GOSPEL Matthew 13:24-43

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Matthew.

(for shorter form read between > <)

> At that time: Jesus put another parable before the crowd, saying, 'The kingdom of heaven may be compared to a man who sowed good seed in his field, but while his men were sleeping, his enemy came and sowed weeds among the wheat and went away. So when the plants came up and bore grain, then the weeds appeared also. And the servants of the master of the house came and said to him, "Master, did you not sow good seed in your field? How then does it have weeds?" He said to them, "An enemy has done this." So the servants said to him, "Then do you want us to go and gather them?" But he said, "No, lest in gathering the weeds you root up the wheat along with them. Let both grow together until the harvest, and at harvest time I will tell the reapers, "Gather the weeds first and bind them in bundles to be burned, but gather the wheat into my barn." <

He put another parable before them, saying, 'The kingdom of heaven is like a grain of mustard seed that a man took and sowed in his field. It is the smallest of all seeds, but when it has grown it is larger than all the garden plants and becomes a tree, so that the birds of the air come and make nests in its branches.'

He told them another parable. 'The kingdom of heaven is like leaven that a woman took and hid in three measures of flour, till it was all leavened.'

All these things Jesus said to the crowds in parables; indeed, he said nothing to them without a parable. This was to fulfil what was spoken by the prophet: 'I will open my mouth in parables; I will utter what has been hidden since the foundation of the world.'

Then he left the crowds and went into the house. And his disciples came to him, saying, 'Explain to us the parable of the weeds of the field.' He answered, 'The one who sows the good seed is the Son of Man. The field is the world, and the good seed is the sons of the kingdom. The weeds are the sons of the evil one, and the enemy who sowed them is the devil. The harvest is the end of the age, and the reapers are angels. Just as the weeds are gathered and burned with fire, so will it be at the end of the age. The Son of Man will send his angels, and they will gather out of his kingdom all causes of sin and all law-breakers, and throw them into the fiery furnace. In that place there will be weeping and gnashing of teeth. Then the righteous will shine like the sun in the kingdom of their Father. He who has ears, let him hear.'

16th Sunday in Ordinary Time



In today's gospel we have three wonderful parables. The meaning of last two – the grain of mustard seed and the leaven mixed with the flour – must have been considered by Jesus, or more likely by the gospel writer, to be fairly

obvious. Certainly, there is no attempt to explain them, and the disciples don't ask what they mean. But for the first parable, we have Jesus's own explanation of its meaning. It's no surprise that it is *this* parable that mystifies the disciples, and prompts Jesus's explanation. Because the questions asked by the disciples have been the questions repeated by Christians down the ages. When evil people do evil things, why does God let them do it? Our lives would surely be a lot easier if the wicked people, the 'weeds', were removed from our communities before they could cause any trouble. But the world does not consist of good people and evil people – it consists of people who, like all of us, are capable of both good *and* evil. We are all potential saints, and even those who do wicked things can, with God's help, turn their lives around. That is why judgment day will not happen until "the end of the age" – everyone must be given a chance of salvation.
