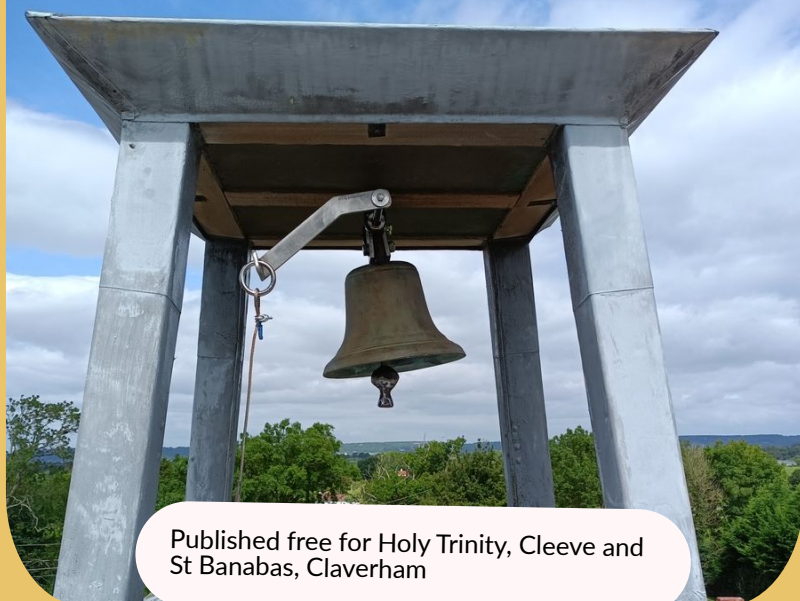

Welcome to your May Messenger

Rev'd Daile writes -

The Prodigal Son is one of those Bible stories we know so well. But in the light of our Lent Course on Modern Day Slavery, I want to share with you this article written by **Lois Bosatta** from The Clewer Institute. In her article she offers a different perspective and suggests that it can teach about forced labour, 'choiceless choices', the shame and trauma of returning 'home' and the hope of welcome and restoration. She writes -

At this time of year, the Church reflects on the death and resurrection of Jesus, and what it means to us. We talk of redemption, the merciful restoration of our relationship with God, and the future when Jesus returns to conquer death, violence, abuse and sadness.

This epic demonstration of love echoes the care that God the Father shows for people throughout the Bible, especially the most vulnerable and marginalised. This applies, too, for people in exploitation and slavery who we read about in scripture. For example, when God first starts to relay his vision for society to his people, He makes provisions for the poor and those in debt through work and patterns for liberation and declares that the society representing him should not exploit or financially, physically or sexually abuse workers. In the New Testament, the apostle Paul advocates for welcome, belonging, reconciliation and even leadership for ex-slave Onesimus, in his letter to his previous owner, Philemon.

One story you might not have noticed, is in the parable of the prodigal son. A man born into privilege finds himself in a place of such desperation and shame that he feels his only option is to give himself to servitude - in this case a kind of debt bondage - to a pig farmer.

I remember being told that this was shameful and his own 'rock bottom' due to the Jewish relationship with swine. In fact, the Greek says he 'joined himself to' this local man who set him to work, for no food or shelter. Doesn't this sound like bondage, a false job advert that ended up exploiting the man for his labour? It also reminds us that none of us, however privileged, are immune from situational changes which make us vulnerable to exploitation



These kinds of 'choiceless choices' exist in many parts of the world where formal employment isn't an option, and a person has to say yes to any opportunity where they might have their basic needs taken care of, only to find themselves being exploited because of a false promise of work. Survivors often find it very hard to return 'home', not only when 'home' doesn't exist because of war or climate devastation, but also when relationships are damaged because a community doesn't understand the complexities of their experiences.

A researcher once explored some of the issues around survivors returning home. Some faced disappointment or embarrassment as they returned without money and success, experiencing stigma, suspicion or gossip from friends and neighbours about their past. Some survivors also struggled with coping mechanisms and trauma which impacted their relationships, feeling guilt and shame about what transpired...

Of course, unlike many in situations of forced labour and debt bondage, the son in the parable remembered he had a home to go to and was able to eventually leave, knowing he had a place to belong even if he might not hope to regain his status. The father comes running out to welcome him, not as a slave or farmhand but as his son, honoured despite his previous choices or his latter circumstances.

This kind of welcome is what God longs to give every person who has hit rock bottom, feels ostracised, has been exploited or enslaved. That restored relationship from shame to 'sonship' is what Jesus made possible.

The journey of recovery from the traumas of such abuse can be a long road, and community can be an essential enabler of this. Community – or chosen family – is a place where we can feel seen, be shown grace and be supported to re-establish life after enslavement.

This story might prompt us to think about how we can provide such welcome and careful accompaniment to survivors who might become part of our communities.

Christian Aid Week, 10th - 16th May



Myra is our Christian Aid Organiser and has had a heart for Christian Aid since she first started collecting house to house for them in 1958 when she was 18.

A bit of history- Christian Aid was started by the Protestant Churches in England to help and support the millions of refugees and those suffering from poverty and hunger in Europe and across the world after the Second World War.

Christian Aid works in 26 of the poorest countries in the world. In Kenya, it is partnered and supporting Beacon of Hope, an organisation which is helping the people in a densely sprawling settlement of Nairobi where Fridah, a widow, lives with her twin sons, daughter and grandson in a rented corrugated metal shelter, struggling to feed the family and to pay school fees to educate her children. continued...

However, her life has been changed by Beacon of Hope who have trained and equipped her, and many others to cultivate the urban area in which she lives. She is now able to both feed her family from her produce and make a small income by selling excess vegetables at local markets. Camera, Lights Action!

On Monday 30th March, a group of volunteers visited Court de Wyck School to share the story of Easter with Kingfisher Class (children in year 3 and 4).

The story was told through the lens of a movie set, complete with clapper boards, props, characters and a movie set map. Children visited each of the 5 locations and imagined scenes from the last week of Jesus life.

They were encouraged to think about how each Camera, Lights Action! part of the story made them feel, and to wonder what questions they might ask.

A whole mix of emotions was experienced, and children had the chance to choose emoji stickers to describe how they felt. The children shared how they were angry, sad, confused and happy as they heard the different parts of the story.

The questions children wanted to ask were inciteful. I wonder if you have ever asked these questions – the children did!

Why do people hate Jesus?

Why were the religious leaders jealous?

Why can't the people stop being horrible?

Judas, why did you betray your friend?

How could his friends fall asleep?

Why did the Soldiers arrest Jesus when he had done nothing wrong?

Some children wanted to encourage Jesus, and wrote words like: I won't leave you. I'm sorry this happened to you. Are you ok? Be strong.

And then when we learnt about Jesus rising from the dead, our thoughts turned to thanks and some of the children shared the following messages for Jesus.

'You really are God's Son' . 'You are the best.' 'Thank you for dying for us!'



As the children experienced the Movie Set, they created their own box of items, from a key ring, a pocket hug, to a bookmark to help remind them of the story – and to help them tell others what they had learnt. Which is what happened later in the week when Kingfisher led the Easter Service and retold the story of Easter to the rest of the school and parents who had come to watch. It's a wrap!

Pattern of Services in Cleeve with Claverham



For the last few months the PCC have been considering the pattern of services in our Benefice. A decision was made that on the fourth Sunday there would only be one service and that would be Café Church. This was for several reasons, including the availability of people to lead the service, and the low attendance as most people attend Café Church.

Following these concerns, I have decided to extend this trial period for a further six months. This means that on the fourth Sunday there will be a service of Morning Worship at 10am at St Barnabas, however, if I am unable to find anyone to take the service or people willing to help there will not be a service.

I understand that Café Church isn't for everyone, but to have a service at St Barnabas on the fourth Sunday requires people who would be willing to read, open the church, operate the sound system and lead the service. These people need to be from among those who do not wish to attend Café Church. If this is you, please let me know and I can share with you what is required.

Can I ask everyone to check the Messenger for the services each month, as over the next few months there are some subtle changes to the

rota, including group services, patronal services, a pet service at Bickley and to see if there is a service on the fourth Sunday at St B. To help keep everyone informed we will print two months of services in the Messenger.

Rotas – to make compiling the rota easier, and less time consuming, we will have one list of readers/intercessors – which means you may be on the rota to read or lead prayers at either or both Holy Trinity or St Barnabas.

Rev'd Daile writes - Your Ekklesia needs you

Ekklesia was a word used frequently by Bishop Alastair when speaking about the church during the Lent Course. The Greek word means a community – a group of people who have been called out, drawn out from society to be witnesses to the light of Christ in the communities in which they live.

At our APCM on 19th April, Daile reminded us that we should see ourselves not as a church - as in today's world the word church isn't always helpful – but as an ecclesia..

We were also reminded that we all have a role to play in the ecclesia, and we were asked to consider our interests and experience and answers to the following questions –

What can I do to help?

Is there a role I can be involved in to help ensure no one is over-burdened?

We are a community, and so do I know someone in the community who might be willing to support us in a particular way?

How do we build on what we already do well?

When you have answered these questions, don't wait to be asked, speak to Daile or one of the deputy Church Wardens to see what happens next.

Mothers' Union

The Cleeve & Claverham Mothers' Union Worldwide Lunch will be held this year on **Wednesday 17th June**, from 12noon until 2pm in Cleeve Village Hall. **This event is open to all.**

The meal will consist of a hot jacket potato with a good choice of tasty fillings, various delicious pudding and tea/coffee. There will be a cake stall and a raffle.

All proceeds are for the Mothers' Union Worldwide Fund, which enables valuable work to be carried out both in the UK and abroad.

At our meeting last week we welcomed Jenny Pascoe who came to talk to us about her involvement with The Great Western Air Ambulance Charity.

A couple of years ago Jenny's husband collapsed at the bowls club. A 999 call resulted in the attendance of 2 category 1 ambulances, followed by the Air Ambulance helicopter. Sadly this was not enough to save him, but - as Jenny said - 'When God closes a door He opens a window'.

Her 12 year old granddaughter Sophie did some research, and discovered that it cost over £2000 just to get the helicopter off the ground. The GWAAC is totally charity based, and last year it cost over £4m just to keep flying.

Currently they are extremely worried about the rising cost of fuel. Staying free of government funding does have the advantage of leaving them free to train their own medics and operate without red tape.

The helicopters are able to land on the BRI, thus getting patients to the Heart Institute or Childrens' Hospital without having to cope with road traffic

Sophie decided to raise money for this charity by doing a long distance swim, over a given period of time. She raised thousands of pounds by swimming 21 miles, equivalent to The English Channel!

She has received a national 'young fund raiser' award, coming second in the country. Sophie still continues with her sponsored swimming, and the family was invited to visit the GWAAC base. It was a wonderful experience, and Sophie happened to mention that for the last 10 years of her nursing career Jenny had taught Basic Life Support.

This was Jenny's 'window' opening: she now goes round on behalf of the GWAAC, giving talks and practical demonstrations on life support; mainly to secondary school pupils - years 7 to 10, but also to other groups. Apparently using a defibrillator is part of the school curriculum in many European countries, and the rate of survival is much higher than in this country.

We can still learn CPR, though for those of us who learned our timing to the rhythm of Nellie the Elephant, we are out of date - there is a modern Baby Shark to replace our old Nellie! It seems likely that we at Holy Trinity and St Barnabas may soon experience one of Jenny's training courses for ourselves.

Jenny has been shocked to see the deprivation in some of the areas where she has been to do her demonstrations in schools, and realises how important things like packs to stem bleeding in cases of stabbing are. These are called Blunt Trauma packs. It was reckoned that about 70 per cent of children in some areas take weapons to school.

It is important for people of all ages to know where defibrillators are situated. Many schools, sports clubs, village halls, pharmacies etc now have defibrillators installed. They come with clear instructions on use and it can be a life saver if someone has the courage to use it, or encourage someone else to go ahead and use it.

As well as dealing with cardiac incidents, the air ambulance teams are able to deal with severe bleeding/stabbing/road traffic accident incidents, they can perform a caesarean or an amputation if necessary. When it is too dark to fly there are rapid response vehicles.

They truly do take the hospital to the patient wherever they are needed, thus giving the patient the best possible chance.

Thank you Jenny for that very interesting and informative talk.
