brings its happy memories and its sadnesses, its hopes and its
regrets, its twin imposters of triumph and disaster.

After the advertisers have finished
promoting gym memberships,
fashionable diets and exotic holidays,
and commentators have given their

will no doubt settle back into that
familiar pattern of laughter and tears,

mixed up existence which makes up
our lives.

I remember a head teacher once
describing his school at me as “a

redemption are part of the Christian
faith. In the light of God's grace,
failure is something that I can
acknowledge - and then move on.
To know we are forgiven frees us
from guilt, self-pity and resentment.
It also allows us to forgive others
their failures.

Jesus invites us to pray, “Forgive us
our trespasses as we forgive those
who have trespassed against us” and
goes on to say, “Love your enemies,
do good to those who hate you,
bless those who curse you, pray for
those who ill-treat you. If someone
strikes you on one cheek, turn to
him the other also.”

To be able to acknowledge our
failures and so to be able to forgive
ourselves and others is one of
God's great gifts to our humanity.
**It would be a wonderful way
to start 2026. ■**

News from the Worldwide Church

Dark Days in Nigeria

Nigeria is a large and populous West African country whose 220 million people include many different and diverse cultures, peoples and languages including Yoruba, Igbo, Hausa, Edo and English. It is rich in natural resources especially oil and natural gas.

Approximately 46.3% of Nigerians are Christian and just over 50% are Muslim (mostly Sunni) with the remaining minority following traditional African religions. The majority of Christians live in the south of the country while Islam is much more dominant in the north and it is here that some Christians have found themselves under attack, both by Jihadist groups like Boko Haram and by criminal gangs.

The tensions and violence in the north first gained worldwide attention in April 2014 when 276 female students were abducted from the Government Girls Secondary School in the town of Chibok in Borno State by Boko Haram. Many girls have subsequently escaped or been rescued but over 100 are still missing.

In the last decade there have been several more school abductions carried out by both Islamic militants and by criminal gangs who have discovered that abductions can be a profitable enterprise and have garnered large sums of money from the payment of ransoms. Such payments have now been outlawed by the Nigerian government in an effort to curb this activity.



The most recent large-scale attack took place at St. Mary's Catholic and Secondary School in Papiri in the early hours of Friday 21st November when 303 pupils and 12 members of staff were abducted. Since then more than 50 girls have managed to escape but the vast majority are still unaccounted for. The identity and motivation of the armed group who attacked the school has not yet been ascertained.

There is certainly a lack of security in parts of northern Nigeria and there are examples of anti Christian violence attacks on churches but there is a lot of violence that is criminally motivated.

Since the attack on St. Mary's school there has been an attack on another school where 20 girls, all Muslim, were abducted and an attack on a church in Kwara state where 2 people were killed and 38 members of the congregation were abducted. In the latter case the gunmen have demanded a ransom of 100 million naira (roughly \$69,000) for each worshipper.

The Nigerian government is reluctant to accept that the violence has a religious dimension or that there is any persecution of Christians. A government spokesperson is quoted as saying: "Terrorists attack all who reject their murderous ideology – Muslims, Christians and those of no faith alike." ■



News from the Farm

What a vast array of weather happenings we have experienced over the last couple of months. From working in tee-shirt sleeves to digging out the thermal vests and leggings of late. We are always amazed at how well the animals cope with the daily changes, us being lucky that we can layer up or down as needed. So what is happening down on the farm at this time of year?

We run three different feeding systems through the winter with the cattle on our farm. The three systems being moorland cattle, housed cattle and fodder beat outwintering. Our Hill cows who are hardy, and at their happiest roaming the moorlands of the Inner Chagford commons, can tell when the season changes and bring themselves home for extra hay supplementation – these ladies and their babies know the area so very well, teaching it to the next generation. These are the group of cows with the tracker neck collars on and are currently on rough grazing land supporting environmental conservation, essentially replicating the role of wild herbivores that once roamed the land. Cows tend to have a non-selective eating style (wrapping their tongues around plants and pulling them up) which creates a diverse range of vegetation heights and open patches of bare soil, which is perfect for a wide range of wildflowers, insects and ground nesting birds. An aim we are really trying to work with on the farm. Cows regenerate new growth by leaving footprints on the ground where seeds can fall into and germinate and for different micro-habitats to form. Without these cows grazing that land, it would be smothered by bracken and gorse. Our housed cattle tend to be our older cows, slightly leaner ladies or cows that have reared twins – these cows are fed home grown silage and have the comfort of rubber mattress, which is lovely and springy – it's a lovely sight when you walk into the shed first thing and they are all fast asleep in their beds! We have trialled growing fodder beet for the last four years and have been very impressed with its performance. The cows really love the crop and come racing to the front every morning. We give them a fresh patch of the field by moving the electric fence daily – not a job for the faint hearted, having cows breathing down your neck whilst walking amongst giant fodder beets has its amusing moments. It has become a running joke with a

score board recording the slips and slides – Lydia 6, Geoff 4 and Nicky 1!!! These cows have a grassy field to sleep in with homegrown haylage given alongside the fodder beet giving them a balanced diet.

We have been calf rearing – why I hear you ask? Well, we are trying to grow the herd and to increase the bottom line, so we have purchased some baby calves to rear by hand. The key to healthy calves is attention to detail, having a good vet, bucketloads of patience and strong arm muscles!!

We don't have the luxury of hot water in the sheds.... yet (I'm working on that and may have added it to my Christmas list along with concrete!! Oh, what a treat it would be for a concrete lorry to rock up to the farm on Christmas morning!!). Rearing calves currently consists of carrying lots of hot water and whisking and mixing milk powder and then lugging said prepared milk over 5 bar gates and into the feeder to feed hungry calves that are rather keen and then get so excited that they then tend to try and bypass the feeder and go straight for the bucket! Needless to say, calf feeding is probably one of our favourite jobs on the farm but it's a messy one. Our neighbours walked past during feeding the other day and I could just smell the milk and milk powder in my hair – good look hey?? The aim with the calves is to feed them a good quality milk replacer, alongside a balanced pellet and adlib straw forage. Straw is fed, rather than hay to help with physical action of the 'scratch factor'. The physical abrasion from fibrous feed that simulates proper development of the rumen lining improving nutrient absorption

and promoting healthy microbial growth for better digestion and growth. It's a key part of getting calves eating dry feed early, helping them transition from milk to solid food and develop a robust digestive system. This batch of calves will be weaned off milk shortly and moved into barns, their shed disinfected ready for a new batch in Christmas week.

We have been lucky to have a few surprises in the form of baby lambs – keen rams and unusual weather patterns have been blamed rather than farmer error of leaving a gate open!!

We hope you all have had a happy and peaceful Christmas Cheers from the Arscotts aka the Great Weeke lot! ■

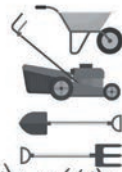

This was followed by a steep climb out of the valley and then down hill and back towards Dartmeet stopping to look at the coffin stone, an old resting place for coffin-bearers when carrying a body towards Widescombe churchyard for burial.

We soon arrived back in the car park at Dartmeet congratulating ourselves on not having had a drop of rain all day! **About 5.5 miles.** ■

News from Drewsteignton Holy Trinity

As a Christian living in a largely secular community, I am happy that the values of that community – its ethos and spirit – aligns itself completely with those values that the faith community of which I am a part profess in worship each week. Support for each other as we engage in common pursuits, honesty in our dealings and, above all, understanding the importance of kindness. This latter means trying to see the best in our neighbours, not dwelling on mistakes and trying always to give the benefit of the doubt rather than leaping to offence. Such ways of being characterise what we might call 'the well-being' of the whole community. They can help us to keep our village spiritually healthy and essentially relaxed – a good place to live and grow.

So, nothing distresses me more that when I see our Christian values being somehow hijacked and used to sow dissention, division and hatred. The image of Tommy Robinson and his supporters waving the crucifix and even chanting the Lord's Prayer is deeply, searingly distressing to me. And, although I am naturally sympathetic to the argument that religion and politics don't mix, I am nonetheless drawn to point out the manifest discrepancy between the ideas of the far right and the values of the Christian faith.

Insofar as the bible gives us a blueprint for life in a rural village, it is not one that would be recognised by those supporting Tommy Robinson. The blueprint, provided in Leviticus, is detailed and clear:

When you reap the harvest of your land, do not reap to the very edges of your field or gather the gleanings of your harvest. Do not strip your vineyard bare or gather its fallen grapes. Leave all this for the poor and the stranger.

Do not withhold until morning the wages due to a hired hand.

When a foreigner resides with you in your land, do not mistreat him. Treat the foreigner living among you as native-born and love him as yourself, for you were foreigners yourselves once...

This is definitely not an easy set of instructions to follow, and, undoubtedly, we all have our struggles as we try. And there are no nice 'get-out-clauses', no caveats; we are not told we only have to leave enough for others, for the stranger; if we have plenty for ourselves! But being kind and generous, rather than grabbing, selfish and mean are the positive directives that run right through our Christian faith like the name of the town through the stick of rock. Anyone who is arguing for a community of exclusion and sameness rather than a community of inclusion and diversity is supporting a politics of hate rather than a politics of love. Christianity has nothing in common with such a politics, and all the shouting and strident voices in the world will not make it so.

Meantime, in the quiet space of Holy Trinity, I savour both the peace of early morning when I open up and the tranquillity of late evening when I shut the church. In the morning, I light candles for those for whom I am particularly praying – currently



two babies, two young people and a friend who is ill. I check the Honesty Store – the only shop that the village now has – and I tidy the village space. The building itself enfolds me in its ancient and settled peace.

By contrast, the craft fair (below) provides a view of the church at its most bustling and busy!

Well over a hundred people come to see the wonderful crafts on view – everything from candles to crockery, from prints to posies and from wool craft to wood turning.



The café is on the go all day supplying soup lunches, teas and – of course! – cakes.

Anyone is welcome in Holy Trinity. People can come with

their children, their friends and their dogs. Come to sit quietly, to chat cheerfully or to play with toys. Come to buy essentials or to borrow a book. Come to light a candle and to meditate or pray, as the spirit moves you. Help us to engender a spirit of kindness in our community.

Nature Notes Eleanor Ludgate



I expect by now we are all keen to spot any signs of spring, luckily we always have a wonderful display of snowdrops in the churchyard in Chagford and these first come into flower towards the end of January, followed by a mass of crocus in mid-February, strangely though as I am writing this in November I have primroses coming into flower and bulbs coming up in my garden, confused I imagine by the very mild autumn weather we had last year.

We can also have some lovely crisp frosty days when all the twigs, dead grasses, and plants are covered in a beautiful coating of sparkling frost. At this time of year many of the smaller birds find it hard to get enough to eat when the ground is frozen solid, so on my walks I nearly always carry a small bag with crumbled digestive biscuits and fat pellets for them and the robins always seem to be very grateful for this and they even seem to remember me the next time I walk their way and wait expectantly!

Around the 18th of February the lesser celandines come into flower opening their shiny yellow petals wide on a sunny day. This shine is there because they have a layer of cells packed with white starch grains behind the petals yellow pigmented outer layer, which accentuates and scatters the light like a tiny reflector, giving the petals their bright glossy appearance. This is the same principle that makes vehicle reflectors and traffic lights shine. This reflective surface acts like a visual pointer to make the flowers stand out from their background and attract early pollinators such as queen bumblebees and brimstone butterflies. The lesser celandine is one of the first flowers to

emerge in the spring and is a crucial early source of nectar for insects that have been dormant over winter.

We often see a few goosanders on the rivers here at this time of year; they seem return to the same place each winter. They are lovely looking birds, the male having a dark green head, black back and white sides and a red beak. The female is a grey colour with a ginger head and orange beak, they have serrated bills for catching fish so they are not always popular with fishermen. Surprisingly they nest in trees along the river banks so it is helpful for them if we leave some of the older trees that are suitable nesting sites.

Later in February the great-tits have started to call to attract a mate and this call often sounds to me like "Machu Picchu", and I always like to listen out for this early sign of spring. ■

■ January 18th

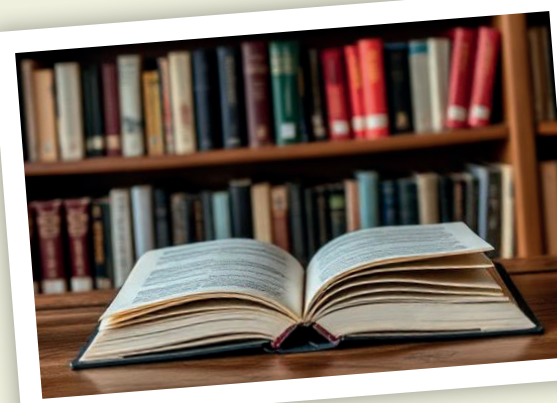

compelling poetry from writers experiencing that exciting yet harrowing time.

There were also memoirs from evacuees with some contrasted experiences of enforced country life, and a scholarly analysis of the unique effects of Churchill's great speeches. Spirits also had been lifted during those dark days by humour in cartoons and broadcast shows, so it was appropriate to include a classic Dad's Army sketch in 'radio' form.

The evening began with an evocative soundscape from Paul McCabe featuring sirens, aeroplanes and guns, followed by a procession of 'evacuee' children, complete with gas-mask cases who then sang Run Rabbit Run! with great aplomb and charm. The music of the era is always going to call to mind Vera Lynn, and We'll Meet Again, The White Cliffs of Dover and A Nightingale Sang in Berkeley Square brought nostalgic smiles to many faces, as did a toe-tapping saxophone medley of Glenn Miller favourites. A surprise for many was the specially composed piece of music 1945 by Will Carnell, consisting of the short movements War Heroes, The Battlefield (Sky, Land and Sea), Lament for the Victims of War, Patriots, and Victory March. Will is to be congratulated on bringing together twenty amateur musicians from the village to perform these inspiring themes.

There were 36 performers in the concert (which is why this piece cannot name them all), giving of their talents to help Chris make this special tribute. His own contributions of time, energy and patience were very much appreciated. ■

BERYL TRIST NEWMAN

– the Lustleigh Artist who 'lived to paint'



For the last three years Peter Mason has been researching the life and work of Beryl Trist Newman and he will be presenting his findings in an illustrated talk for the Lustleigh Society in January.

Beryl Trist, born in 1906, came to Lustleigh in the nineteen thirties and remained here for the rest of her life. She initially lived with the family doctor and his wife who had earlier retired to Lustleigh. The Muir's built a studio for her and, no doubt, encouraged her career. This was a time when she was being commissioned for book illustrations and portraits. During the Second World War she painted portraits of recipients of awards and recorded life at the Moretonhampstead Military Hospital.

In 1945 the Reverend Rupert Newman (1889 – 1961) was appointed Rector of Lustleigh and in the following year Beryl and Rupert were married. As well as fulfilling the role of a 'vicar's wife' Beryl continued with her art returning to it full-time after Rupert's death. She continued to draw, sketch and paint almost to the end when she died in Moretonhampstead Hospital in 1991.

Best known for her portraits she also painted landscapes inspired by her travels to South America, Indonesia, Norway, France and Switzerland, as well as the local Dartmoor scenery.

Beryl's story is a fascinating one which deserves to be better known. There will be people who remember Beryl or Rupert or both of them, but there is much in this story that will be new to many. The talk is open to all. ■
