Seeing the Big Picture

Not so long ago I travelled to London and went with my sister to see an exhibition of Turner and Constable paintings at the Tate Gallery. Marking 250 years since their births, the exhibition explored Turner and Constable's intertwined careers and importance. Over 170 paintings, sketchbooks and personal items belonging to the two artists were on display.

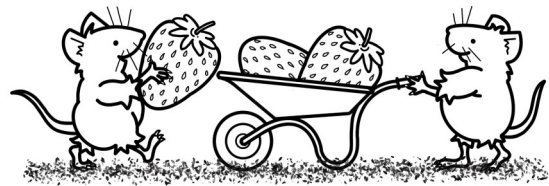
Throughout our childhood, and for much longer, our mother had a print of Constable's 'The Hay Wain,' on her wall. I remember she got it by collecting coupons from Persil Soap Powder packets. It measured less than 3' across. So one of the surprises when you see the original of this and other famous paintings, is how large they are. They dwarf the visitor, filling whole walls of the gallery. Up close you can make out the individual brushstrokes, but you need to stand well back to take in the whole picture.

We may be familiar with Bible stories - at Christmas and Easter we focus on the details of the life of Jesus - but like those vast paintings sometimes it is good to stand back and see how these stories fit together into God's big picture, the story of his love for humanity and his purpose to transform the whole world.

Both Turner and Constable were famous for the way they depicted the natural world in their paintings, sometimes with scenes of the gentle English countryside, sometimes showing the raw power of the weather, and majestic and towering mountain ranges. It is a reminder of the variety of God's creation that surrounds us every day, and yet we do not always notice it.

Many of Constable's paintings are of his home county of Suffolk. If you look carefully you will often see a church tower peeping through the trees in the distance, pointing towards the heavens. The church was important to Constable as a bulwark and firm guide for society. Today the church's place is less certain, but it still holds a valued place in many of our communities. As churches now, we are also called to look to God as our guide and strength, and to be part of his big picture of love for all the world.

As we step into June our villages seem to come alive in a different way. The hedgerows are fuller, gardens begin to flourish, and fields that only weeks ago looked bare now promise harvest. The vibrant and sunshine yellow, even on our rainiest of days, of rapeseed brightens the fields. There is something deeply reassuring about the rhythm of rural life. The seasons remind us that growth often happens quietly and steadily, even when we do not immediately notice it.

June also brings with it lighter evenings and, for many, a little more time spent outdoors — chatting over garden gates, walking the footpaths, or simply pausing to enjoy birdsong before the busyness of the day begins. These small moments matter more than we sometimes realise. They remind us that community is built not only in grand events, but in kindness, neighbourliness, and shared life together.

Children, and their teachers I suspect, in our local schools look forward to the end of the school year, and the long awaited summer holidays are within touching distance.

In the Church calendar, we move towards Pentecost, often called the birthday of the Church. There is also something hopeful about this time of year for those of us who live rurally. We know that life is never without challenges: farming worries, rising costs, illness, loneliness, and uncertainty can weigh heavily. Yet June teaches us patience and trust. Seeds planted long ago finally begin to show their promise. Perhaps that is a lesson for us too — not to lose heart when things seem slow or difficult, because goodness often grows beneath the surface before we can see it clearly.

As a curate in the benefice and village I grew up in, I continue to be grateful for the warmth and generosity that make our villages such special places. Whether you are a regular churchgoer or simply someone who enjoys reading the parish magazine with a cup of tea in hand, please know that our churches remain places of welcome, prayer, friendship, and hope.

May this June bring you moments of peace, reasons to smile, and the reassurance that you never walk alone.

India – Four Christians beaten by extremists for refusing to give up their faith

A Christian family is suffering persecution at the hands of extremists in the state of Chhattisgarh. A married couple and their two children were beaten by a mob and left with serious injuries. The attack in Asrith village, Korra Gram Panchayat, Sukma District, took place on 14th April.

The attackers attempted to force the four – Sodi Motu, Sodi Paik, Vetti Shanthi and Madvi Mangl – to undergo Ghar Wapsi, a ceremony of reconversion to Hinduism. The injured victims were transported to Sukma Government Hospital for medical treatment.

This was a repeat attack by the extremist group who had targeted the family two years ago. Although a police complaint was filed at that time, the case has not yet been heard in court. In March 2026 Chhattisgarh passed a new Freedom of Religion Bill (commonly referred to as an anti-conversion law) that strengthens the law regulating religious conversions, criminalising those believed to be obtained through force, fraud or allurement.

Extremists often wrongly believe that such laws criminalise all conversions from Hinduism, or even that they outlaw any form of Christian worship.

Pakistan – Truck rams into Easter procession leaving dozens injured

Christians in Pakistan were attacked while celebrating our Lord’s resurrection on Easter Sunday. At least one person was killed and more than sixty people were injured after a truck rammed into an Easter Day procession near Mariamabad in Wazirabad district of Punjab province on 5th April.

The incident occurred around 1am after about two hundred Christians gathered for a midnight Easter vigil. Participants in the procession overturned the truck to release injured people under it. The driver, identified as Muhammad Bilal, fled the scene, his passenger was taken into custody, and the vehicle was impounded. Police have initiated a criminal investigation.

Around 15 to 20 of the most seriously injured were taken to hospital in Gujranwala, about 60 miles away, where one man, Ifran Masih, a brick kiln labourer, later died from injuries. More than forty others were treated at the scene.

Eyewitnesses confirmed that the incident was not accidental but a premeditated and well-planned terrorist attack; the driver’s road ahead was clear, yet he chose to ram the procession at high speed.

Church organisers refuted police claims that they had not been informed in advance about the procession. They said police had agreed to provide security on the day which never materialised.

Mariamabad regularly stages Christian festivals. Believers assembled in large numbers for processions are seen as easy targets for extremists. A Christian man was shot dead while on his way to an annual festival in Mariamabad in September 2025.

Iran – concern for Christians and others in Evin Prison

Many Christians are among the political prisoners held at Evin, as Farsi (Persian)-speaking believers are considered both apostates and a national security threat by the Iranian authorities. There are concerns that prisoners now face the risk of “expedited” executions. Others are at serious risk of torture, ill-treatment or enforced disappearance.

The concerns follow joint US-Israeli strikes on Iran that began on 28th February and resulted in the death of the Supreme Leader Ali Khamenei. Missiles have struck the area around the prison, and inmates have no way to escape or move to safety.

Administrative personnel are reported to have abandoned their posts, effectively ceasing all supervision over the provision of prisoners’ essential needs. Hundreds of political or ideological prisoners are reported to be in grave and immediate danger, with very limited supplies of food and water available.

The Iranian authorities have a track record of abusing and torturing political prisoners at Evin. More than 60 Christians are believed to be either serving sentences or being detained at the prison awaiting trial on charges concerning their faith.

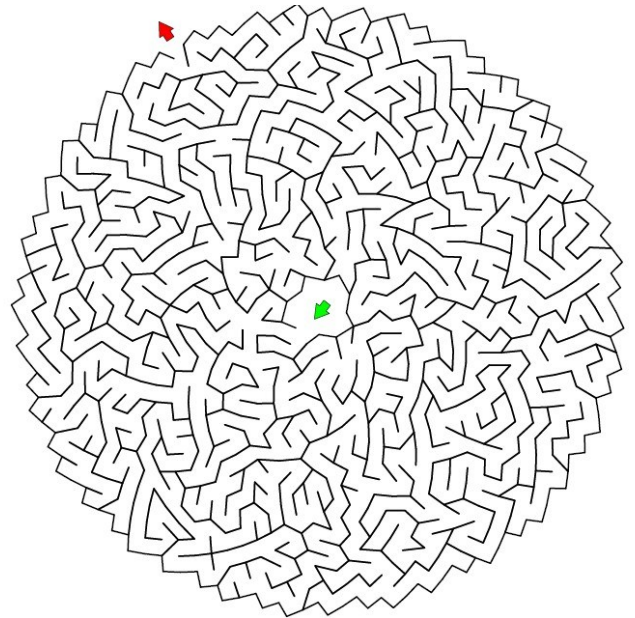

Minsterley Parish Council

A new defibrillator is now in place at the Parish Hall, replacing the broken unit which had failed its monthly testing.

The bus stop alongside Plox Green Road, has been upgraded and improved for bus passengers.

Repairs to the carriageway past Callow Quarry entrance, and leading to Habberley, would be reported to Highways, for inclusion in their programme of works.

Improvements to the main entrance to the Playing Field are to be carried out by the Rights of Way Team at Shropshire Council.

Over 50,000 Green Winged Orchids have been recorded at Minsterley Meadows during May.

The next meeting of Minsterley Parish Council will be at 7.00pm on Tuesday 9th June in Minsterley Parish Hall.

Heather Kidd's Report for May 2026

Roads.

Following on the resurfacing done at Aston Piggot and the Brockton to Rowley Road, the road between Westbury and Vennington is next, with the Marche Road being done as I write this.

In late summer/autumn, the Rorrington to Priest Weston Road will be resurfaced and the A490 at Sheargrove Bridge (north of Chirbury) will receive significant work to stabilize the road edges.

Shropshire Council is also introducing a new, more stringent regime for inspecting road repairs made by contractors. For too long road repairs have not been inspected properly, allowing indifferent workmanship to go unchallenged, with poor repairs opening up after far too short a time. So to make sure future repairs are of a high standard the Council is introducing a team of inspectors to inspect all completed road repairs. If they are below standard, they will insist that the work be redone.

This has already proved its worth on the A489 near Churchstoke when a contractor top dressed over a pothole; the inspector is insisting that this be repaired properly at the contractor's expense.

20mph limits outside of schools

A 20mph speed limit outside Long Mountain School in Worthen will be put in place in August.

Destruction of habitat in Pennerley

I have been contacted over the last few months by residents of the Pennerley area, distressed at the wholesale clearance of gorse and scrubland in the area. Everything above the ground on this 5-acre site has been removed, including the grass, totally destroying valuable habitat for birds, insects and mammals.

I have spoken to the Planning Department of Shropshire Council and the site is not an SSSI or covered by any other protection. I have, however, managed to get the signage for the public footpath running across the site restored.

We need to work together now to find a way to protect sites like this for the future. As a first step, please let me know of any similar land of value to wildlife e.g. woodland, heath, scrub etc. that you think might be under threat and also if you would like to take part in a group to move this project on.

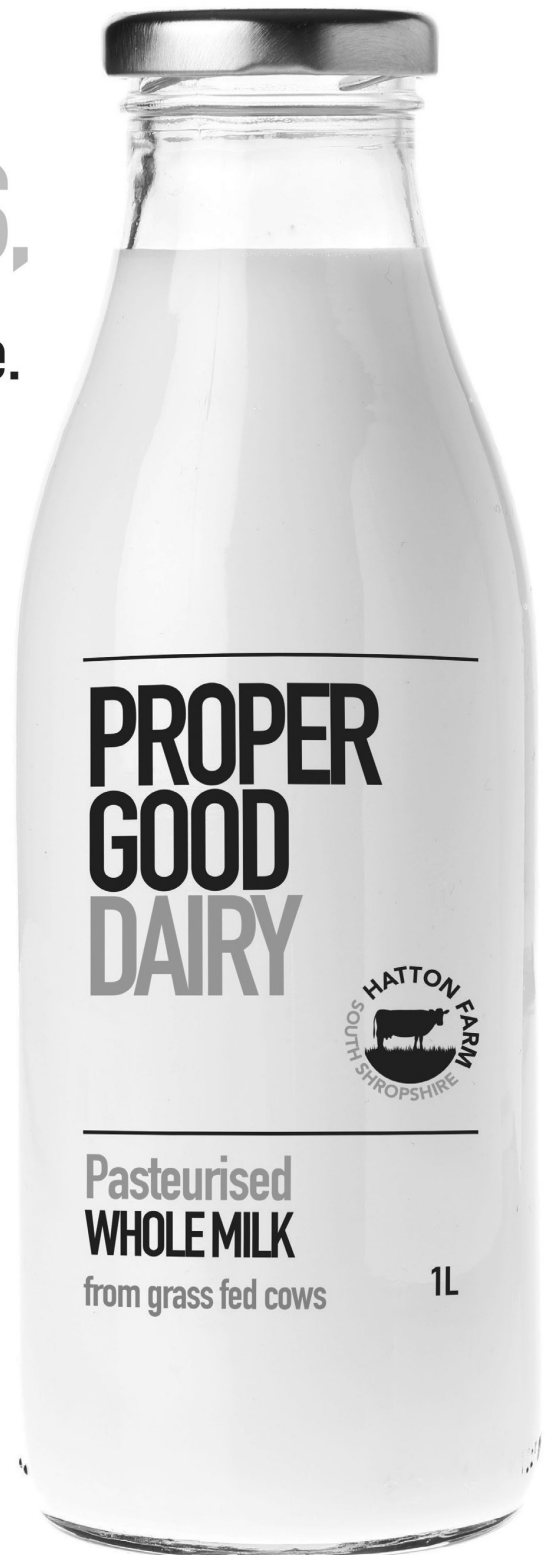

GODS ACRE

How to read your meadow

June is the perfect month to enjoy grassland flowers and many of us have a 'pocket meadow' of long, flowery grass in our churchyards, chapel yards, cemeteries and also our gardens. As well as being beautiful these small pitstops for pollinators can have great wildlife value within both urban and rural landscapes. Sometimes however, a meadow area seems to have less and less flowers as the years go by and it can be hard to know why. If this is the case in a meadow that you manage the grasses may give you a clue as to the cause of this problem.

Native grasses can be divided into fine and coarse species. The fine grasses are shorter, about 30cms, with fine, needle-thick stems and small leaves. Fine grasses allow plenty of room for wildflowers too. Common species include meadow grasses, bents and fescues.

The coarse grasses are larger, sometimes over 1m high, with thicker stems, broad leaves and a tussocky base. In a sward of coarse grasses all but the largest, strongest wildflowers will be swamped and lost, their seeds will not reach soil to germinate and small plants will be overshadowed and pushed out. The main coarse grasses are cocksfoot, false oat-grass and Yorkshire fog.

Whilst a flowery meadow may contain both fine and coarse grass species, if the proportion of coarse grasses increases to more than just occasional plants here and there then you may have a problem. Coarse grasses thrive in places with higher soil fertility and infrequent cutting. If you are cutting your meadow once a year, quite late in the season, this increases fertility and the strength of the coarse grasses. Raking up cuttings is vital for a meadow, if left uncollected the cuttings rot, increasing nutrients and swamping other plants. So, if coarse grasses dominate your meadow then cut more often, earlier in the summer and rake hard so that bare soil is revealed.

Whilst meadows vary depending on soil, location and weather, a good rule of thumb is to leave a meadow uncut for three to four months and no longer. You can cut in March or April and then again in July or August or, if you don't cut in spring then cut by mid-July. This does mean cutting off some flowers but it really knocks back the coarse grasses, favouring fine ones. After a year or two you will start to see wildflowers return. Also, most meadow plants are perennial so the flowers will still be there even if they didn't set seed and you can always cut around a clump or two of late flowering species.

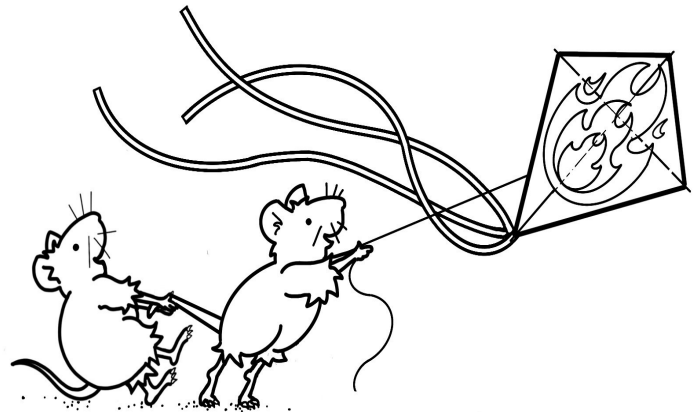

TELEPHONE FRAUD

Criminals still make use of phone calls, both to landlines and mobiles, to defraud people out of their money. Older persons may be particularly vulnerable as they rely on their phones for contact and companionship, so it is helpful to make elderly relatives aware of the dangers of cold callers.

These calls involve fraudsters trying to gain your personal and financial information and are often referred to as “*Vishing*” – an amalgamation of “*Voice*” and “*Phishing*.”

Very often the fraudster has disguised their call identity by using an apparently legitimate number so appearing genuine; this is known as “*spoofing*.” If you do receive an unexpected call from a company you do not recognise, then just hang up, and do not engage with that caller.

Engaging not only tells the caller that the line is active but also one of the latest scams uses Artificial intelligence – A.I. – to clone your voice. This may be just by asking a simple question or in some case asking you to participate in a “lifestyle survey” or similar, so then your voice can be used to target friends and family, or even used as voice recognition to manipulate bank accounts

What are the common types of Phone Call Scams?

- **Bank Scams** – Criminals may call you about “fraudulent” use of your bank account or cards. Remember banks will never ask you for your PIN or tell you to hand over your bank cards to a so-called courier

- **Technical Support scams** - They may impersonate a company such as Microsoft or BT, and tell you there is a fault on your computer or broadband. They then probably will ask you to download remote access software to gain access to your computer, or else install “malware” on it.

- **Impersonation Scams** - Typically these may claim to come from your “Bank Fraud Department” telling you that your account or bank cards have been compromised and you need to transfer money to another so-called Safe Account, from where it vanishes. Similarly, calls may come from fraudsters masquerading as a Police Officer, Utility Provider, HMRC or DVLA.

- **Prize Draw Scams** – “You have won the Lottery or a Prize Draw!” Sounds good, but is it? You may think you never entered the competition, but they will convince you that you have, then ask for your bank details so you can “receive” the prize

- **Financial Scams** – you are called with tempting offers for investing your money in funds, schemes or perhaps in Bitcoins with the promise of huge returns. Since 2019, it has been illegal to make cold calls to sell pension schemes, so any calls about pension schemes will be scams. This law may be extended in the future to ban any unsolicited financial cold calls.

How can you stay safe?

Never give out your financial information over the phone, and just hang up if you are unsure about the caller’s identity.

- Register for “TPS” - Telephone Preference Service - this prevents bona fide companies cold calling you, so you will then know that any cold call is a fake.

- Many modern landline handsets have a “Call Blocking” feature so unwanted numbers can be added to the list of blocked callers. Separate programmable call blocker units are also available to protect users

- Similarly, many phone service providers can offer other call blocking services, such as BT Call Guardian.

- Scammers will often keep the phone line open after the call; so even when you think you are calling a legitimate number you are still speaking to the fraudster. Wait for up to 15 minutes or make the call using a different phone line or mobile

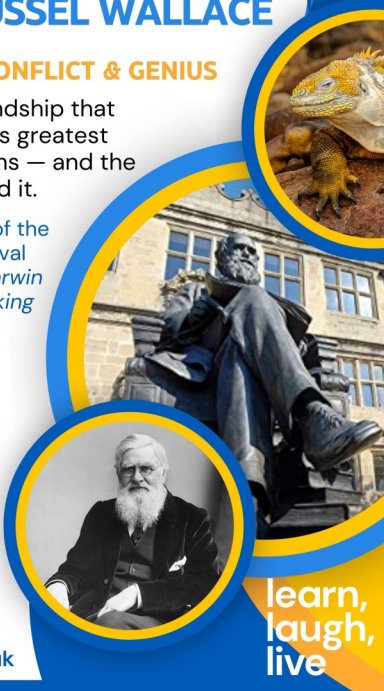

It examines not only the intellectual partnership behind this groundbreaking work, but also the challenges within their relationship, and the final act of generosity that typified a friendship once described as "one of those bright spots in the history of science, which ought to shame all those who indulge in petty jealousies."

Jon King founded the Shrewsbury Darwin Festival and directed Shropshire's Darwin Bicentennial Celebrations in 2009. He is the author of *Charles Darwin in Shrewsbury - The Making of a Marvellous Mind*, which will be available for purchase after the talk.

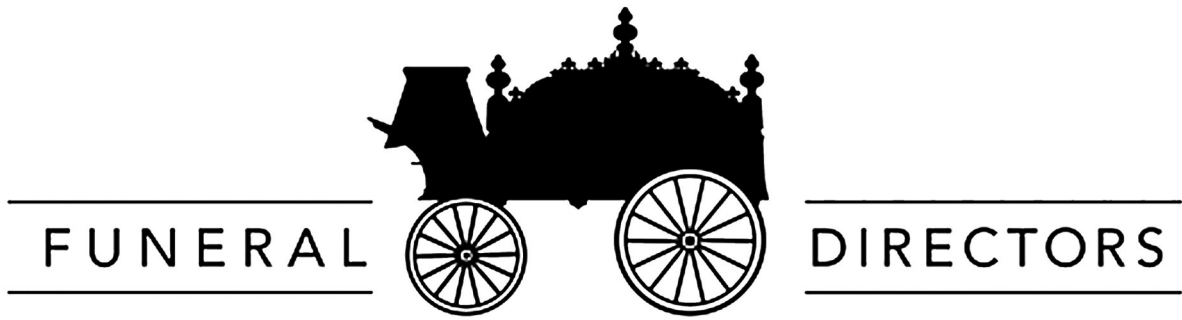

Stop, Challenge, Protect: Fake-Police scam alert

We have been made aware of an incident where a person has been contacted by a male who identified himself as a Police Officer, saying he was from the Economic and Cyber Crime Division. During the conversation the male stated that he had someone in custody, who had been stopped attempting to leave the UK and that the victim's ID and other personal information had been found on this person. The caller was able to give the victim personal information, and asked other questions relating to Cryptocurrency. The caller later asked the victim to attend their local station the following day to confirm their identity.

These callers can sound very convincing and use official sounding names, badge numbers and on this occasion even provided a Report Fraud reference number to the victim.

What to do....

If someone calls you claiming to be a police officer - before giving any personal information, **STOP!** Ask them to confirm their name, collar number and which police service they are from; and say that you will call them back. Hang up and call 101 asking for the police service they stated and confirm their identity with the control room. Genuine police calls will never be concerned with

you confirming identity before proceeding with the call.

If they have called you on a landline we would recommend you wait at least 15 minutes and where possible call from a different phone. There have been cases where fraudsters keep the line open after the victim has hung up - and even played a false dial tone. If you are unable to use a different phone, try calling a friend or family first to make sure the fraudster is no longer on the line.

Genuine police will never ask you to confirm banking or cryptocurrency details, identification (such as passport number) PIN codes or passwords. Nor will they ask you to withdraw or transfer funds from one account to another.

If you have received a call similar to this, report it to "Report Fraud" online or by calling 0300 123 2040.

Questions you might ask

Question – A fellow driver told me that it is illegal to drive in sunglasses at night and that if I had an accident while wearing them, my insurance may not pay out.

Answer - This can be correct. Sunglasses are classified into categories 0 to 4 based on their tint level and how much light they allow through. For drivers, the key distinctions are:

- Category 3 sunglasses are suitable for daytime driving in bright conditions.
- Category 4 sunglasses are not suitable for driving at any time, as they block too much light.

Highway Code Rule 94 states that drivers must ensure their vision is not impaired at all times. Wearing dark lenses — particularly Category 3 or 4 — at night or in low-light conditions, can seriously compromise your ability to see clearly, increasing the risk of an accident.

There are also insurance implications to consider. If you are involved in a collision while wearing inappropriate eyewear, insurers may treat this as negligence. This could result in reduced compensation, a denied claim, or allegations of driving without due care and attention.

Always ensure your vision is clear and unobstructed to stay safe and compliant with UK regulations.

Question – What is the scam involving charity giving and debit or credit cards?

Answer – A recently published scam involving a fraud which targets passengers in taxis and people making **charitable donations on the street**. It works like this: when you pay by debit or credit card, the driver or fundraiser tells you the transaction has failed. On the second attempt, they discreetly cover the amount field on the card reader and ask you to enter your PIN again — but the amount being charged is very different from what you originally agreed to pay.

Because the transaction appears routine, you may not realise anything is wrong until your bank statement arrives or you receive an instant payment notification.

If this happens to you in the UK, your bank *may* offer a refund — but this is not guaranteed, particularly where a PIN was entered voluntarily.

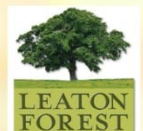
