Mothering Sunday

Mothering Sunday – the fourth Sunday of Lent- offers families an opportunity to honour the women who have nurtured them. Lots of different streams and traditions have come together to make today's Mothering Sunday the special day that it is.

In the Middle Ages it was an occasion for everyone to visit their 'mother' church – the place where they had been baptised. Later, an opportunity for those who worked away from home to visit their mothers became added to the mix of reasons to make it a special day.

Today we honour all women who have in one way or another been special to us, and in church this is usually signalled by small bunches of flowers for every woman present. Treating mums and grans to Sunday lunch, chocolates and flowers is also part of the present mix. And will there be a simnel cake to be seen – a tradition from ages past – with its rich layers of marzipan, and eleven balls of marzipan on top, reminders of the 11 disciples who remained faithful to Jesus?

Not everyone has enjoyed a wonderful or enduring relationship with their mum, so lest we get carried away on a wave of love and

sentimentality, there is usually space in the Mothering Sunday church service to reflect on and pray for those whose relationships with their mother were not all they might have been.

Also, there are the families blighted by the lack of, or death of a child; families remembering a mum who died tragically young; women who never had a child but would have dearly loved the opportunity; all these and more are a recognition of the imperfections of human love, human life.

These imperfections can be brought in prayer to the God who mothers us. In the Old Testament, Isaiah speaks of God comforting His people like a mother hen. In the New Testament, both Matthew and Luke bear witness to Jesus expressing His desire to gather His people as a mother hen gathers her chicks under her wings. Yes, God has strong maternal qualities which He invites us to discover and enjoy!

Have you discovered the mothering, nurturing, maternal qualities which God offers to all people? It's lovelier than flowers, more long-lasting than simnel cake, better than a visit from family, and it's free to everyone who wants it – it could be yours!

All Saints' is continuing its commitment to Eco Church and is working towards the Silver Award, focussing this month on the Global and Community survey section.

We're inviting our church and community, to join with Eco Chester Diocese participating in a fun, one-week plastic count at home!

It's an eye-opening and empowering way to discover just how much plastic comes through our doors, while sparking creative and practical ideas for reducing it.

Even better, it gives us a fantastic chance to raise our voices together by contacting our MPs and encouraging manufacturers to cut back on plastic and improve recycling. Small actions, taken together, can lead to big, positive change!



To take part pick up a sheet at the back of church and count daily each piece of plastic that you put into your recycling bin. The form will help you to decide where each count goes.

We need to submit the count for the church on line by the 22nd of March so please return the forms to church from the 15th onwards so that the information can be compiled and submitted.





Naughty mummy





Recycling & Green Living Tips

Flowers to feed bees

Spring is a good time to think about new plants. Those which can feed bees throughout the year are very good so here are some ideas for plants to get in for next year:

Winter aconite: Carpets of yellow in January-February

Strawberry tree: Flowers and fruit at the same time!

Willow: Early catkins for hungry bees

Winter-flowering heather: Colourful, nectar-rich blooms


Winter honeysuckle: Highly fragrant, cream flowers

Native primrose: Woodland charm from March onwards

Evergreen clematis: Delicate winter blooms

Mahonia (Oregon grape): Scented flowers, bee magnets

Make your cleaning plastic-free

Look around your kitchen or bathroom, and chances are you'll be surrounded by a sea of microplastics. Many of these are hiding in plain sight: in your washing-up sponge, bin liners or the micro-fibre cloths you use for dusting. When objects like these break down, they release microplastics that can end up in the sea. And, as they can't be recycled, once discarded they will remain in landfill for hundreds of years. And those microplastics are going straight into the water system, ending up in our rivers and seas.



A much better option is to use a metal scourer. They may be a bit more expensive

to buy but they last much longer and can be recycled when they have died.

Microfibre cleaning cloths were once hailed as an eco-friendly alternative to throw-away wipes and paper towels, because they're washable and reusable. But microfibre cloths are made from plastic. And microfibre is arguably one of the worst causes of microplastic pollution – tiny plastic fibres are released not just when the cloths are disposed of, but every time they're washed. Bamboo cloths can be a good alternative. Bamboo is considered one of the most sustainable materials

available – it's fast growing, regenerates naturally, and uses less water during cultivation than cotton. And while it grows, bamboo absorbs carbon dioxide from the atmosphere.

Bamboo cloths are biodegradable when disposed of, and no plastic is released as they break down – because they're plastic-free.

Switch to soap bars

Almost two billion items of plastic packaging are thrown away in the UK each week. Shampoo, body wash and liquid hand wash add to this plastic pile-up - so switching from bottles to bars is better for the environment.

They are available for soap, shampoo for hair wash and conditioner.

Choose the ones that are unwrapped, wrapped in paper or cardboard rather than plastic.

Recycling Options in Shops

Many of the shops we go into are now recycling things that the council recycling does not accept. Most are inside just after the tills or when you go out to the door. It varies a bit from place to place but here are a few examples:

Tesco: our local Tesco store takes flexible plastics, make-up containers, printer cartridges and batteries. Shops that sell batteries have to have a recycling option.

The Aldi store also takes flexible plastics as do many Co-ops and Sainsbury's supermarkets.

Larger Boots stores take empty make-up containers, toothpaste tubes and medication blister packs. Some also take Novo Nordisk pre-filled insulin pens.

Check what your local store takes and when you go next, take it with you. .

Households waste one billion items every year that could be recycled

The UK's annual Recycle Week launched on Monday 14th October 2024 with a warning that households are wasting one billion items every year that could be recycled.

New statistics reveal billions of recyclable bottles, sprays and toilet roll tubes are facing incineration, or landfill.

Britain's most binned items include:

743 million yoghurt pots

84 million plastic trigger spray bottles
59 million aftershave/perfume bottles

126 million aerosols

Toilet roll tubes

Recent figures show UK recycling rates have fallen. While nine out of ten people regularly recycle, nearly eight out of ten put one or more items into the bin that could be recycled.

Week commencing the 9th of February was **Love Your Yew Tree Week**.


