September Letter

Dear Friends,

One of the things I love about reading the gospel accounts are the details of the different encounters Jesus had with people from all walks of life. Sometimes he met people in the midst of crowds, such as when he attended festivals and worship at the temple, or when he fed a crowd of around five thousand with the loaves and fishes.

Sometimes we read about him meeting with smaller groups, like the twelve disciples or the seventy-two he sent out with his message of good news accompanied by miracles. And finally there are the encounters Jesus had with individuals. Some are very detailed, others are just a few lines. There are over thirty of these – from the rich and powerful (King Herod, Pontius Pilate, Nicodemus) to the outcast, the poor and the vulnerable (lepers, the dying thief, the widow of Nain).

This month we're going to look at four of the individuals Jesus met and see what we can learn from these encounters. The four we've chosen are all women because they are unexpected and noteworthy. In speaking to them we see Jesus going against the social norms of his day in order to teach, to heal and show compassion to those in need.

Together, during the course of September, we will focus on the Samaritan woman, Mary the sister of Lazarus, the woman caught in adultery and the Canaanite woman. In each case the encounter was life-changing and expanded their understanding about the character and love of God.



Of course Jesus met with these women around 2000 years ago when he walked this earth. But many Christians who follow him and try to live in a way that is pleasing to God would also say “I have met with Jesus, and he’s changed my life”. I wonder who you will encounter this month, and the impact they might have? I wonder whether you would like to meet with Jesus through his Holy Spirit and see the difference he would bring. You are very welcome to join us for these September services or contact us if you would like to know more,

Repairs At All Saints'

A programme of works, to re-point the southern elevation of the church sanctuary and carry out essential roof repairs, is to



start in late September or early October. The work will be carried out by two different companies and is expected to last approximately three weeks; disruption will be kept to a minimum and both exits will be kept clear at all times. The work will require full scaffolding around three sides of church and of course is weather dependent.

The brickwork and lower stone section of the wall will be re-pointed using Hydraulic Lime and damaged / shaling bricks repaired but before this can happen the existing pointing will be removed to a depth of 10mm. The current pointing was incorrectly done approx. 60 years ago, using cement and it is this that is damaging the brick face by not

allowing the wall to dry out properly. The internal plaster damage, mainly due to defective guttering drenching the outside wall (repaired last December) will be rectified once the pointing has been completed.

Repairs to the roof will consist of replacing damaged and slipped slates, installing an eaves tray to ensure all rainwater is directed into the guttering and replacing the numerous cracked ridge tiles. The roof problems are mainly weather related 'wear and tear' and poor workmanship when the roof was re-slatted, using second hand materials, 60 years ago.

As I expect you realise, with any building work start and end dates are only an approximation and any attempt to obtain a definite date from your builder results in being told .. it's too cold and wet at the moment we need better weather, or it's too hot and sunny at the moment we need cooler weather !

Reflected Faith Series - The Peace

Last time we reflected on the time of 'Intercessions' within our service. This month, we consider what comes next.

In a Common Worship Communion service, the 'Peace' comes straight after the Intercessions. There is no such thing with a Book of Common Prayer (BCP) service.

A time of sharing 'The Peace' is not restricted to Communion services, but may take place in other services also.

It does not have to follow the Intercessions, but instead could also be held towards the start or end of the service.

Where you place 'the Peace' is significant: having it at the beginning emphasises the community coming together, whilst towards the end of the service might be to emphasise the importance of being together that encourages and enables us to take God with us into our everyday lives.

But why have it at all? Haven't we all come together to this service to worship the same God? To be to-

gether with others who think and believe as we do?

Hopefully yes, but sometimes we just need a visible sign of that very unity and a reminder that we are a part of this community where we are, as well as a part of the wider church across the world.

It is so easy to forget this. To just go on repeat and not be conscious of this enormous honour that we have to 'meet together in His presence'.

'Sharing the peace' - however we do that - with one another is a demonstrative act of community. Everyone is included.

The Peace of the Lord be always with you – And also with you.

Where is 'The Peace' placed within your service and what do you think is the reason for that? Does making a physical connection – however you do that – with those around you make a difference to your thinking about 'community'?

‘He gave us eyes to see them’ – the church bells

‘Summoned by Bells’ is the title of John Betjeman’s poetic autobiography, where he describes how bells summoned him to school and to church. Bells announcing the joy of weddings and Sunday services; and also marking out times of sadness and the death of loved ones.

One of the strangest bell-towers is at St Augustine’s Church, Brookland in Kent, north-east of Rye. It was originally built in the medieval period, and now stands as a triple coned, wooden, octagonal tower detached from the church, and clad with shingles in 1936.

The story is that the tower looked down at a beautiful bride about to marry an unpleasant groom: it was such a surprise that the tower jumped off the church in shock. The truth is that the church was built on marshy ground, and a stronger foundation was needed for the bells. And so the tower was built north of the church. Like all belfries and steeples, it is an impressive witness to the place

of bells in human life and work: as time-keepers, announcing both festive occasions and emergencies, and calling people away from more worldly pursuits to worship. That is why bells have always been blessed at their installation for their true function is to ring out the harmony of heaven.

The tenor bell at Warburton Church in Cheshire is inscribed with the words, ‘I bid you to the house of prayer. St Werburgh’s hallowed name I bear. Good folk draw near and humbly pray, as prayed that saint in olden day.’

As a little boy, John Betjeman would listen to the bells with his teddy bear, Archibald. ‘I heard the church bells hollowing out the sky, deep beyond deep, like never-ending stars.’ For him, for the people of Brookland, and for all of us, the bells were like stars lighting up the sky with faith and joy and praise.

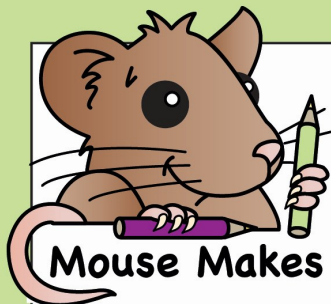

Recycling & Green Living Tips

Save your Dandelions

Many people consider these wildflowers as weeds and remove them. However, they are very important for wildlife so save them.

6 REASONS TO NEVER PULL A DANDELION AGAIN



1
Dandelions are the first food source for bees in early spring. Without them, colonies starve.



2
Every part is medicinal. Roots detox the liver, leaves are richer in vitamins than spinach.



3
The deep taproot breaks compacted soil and pulls up minerals that other plants cannot.



4
Young leaves taste like arugula. Flowers make wine and honey. Roots make coffee. All for free.



5
Over 100 species of birds and insects depend on dandelion seeds and flowers to survive.



6
When they die back, dandelions return every mineral they pulled up straight back into the soil.



It is not a weed. It is a pharmacy, a salad, and a lifeline. Leave it.

Give up on single-use plastic bottles

The UK sells almost 8 billion single-use plastic bottles each year. More than a third are not collected for recycling. Millions of pounds have been spent to improve public access to water refilling stations to try and reduce consumption of plastics.

The best option is to have a re-usable bottle which you can refill whenever you need water. A new deposit scheme is proposed for October 2027 when there will be a 20p refundable deposit on drinks in plastic bottles and aluminum cans.

Five recycling myths

"There is no point recycling, it doesn't make a difference:

Recycling stops tonnes of waste being buried in landfill. In the UK, recycling saves about 10-15 million tonnes of carbon emissions a year, the equivalent of taking 3.5 million cars off the road.

"My recycling will end up getting thrown away with the rubbish anyway":

Your recycled material is a valuable resource. Once it has been collected from your doorstep it is then sorted, bailed and transported to processors to be made into new products.

"I don't create any food waste so I

don't need to use a food waste collection":

We all create some unavoidable food waste such as peelings, eggshells, teabags and bones. If you have a food waste collection at home these can go in your food waste caddy. Or have a compost bin or heap in your garden.

"Paper can only be recycled a few times":

Whilst it is true that paper fibres start to break down once they have been recycled five-six times, even then they can still be put to good use in egg cartons, loft insulation, paints and even new road surfaces.

"Recycling metal uses more energy than extracting the raw material":

This is not true. Mining and processing metal uses huge amounts of resources and energy. Recycling cans saves up to 95% of the energy needed to make new cans from raw material.

If you are on a beach, please take all your rubbish

So many people dump rubbish on the beach wherever they are. So, if you are on a beach at any time, either put it in a bin if there is one or take it home and bin it. So many creatures leave foot prints but only humans leave litter.

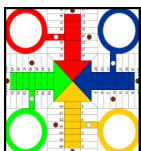
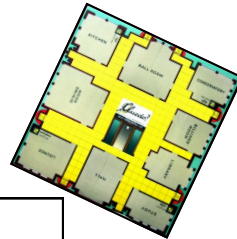

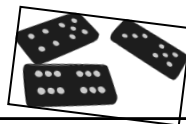
