with taking the ‘good news’ of Jesus to the gentiles. These are reminders that the ‘good news’ is for all people regardless of the characteristics which can too often be used to separate one group of people from another group of people: ethnicity, gender, sexuality, age, ability, etc.

The reflections offered during the Week of Prayer for Christian Unity invite us to reconnect to God’s dream for us – a dream of a unity. This challenges us not only to reflect on the learning from our journeys so far, but to widen our vision. What can we learn from people of other faiths, from those whose backgrounds are most different from our own, and what do we need from each other?

Sanctuary light

A sanctuary candle, also called a sanctuary lamp, is a special candle kept lit near the tabernacle in Christian churches (especially Catholic) to signify the real, physical presence of Jesus Christ (the Blessed Sacrament) within, symbolizing His eternal, burning love and presence. It's typically a red candle in a glass holder, burning day and night (except Good Friday) as a constant reminder for prayer, adoration, and reverence, echoing Old Testament traditions of perpetual light.

We have bought sanctuary candles for many years. The cost of these candles are at least £3.00 each and burn for 7/9 days. Thinking about our Environmental Footprint and where does the holder go after the candle has burnt, we are now investing in a battery powered candle. The batteries that we use are rechargeable batteries. A member of our congregation has donated the cost of the new candle.

Canon David's wisdom, warmth, and unwavering dedication have left an indelible mark on both All Saints Church and the people of Luton.
