Dear Friends,

Every year on Easter Sunday I get up very early – not to head up a hill for a dawn service, but to write rhyming clues for an Easter egg hunt. Whilst the family are still sleeping I assist the Easter Bunny in her work, hiding chocolate for my son to find around the house and, when the weather allows, in the garden. To add to the “fun” I write rhyming clues with hints as to where the chocolate treasure can be found.

In recent years my now adult son has joined in with good humour, although last Easter’s fruitless search may have dulled his enthusiasm slightly. After sending him off with the first clue he followed the trail, finding the chocolate and subsequent clues with the efficiency of someone who has been doing this since he learnt to walk. I was therefore surprised when he didn’t return after discovering the final clue. A little while later he found me hurrying out of the door for the first service of the day. “Where exactly did you hide the last egg, Mum?” It was then that I realised my error – I had forgotten to hide the last egg! Fortunately, once this was remedied and the chocolate haul was complete, I was forgiven.

The tradition of hiding eggs for others to find on Easter Sunday morning goes back a long way. In many pre-Christian societies eggs were associated with spring and new life. Early Christians adopted this symbolism, seeing the egg as a reminder of the resurrection and the empty shell as a metaphor for Jesus’ empty tomb. Some suggest that in the late sixteenth century the Protestant reformer Martin Luther encouraged the tradition of the Easter egg hunt. The men in his congregation would hide eggs for the women and children to find – a playful reminder of the resurrection story, in which the empty tomb was first discovered by women.

In John’s Gospel we read: “Early on the first day of the week, while it was still dark, Mary Magdalene came to the tomb and saw that the stone had been removed from the tomb.” Alarmed, she ran to tell the disciples, fearing that Jesus’ body had been taken away. But unlike my son’s search

for a missing chocolate egg, Mary returned to the tomb and found something – someone – she was not expecting. At first she thought he was the gardener. It was only when Jesus spoke her name that she recognised him. Mary had come expecting to tend the body of her friend and teacher. Instead she became the first person to meet the risen Christ, and the first to tell others: “I have seen the Lord!”

My carefully planned Easter egg hunts may sometimes go awry, but the message of Easter never does: life is stronger than death, hope is stronger than despair, and God’s love is stronger than anything that might seem to end the story.

May you find signs of that hope this Easter season.

On 16th April we are holding a coffee morning for the Palliative Care Support Trust (PCST) in Blantyre, Malawi. The PCST supports two clinics, one for adults, one for children at a large Hospital in Blantyre South Malawi. Palliative care aims to ease symptoms and so add life to days, rather than days to life when a patient has an end stage incurable disease. The PCST supports both adults and children with life limiting conditions, supporting them holistically, physically, emotionally/psychologically, socially and spiritually.

The hospital is always very short of medicines, often even running out of even basic drugs, the PCST tries to fill this gap for their patients and also prescribe specialist medicines to manage challenging symptoms caused by their illnesses. They also offer food supplements to help counter malnutrition and lessen the social burden for the family. A Chaplain and social worker are also part of the team to help with the spiritual and psychosocial needs of the patients and their carers.

One of the patients they have been supporting recently has been a 5 year old girl with an untreatable brain tumour, a neuroblastoma. When active treatment was no longer an option the child was discharged from the hospital and referred to the Palliative Care Team for ongoing support and symptom control. The Team conducted a home visit to undertake a holistic assessment focusing on the physical, psychological, social and spiritual dimensions of care.

Oral liquid morphine was prescribed to control the child's pain but the team noted that new symptoms of headache, loss of co-ordination and balance, and poor vision had developed indicating disease progression. Whilst they were explaining the significance of this to the child's young mother the mother broke down and was visibly distressed and emotional. She expressed feelings of being overwhelmed, helpless and with anticipatory grief for her only child. This reaction reflected the emotional pain of being a single parent, seeing her daughters condition deteriorate and also the mental exhaustion from prolonged caregiving without a support system.

Socially the family were vulnerable living in a small mud brick hut, with no constant income and little food, the mother having had to give up work to care for her daughter. The lack of extended family support or community resources left her feeling vulnerable, isolated and fearful. 5- Recognising this, the palliative care team took steps to provide nutritional support (with Likuni Phala, maize flour, soya pieces, milk and cooking oil) and also with psychosocial support. The social worker in the team contacted the village chief and the local church to see if any community support could be encouraged. Spiritually, the visit was supported by the presence of the part-time chaplain, who played a significant role in addressing the mother's spiritual needs. The mother shared that she believes in God and prays often. At her request, the chaplain led a brief prayer session which brought the mother a sense of comfort and peace. This moment was deeply moving for both the mother and the care team. It highlighted how spiritual care can provide strength, meaning and hope especially in times of deep emotional pain. This team have found this case particularly heart breaking and complex. It brings out the emotional depth of paediatric palliative care, especially when the primary caregiver is young, alone and unsupported. The scenario not only highlights the child's suffering, but also the emotional, psychological and spiritual impact the illness has on her mother. The case is a powerful reminder that palliative care extends beyond symptom control, as it also involves emotional and psychosocial care for the caregivers too who are often the invisible patients.

My mum doesn't live nearby, but we keep in touch by using the internet. I discovered today that she has been scammed into sending money to people she has never met, because she is very kind-hearted, and I think she has given away her bank details. Whatever can I do?

Online scammers take advantage of people's kindness, and some are very clever at gaining trust before they ask for money and bank details. It is very embarrassing to admit that you have been scammed, but the cleverest people can be caught out, and it's important to take action as soon as you can.

Check if she can get her money back: Tell her bank about the scam as soon as possible - they might be able to stop the transaction before it reaches the other account. If the transaction went ahead, she can ask for a refund. The bank will make a decision by looking at the evidence, e.g. emails, and they should reply within 15 working days.

Protect from further risks: If she feels personally threatened, she should call 999, and ignore all messages but report them to the police. Remind her to be very suspicious of requests for money from now on. Her bank should alter her account details to protect her, but keep an eye on her bank statements and look out for any unusual transactions. Also check her credit score to see if there are applications for credit you don't recognise. She should re-set her passwords and update her anti-virus software.

Report the scam: Report the scam to Citizens Advice, who will pass it on to other relevant organisations. Your mother's evidence could help them stop the scammer targeting other people, and she should not feel embarrassed about it.

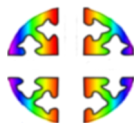

Spring bulbs in the Churchyard.

At this time of the year snowdrops and early crocuses can often be glimpsed through the vestry kitchen window. On closer inspection bees can be seen bobbing from crocus to crocus.

So, the Fabric Committee and PCC agreed that to encourage a spread of these spring bulbs, for this year we would experiment and leave cutting the grass on this, the north side of the Church until June. It's the area that is mainly in the shade of the tower and the Church building, creating a squared off area due north of the building and going across to the opposite wall.

It will be interesting to see what thrives in this new regime. A path will be kept mown from the front gate to the eastern part of the churchyard, through this new nature friendly area, but if it does start to become too overgrown the situation will be reassessed. Elspeth Jayne.

A thought for Easter...
