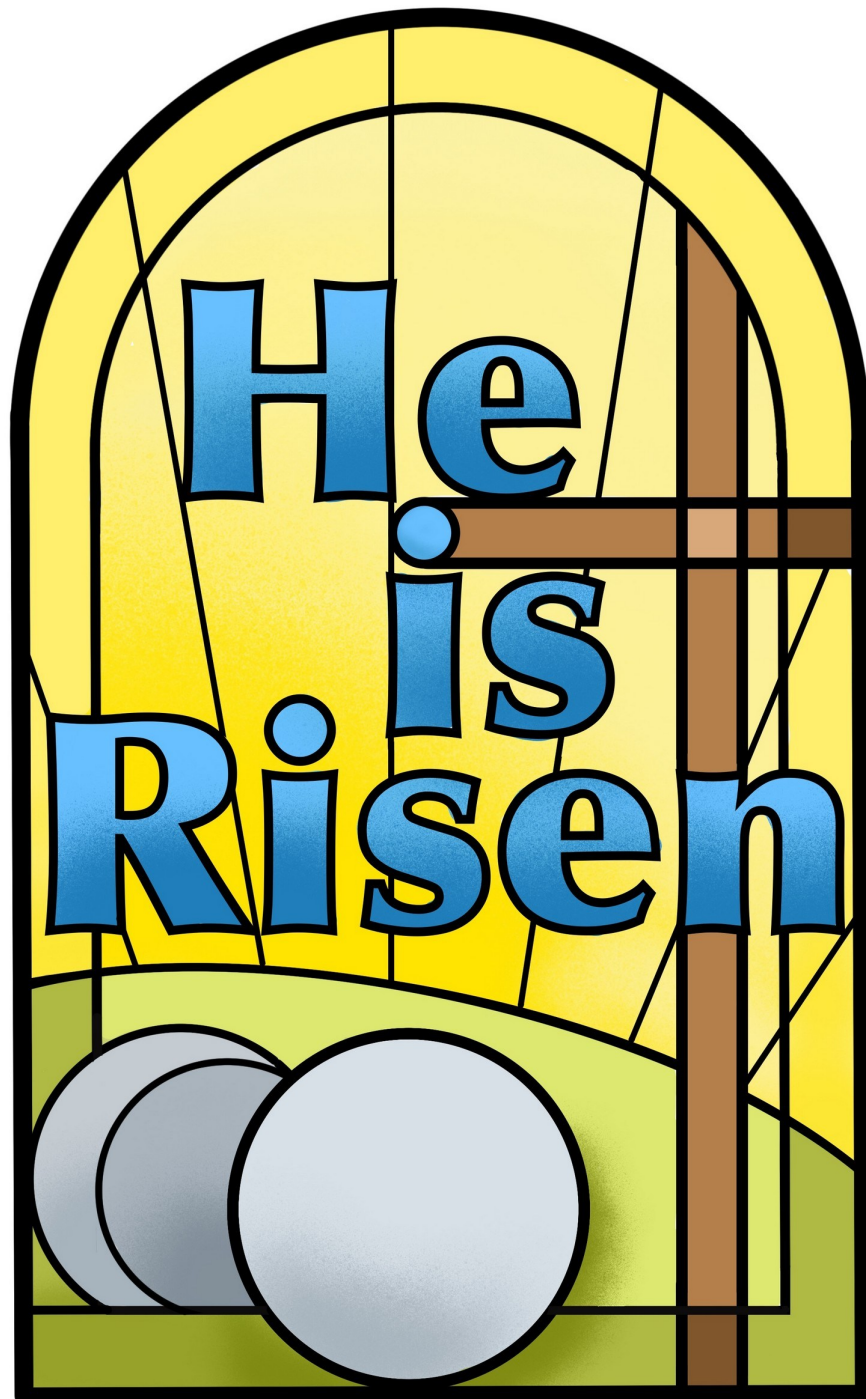

Will you walk with Jesus this Holy Week?

In 2022 I did a 30 silent retreat at St Beuno's Spirituality Centre. Known as Full Spiritual Exercises they follow a pattern set down by St Ignatius of Loyola. The first two days were preparation, laying down all the activities we had left behind, and preparing to enter the stillness and quiet of four daily meditations. We were shown three paintings by a 16th Century Italian painter, Giovanni Battista Moroni. Each painting was of a religious scene and Moroni had painted himself in each painting. But there was a progression from him observing the scene from outside, to being on the edge of the scene and then being a waiter at the Last Supper - he was actively in the scene. Our spiritual guides hoped that as the meditations went on we would all find ourselves actively in the scene. We all found this to be the case. It was extraordinary, it was amazing. The Holy Spirit working within our imaginations so much so that I had conversations with Jesus, with his mother Mary, and with the disciples and had a sense of them being with me.

After some introductory meditations that laid the foundations, we started with the birth of Jesus - in my imagination I was a junior midwife - and progressed through Jesus' life, picking out key events and healings. Then we moved into the final 24 hours of his life and this took 7 days of repeating two meditations per day, each day a progression from the previous, culminating in his death on the cross - waiting for him to die. We were immersed in each scene, each trauma, each pain, each act of violence. I vividly remember Jesus saying after he had been whipped, "Why do they hate me so?"

The humanity of Jesus came through very powerfully. Yet also his inner strength and courage and we were called to walk with him in those final hours, to accompany him so that he had one friend alongside him, encouraging, supporting him. So we shared his pain, his sorrow, his disbelief at the cruelty of those he encountered in those hours. We saw his resolve to go through with it and his determination to keep to the path and not deter from it - death on a cross. Jesus, God's Son, did this for us - for you, for me. All because he wanted to

rescue us from sin and death and open the gate to heaven for us. This is costly love. How easy it is to let it pass us by without understanding how costly.

As we enter Holy Week, those final hours of Jesus, will you walk with him? Will you meditate on how costly it was? We tend to shy away from pain, avoid it, but if we do not reflect on each part of the Passion Of Christ, if we do not immerse ourselves in them then we miss out on the enormity of God's love and his willingness to die for each one of us. The more we engage, the more we will know the truth, and the more that the joy of Easter becomes a life transforming, life enriching, life giving liminal experience that alters forever how we live our lives in grateful thanks for all that God has done for us.

So I encourage you, spend time in Holy Week meditating upon the Biblical accounts of the last hours of Jesus, let them impact you, let them make you weep as you walk with Jesus, and then the incredulous truth and wonder of Resurrection on Easter Sunday will lift your soul so that you will join the heavens in declaring the wonder and grace of God - Christ is risen. He is risen indeed. Alleluia.

Iran

(article written prior to the start of hostilities)

The situation in Iran is sobering, yet full of hope. Partners have reported an increased openness to the Gospel, while also requesting prayer for persecuted Iranian Christians.

Religious life in Iran is changing. Official figures indicate that 98% of people in Iran are Muslim (89% Shia, 9% Sunni). By contrast, in a 2020 survey by the Netherlands-based GAMAAN research group, only 37.2% of respondents identified closely with Islam (32.2% Shia and 5% Sunni). In a 2024 survey, 70% of Iranians opposed the continuation of the Islamic Republic.

The number of Christians in Iran has increased dramatically since the 1979 revolution. There are now hundreds of thousands of believers in Iran – perhaps even more than a million. Modern media has played a key role, with 24/7 satellite television opening windows into homes, creating new opportunities for the Gospel to reach hearts.

Iran, however, remains a highly authoritarian state. Estimates vary, but the number of people killed during anti-government protests in January 2026 could be more than 30,000. At least nineteen Christians are confirmed among those killed, and authorities sought to blame “house churches” (made up of Christian converts) for causing the unrest.

As well as being treated with suspicion and hostility as apostates from Islam, Farsi (Persian)-speaking Christians in Iran are considered enemies of the state and are often charged with national security offences.

Bangladesh – Christian leaders cautiously welcome election outcome

Church leaders in Bangladesh are expressing cautious optimism following the recent election results, which saw a secular political party secure victory. Minority Christian communities had entered the election period with deep anxiety, fearing that extremist influence might increase and lead to greater restrictions or violence.

Bangladesh’s Christians make up less than one per cent of the population and often live as vulnerable minorities, particularly in rural areas. In recent years some communities have reported harassment, intimidation and sporadic attacks, leaving many believers feeling insecure about the future.

The election result has been welcomed as a sign that democratic institutions remain intact and that a more inclusive political environment may continue. Church leaders hope that the new government will prioritise the protection of all citizens regardless of religious affiliation and will address the underlying tensions that have affected minority communities.

Many believers are also using this moment as an opportunity to witness through service, community development and peaceful coexistence with neighbours of other faiths. They pray that Bangladesh will move toward greater stability, justice and harmony for all its people.

Pakistan – nurses acquitted

Two Christian nurses have been acquitted after more than four years under the threat of life imprisonment. Maryam Lal and Newosh Arooj were accused in 2021 of committing “blasphemy” at a hospital in Faisalabad after allegedly removing a sticker bearing a Quranic text from a cupboard.

The accusation quickly escalated. Hospital staff staged protests, extremists joined demonstrations, and both women received death threats. Maryam was even stabbed during the unrest before police intervened. The women spent five months in prison before being released on bail, yet their ordeal continued through prolonged legal proceedings and constant fear.

In November 2025 a court ruled that the accusations were unsubstantiated, and the deadline for appeal has now passed, confirming their acquittal. During the four-year trial, both nurses were unable to work and lived under severe restrictions. Their case highlights how “blasphemy” allegations are often used to settle personal disputes, particularly against vulnerable religious minorities.

Heather's report - March 2026

Blue Badges

We inherited quite a backlog of applications for these, when we took over in May. We are drafting in new staff and those areas will now be coming down. By law any application must be processed within 12 weeks, so Shropshire has now introduced 3 months grace for every badge holder. This means that you can use badges for up to three months after it expires on Shropshire Council sites (car parks and on street parking) without getting a ticket. Shropshire Council is also trying to persuade the hospital to extend its period of grace from 1 month to 3.

Road Repairs

As we go to press the Rowley Road should be being resurfaced, with the landslip on the same road stabilised and repaired in the autumn. Other roads hopefully to be resurfaced over the next few months include the Rorrington to Priest Weston Road and the road from Alberbury to the Powys Border. This is in addition to work being done by our pothole gangs – increasingly 'in-house', council-employed teams who we can manage more effectively.

Also, Shropshire is extending the contract of one particularly effective contractor - locally-based MULTEVO - who use state-of-the-art machines to

resurface whole strips of potholed roads. From 1st April, their work is now being extended from A and B roads to C-class side roads.

Lastly, the Council has secured money from the government specifically (i.e. ring-fenced) to improve our roads. We will receive an additional £1.2m in 2026/7 and £5.3m on top in 2027/8.

Heating Oil Prices

Congratulations to Lara from the Stiperstones Inn for appearing on national and Regional TV to highlight how the current hike in oil prices will impact on those of us in rural areas who rely on oil or (like me) propane.

Economic Development

Last some of you may have heard of the Government's initiative to set up Combined Authorities involving different councils. This is not an attempt to merge Councils but rather an attempt to get neighbouring Councils (e.g. Shropshire and Telford) to work more efficiently on economic development.

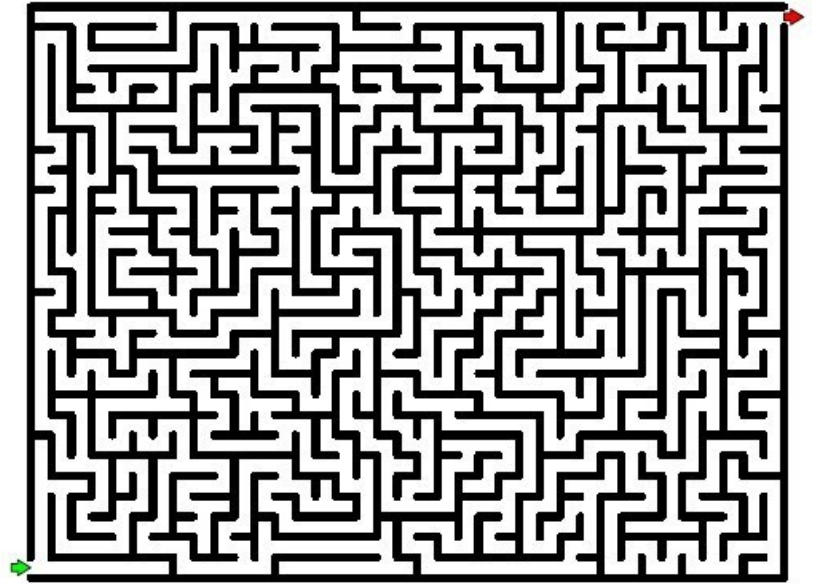

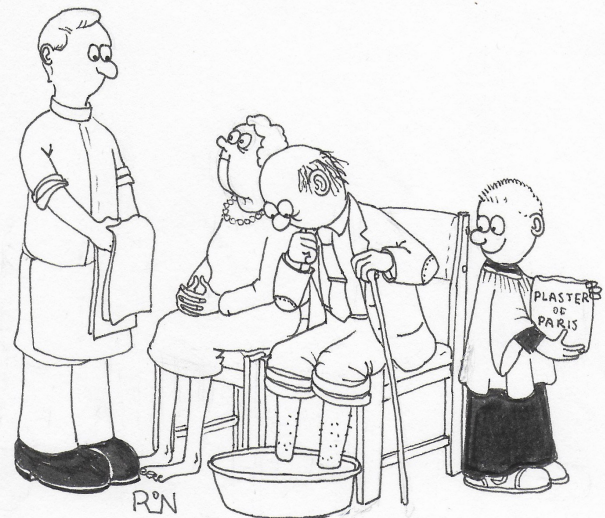


Easter Wordsearch

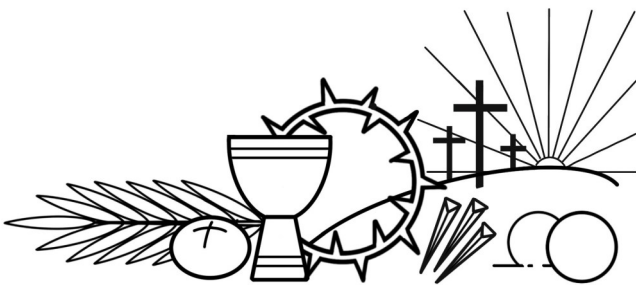

You are welcome to attend the short services without doing the walk, or just complete part of the walk. Well behaved dogs on leads very welcome!

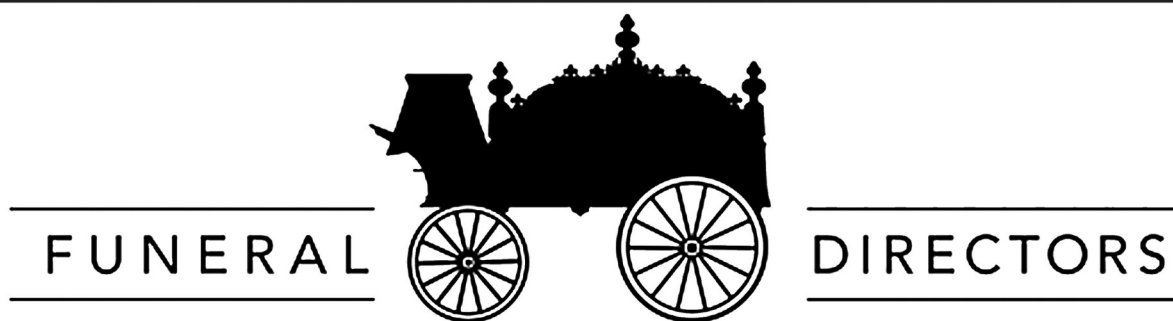

Preventing Heating Oil Theft

With the cost of heating oil rising over recent weeks due to the conflict in the Middle East, so has the risk of being targeted by heartless thieves looking to steal it. Below are some steps to help prevent the theft of heating oil.

Location of the tank – The tank’s position can have a significant effect on its vulnerability. If it’s too close to the house and overlooked, then the thief may consider the chances of being seen too high. If it’s close to the road or other access points, then it may be an easier target. Many tanks are hidden behind the garage or other structures which could be an advantage to the thief. Therefore, these security measures should be considered:

Padlocks - Robust closed-shackle padlocks offer the most resistance to bolt croppers.

Oil level gauges - Consider using oil level gauge alarms, these remote-control alarms activate if the tank level suddenly drops or falls below a quarter full.

Proximity alarms - Battery operated motion sensor

alarms can make an audible alarm and some can also alert designated mobile phones that monitor activity detected around the tank.

Security lighting - If your tank is visible from your home, this can deter thieves. Low level ‘dusk to dawn’ or motion detection lighting can be an effective crime deterrent.

CCTV - This can be set up to watch over an isolated tank and also act as a deterrent to thieves.

Defensive planting – Consider the planting of thorny bushes to prevent entry to the tank, also the addition of walls, fences or trellis can help to hide the shape or site of a green heating oil tank.

Report it - if the crime is happening now call [999](tel:999); if you are unsure, we’d rather hear about it and decide if a theft is occurring. If it is safe to do so, take photos of suspects or the number plate of their car (do not approach suspects, as they have been known to use violence).

QR CODE FRAUDS

QR Codes have been around for several decades now but have become more prominent in the last few years. It is also forecast that in the near future QR codes will be gradually replacing bar codes on products. So once again criminals are seizing the opportunity to use malicious QR Codes to steal money, and personal information.

The majority of QR code scams reported so far have been in open spaces such as station and car park machines, so always check the QR code sign to see if appears to have been tampered with, or has another label stuck on top of it.

However, QR codes are now appearing in greater numbers in phishing emails, often now called "Quishing." Criminals realise that the public are now more aware of the dangers on clicking on links in unsolicited emails, so are using QR codes instead to direct the recipient to a malicious website. Whilst most QR codes are genuine, it is always worth just taking a few minutes to carry out the following checks.

How can you avoid being scammed by fake QR codes?

- Preview the QR code link. The URL should appear on your phone when you scan a QR code. Make sure the URL seems legitimate and that it isn't a misspelling of a real URL.
- Check for tampering. If you're scanning a QR code that's in a public place, like a restaurant or a car park ticket machine, make sure the QR code doesn't have a sticker on top of the original. If in doubt, try paying by a different method where possible.
- Check the website. If you follow the QR code link, does the website seem professional? Low-quality images and typos are always signs of fake websites. Look for a lock symbol next to the URL or https:// in the URL to show these are genuine.
- When in doubt, contact the company. If you receive an unusual email or letter in the mail from a business with a QR code, contact the business to determine if the message is

legitimate.

- Never scan or open QR codes from unknown sources. Whether you're approached online or in the street, don't scan QR codes from people that you don't know. And always lookout for "too good to be true" messages, such as gifts or free products if you scan their QR code.

- If using a downloaded App to scan QR codes, make sure you obtain it from a trusted source such as Apple or Google Play Store. However most modern phones now have a built-in scanner anyway.

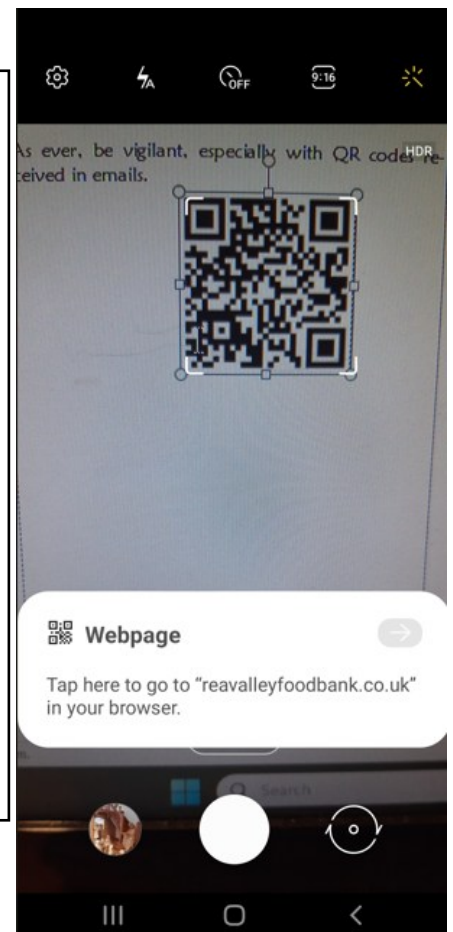
A further use of QR codes to defraud victims by criminals is known as "BRUSHING". Typically, this is used to create false consumer reviews by sending out "gifts" to multiple recipients then using those names and addresses to create favourable consumer reviews in their name unknowingly. A twist to this type of fraud however is to include a QR Code inside the package which claims to let you know who sent the "gift".

NEVER, scan this QR code as it can potentially download all the personal and financial information on your phone including any bank account details if you have Banking Apps on your phone.

As ever, be vigilant, especially with QR codes received in emails.

This screenshot shows my phone camera looking at a QR code allegedly from Rea Valley Foodbank. You can see that the white box shows the name of the website I will be taken to if I click on it. If in doubt I can look up that website 'manually' rather than clicking the link.

In this case it IS genuine!

Questions you might ask

Question – If I get a call from my bank, I am now suspicious as you hear so much about fraud. What is the advice if 'my bank' says it is calling me?

Answer – You are right to be suspicious as nearly 75 percent of attempted frauds are conducted via telephone, with 60% through voice calls and 11% via text messages.

The Safety Advice is:

If you receive a suspicious call about your bank account or finances, hang up immediately and dial 159. This free service, now available to 27 UK banks and building societies, covering over 99% of UK current accounts, connects you directly to your bank's fraud team, helping protect you from scams.

Fraudsters often create a sense of urgency, pressuring you to move money or share personal details quickly. Remember - your bank will never ask you to transfer money to a 'safe account' or pressure you into making immediate decisions.

If in doubt, always hang up and call 159 to verify whether the call was genuine. Since its launch in 2021, over one million calls have been made to 159 so taking a moment to check could save you from significant financial loss.

Question – I find it difficult to get an appointment at my GP surgery, sometimes having to wait two weeks or more? Is there anything I can do?

Answer – Yes, you may be able to if you have a community pharmacy.

Pharmacy First is an NHS England initiative launched in 2024. With **Pharmacy First**, you can walk into your local community pharmacy and ask for a private consultation with a pharmacist. They can assess symptoms, give advice, and in some cases provide NHS treatment — all without needing to see a GP first.

This is especially helpful for:

- Older adults needing quick advice
 - Families with children who are unwell
- Carers supporting relatives

There are over 10,000 participating pharmacies in England, meaning most local pharmacies can offer this service. Just go in and ask: "Can I have a **Pharmacy First** consultation, please?"

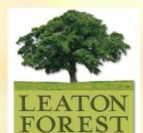
