In Desperate Need



Drought has been affecting the UK and most of Europe for the past three to four months. It's made everyone desperate for rain—the farmers for their crops, the water companies to supply customers and gardeners for their plants. We give thanks for the recent welcome rain and pray for more.

In *Mark's Gospel*, we read in *chapter 7, verses 24-30* of a desperate parent:

"Jesus left that place and went to the vicinity of Tyre. He entered a house and did not want anyone to know it; yet he could not keep his presence secret. In fact, as soon as she heard about him, a woman whose little daughter was possessed by an impure spirit came and fell at his feet. The woman was a Greek, born in Syrian Phoenicia. She begged Jesus to drive the demon out of her daughter. 'First let the



children eat all they want,' he told her, 'for it is not right to take the children's bread and toss it to the dogs.' 'Lord,' she replied, 'even the dogs under the table eat the children's crumbs.' Then he told her, 'For such a reply, you may go; the demon has left your daughter.' She went home and found her child lying on the bed, and the demon gone."

Pastor Tim Keller, in his book *King's Cross: Understanding the life and death of the Son of God*, comments on this passage and says "there are cowards, there are regular people, there are heroes, and then there are parents!". Here, we have a parent in desperate need—her child was very ill with an unclean spirit—so she approaches Jesus with incredible humility, perseverance and faith, all of which lead to her child's release and healing.

The woman's approach shows us how we are to approach God with *rightless humble assertiveness*. This Syrophoenician woman had no right even to talk to Jesus, a Jewish Rabbi. She was Greek, a gentile who likely worshipped Canaanite gods, she had a daughter with an unclean spirit and, lastly, she was a woman in a male-only society. Everything was against her but she showed an understanding that the disciples had difficulty grasping.

It is this faith that God's love is enough and available for all with the coming of the Kingdom of God that brought her to Jesus. Even the crumbs of His love are enough, like they would be for the puppies under the dinner table. This showed an understanding and a trust in the living God. Jesus saw her faith expressed and her desperation, and then the miracle happened.

I wonder how desperate we are for God. How keen to grasp what he offers us? Often distractions and our busy lives so easily numb that desperation for God. We need the desperate, humble assertiveness of the Syrophoenician woman in *Mark's Gospel* to truly lead us to meet God.

The prayer of humble access

We do not presume to come to this your table, merciful Lord, trusting in our own righteousness, but in your manifold and great mercies.

We are not worthy so much as to gather up the crumbs under your table.

But you are the same Lord whose nature is always to have mercy. Grant us therefore, gracious Lord, so to eat the flesh of your dear Son Jesus Christ and to drink His blood, that our sinful bodies may be made clean by His body and our souls washed through His most precious blood, and that we may evermore dwell in Him, and He in us. Amen.

This prayer was based on the same passage from *Mark's Gospel*, expressing the rightless, humble assertiveness of the Syrophoenician woman. The prayer was written by Archbishop Thomas Cranmer, author of *The Book of Common Prayer* (1549), and a founding Father of the Church of England. It is still used today in our Communion services.

People respond to Jesus' words in a variety of ways as the Syrophoenician woman could have done. Two reactions are negative.

- She could have rejected Jesus by being too proud and having a *superiority complex*, not accepting his challenge, wanting to lead her life as she chose, her pride preventing her from meeting with God.
- She could have had an *inferiority complex*. She might have thought, I'm so awful God couldn't love me. Tim Keller states in *King's Cross*, "It's just as much a rejection of the love of God to refuse to seek him, to refuse to come after his mercy, to refuse to accept it, to refuse to be content with it".

But to come to God we need to be like the Syrophoenician woman, having rightless humble assertiveness. It's what all who come to Jesus need.

- **Rightless:** we cannot earn our way to God. We are not good enough. We are not worthy! We have no rights to demand He accepts us.
- **Humble assertiveness:** God through Jesus has done something amazing. He has died for us on a cross and risen from the dead. He is offering us something amazing: *His mercy*. Humbly we accept this as the woman did.

God is so loving that He wants His children to be rescued and transformed, and as a parent He has given His life on the cross so we can be rescued (saved). Wow! What a God we have. He's done it all!

Let's discover more of the Father's love for us this Autumn and share it with those around us.

Tragedy at the Big Church Festival 2026

Within just three hours of the Big Church Festival 2026 officially opening at Wiston Park, Steyning, West Sussex, on Friday 28th August, strong winds caused a wooden sign to fall, injuring six people, four of whom were taken to hospital, and one person tragically lost his life at the scene. The person who died was named as Pastor Robert Guancho from Jesus the Living Water Church in Eastbourne, East Sussex. The organisers closed the festival that same day amidst the shock and sadness, saying they were “heartbroken” by Pastor Guancho’s death and adding:

“Big Church Festival is about bringing people together. At the moment, that community is grieving.”

In a statement, Pastor Guancho’s church said:

“Pastor Robert was a faithful servant of God, a loving husband to Isay, a devoted and caring father to Ellie, and a blessing to so many people whose lives he touched. His life, his faith, his love, and his service to God will never be forgotten.”

As a family, Big Church Festival (BCF) has been a special part of our lives since 2012, always around my birthday in May. I began volunteering in 2018 and I have had the privilege of serving in various departments alongside volunteers from all walks of life and from different parts of the world. Every year brings a unique and wonderful experience with new friendships and memories. This year, however, our experience ended very differently when the festival closed early under these tragic circumstances.

Big Church Festival is a celebration of faith, music and community. It’s a Christian music festival that celebrates the diversity of Christian music, bringing together some of the biggest names in Christian music from around the world. But it is much more than music (there are 8 stages). In a





world where large gatherings can sometimes feel intimidating or divided, BCF is a place of safety, community and belonging, where people of all ages, denominations, culture and backgrounds come together to worship, connect and celebrate the unity of Christian faith.

BCF was founded by Tim Jupp (Delirious? music group) in 2009 as Big Church Day Out (BCDO). What started as a one-day event held on the Saturday of the May Bank Holiday weekend at the Wiston Estate, quickly grew in popularity and became a two-day event, running on both Saturday and Sunday.

Following the Covid-19 Pandemic, growth was significant and from 2022, it became known as the Big Church Festival. In 2025, the festival became a three-day event running from Friday to Sunday over the August Bank Holiday weekend at the same West Sussex venue. And there are now plans for BCF to make its European debut in the Netherlands in 2027.

Over the years, artists such as Matt Redman, Chris Tomlin, Israel Houghton, Sinach, LZ7, Kari Jobe, Cody Carnes, For King & Country and Hillsong have graced its stages. This year was no exception, CeCe Winans, Brooke Ligertwood, Lauren Daigle, Charity Gayle, Elevation Rhythm, Rend Collective, Jonathan and Melissa Helsers and many others were in the line-up.

BCF also hosts kids activities, craft stalls, spoken word, prayer spaces, an Expo, Food vendors, creative art vendors, fun fairs, late night worship and camp fires. Something for everyone.

It's always really special to have Christian worship with all these artists in one place and with Christians who have left their denomination labels at the gates. The unity does feel like 'heaven on earth'.

The festival is accessible to all and the cost of attending a day or an entire weekend is very reasonable compared with many other major festivals and concerts. For some of the artists at BCF, this is their only UK tour date, making it a unique opportunity to see them perform live.

- **Please pray with us** for God's comfort and strength for the family, congregation and friends of Pastor Robert who lost his life, and for everyone who was injured and affected by what happened.

- **Pray** for the organisers, volunteers, artists and the wider BCF community as they process this devastating event.
- Above all, **pray** that this tragic incident will ultimately be turned around for the glory of God.

May the vision behind Big Church Festival continue to bring people together in faith, worship and community.

Mission With A Vision is a charity working in Kenya to protect vulnerable girls and young women, particularly those escaping female genital mutilation, forced child marriage and other forms of gender-based violence.



Based mainly in the Maasai region of Narok, the charity provides a place of safety for girls who have nowhere else to turn. Its work includes safe housing, education, vocational training, counselling and community support, helping girls rebuild their lives with dignity and hope.

This charity is especially close to my heart because my daughter travelled to Kenya four times as a volunteer, helping to build the refuge for the girls. Through her visits, our family saw first-hand how practical help, prayer, generosity and compassion can make a life-changing difference.

Mission With A Vision does not simply offer temporary shelter. It gives girls the chance to continue their education, learn skills, grow in confidence and look towards a safer future. Many girls supported by the charity have gone on to become independent young women, breaking cycles of harm and helping to create change in their communities.

At its heart, this is a story of hope: hope for safety, hope for education, hope for healing and hope for a better future.

Felipe's Big Swim!

At the time of going to press, one of St Luke's young people, Felipe Irvine, at the age of 16, has just finished his solo English Channel swim from Dover to Calais.

After waiting patiently since Friday 4th September for the right conditions (calm seas), the swim started at 02:08 on Monday 14th September. Felipe was aiming to land in Cap Gris Nez but the wind and rough waves pushed him away so he ended up at Tardingen, Calais. He swam 21.5 miles and it took him 11 hours, 20 minutes and 41 seconds (2 miles/hour approximately!).



With the support of Swim Herts Open Water, Felipe trained hard for this challenge since finishing his GCSEs in June, gradually building up distance and time spent swimming in open water, having ice baths and doing fast feed practice.

Felipe's Channel swim was in support of YoungMinds Trust because, he says, "Every young person deserves access to mental health support. The charity provides advice, resources, and essential services for young people, like myself and their families. Every donation helps ensure that no young person has to face their mental health challenges alone." The total on the JustGiving page keeps rising and currently stands at £5849. Dear friends,

Greetings from the warm heart of Africa! It hasn't been as hot here as in England but the weather is gradually getting warmer as we climb towards the hottest time of year in October and November.

In mid August I hosted our SIM Malawi prayer meeting in my house and gave thanks for 26 years since I arrived in Malawi with SIM, celebrating God's faithfulness! My neighbours, the Fazakerleys, have been here for just over 33 years but will be leaving at the end of October. We had a special time to say farewell to them during our Spiritual Life Conference (SLC) at the beginning of August.



SLC was just a few days after I arrived back in Malawi from my time in the UK. Those days were a bit of a whirlwind of unpacking, adjusting and preparing for SLC by baking lots of goodies to share. This I did with my friend and former neighbour, Andrea Richter! Andrea and Hans-Jörg visited us in July and August, which was a real encouragement to all the team. After SLC I had a long weekend with them in Zomba, just what I needed after the busyness of the previous weeks.

The theme of SLC was 'Flourishing in a new season'. We had an excellent speaker, Matt Jackson, a SIM chaplain. He talked of being connected with God and each other, and God used him to help to build connections among the team. Thank you for praying!

I was (and still am) a bit overwhelmed with all that I need to catch up on. There has been lots of administration in the past couple of weeks, such as writing reports, answering emails, and working on SIM Malawi's budget for the next financial year with our leadership team.

Thankfully, I've also had conversations with several people about opportunities – whether that is to encourage students and staff at the Evangelical Bible College of Malawi, facilitate courses of *The Story of God and His World* or come alongside other facilitators. I've also been re-connecting with my Ministry Point Person team and group of coordinators.

I had a warm welcome back at church and have some preaching engagements.

Although I'm glad to be back in my own little house, the adjustment to living in Malawi has not always been easy. Power cuts have been frequent, though thankfully not usually longer than 2–3 hours. And my house has hardly had any mains water since I got back! The problem seems to be with the water meter which has been taken away to be mended. Its reinstallation keeps being delayed. Thankfully it is possible to tap into the Fazakerley's water supply, so I have not been stranded.

Whilst in the UK I developed a frozen shoulder. I am thankful that here it has been easy to book appointments with a good physio, who I am seeing regularly, and who has given me exercises to do. I am also thankful that Mum is doing very well and is no longer needing the help of the rehabilitation team who were helping her.

Prayer points

- Give thanks for a safe return to Malawi, coinciding with the Richters' visit
- Give thanks for connections being built between team members at the Spiritual Life Conference
- Pray for each member of the team to continue to work at connecting with others

With joy, I am writing to you from my flat in Tamworth having finally moved! Now that I'm settling in, I thought it was a good time to sit down and write an update.

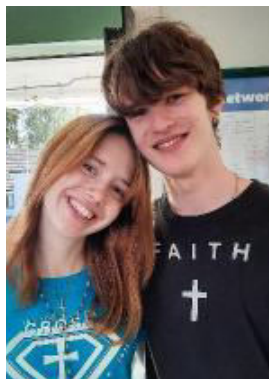

Devastating Floods in Nepal

On 26th August, a devastating flash flood in Nepal killed more than 1,300 people, and with at least 4,000 more missing the death toll was expected to rise further.

The districts of Rasuwa and Nuwakot, in the hills between Kathmandu and the Himalayan border with Tibet, were the hardest hit. The UN estimated that more than 84,000 people had been affected by the floods.

INF Nepal and their other partners responded and provided vital supplies to more than 3,500 people. Food, blankets, clothing and other essentials were distributed to families who had lost everything.

INF continue to support communities affected by the floods. If you would like to support the flood relief effort, financially, INF UK has set up an appeal to help provide essential supplies and support to families as they begin to recover and rebuild:

Keswick Convention 2026

All One in Jesus Christ

It was great to be at Keswick again this year after our plans to attend the 150th Anniversary Convention in 2025 were washed out by car problems. The Lake District location is stunning and the weather this year was brilliant for the first few days—a cooler version of the heatwave in the South.

Keshy and I use a campsite up-the-hill-behind-the-town-off-the-Ambleside-road where the views across Derwent Water to Cat Bells are fabulous. So combining tours of the Whinlatter and Honister Passes, Buttermere, walks and the bus to Grasmere with the Convention's great Bible teaching, made for a fairly relaxed but refreshingly spiritual break.

All the morning Bible Readings, the evening celebrations and some of the seminars are freely available through the Keswick Convention website and YouTube channel so you can look them up.

The Convention runs for 3 weeks and we straddled Weeks 1 and 2 so missed some sessions but it was straightforward catching up online. Andy Robinson spoke on *Matthew, chapters 8-12* in the first week, summarised as 'The person, power, and mission of Jesus as the true King'. Christopher Ash spoke on a selection of *Genesis* passages in the second week: 'How God brings victory, hope, and perseverance'. As ever, we were challenged to deepen our relationship with Jesus, to know Him better and to build resilience in Him for difficult times.

There was a fantastic talk in Week 1 by Andrew Fellows on 'Inside Temptation with The Screwtape Letters' (The Keswick Lecture—well worth looking up).



The Convention's overall theme was a surprising extension of our studies in *Ephesians, chapter 6* at St Luke's earlier this year: 'Strong in His Strength'. It's worth listening even harder when something is repeated —God is speaking to us!

And because the Convention has deep roots in challenging Christians in mission, it was not surprising that we bumped into friends from the mission community. This year they were from Serving in Mission (SIM) and Africa Inland Mission (AIM). Of course, it was also good to meet up with folk we see at St Luke's as well!

Next year in Keswick, the Convention theme is 'Render the Heavens' (*Isaiah 64:1-2*). Weeks 1–3 take place between 17th July and 6th August. We heartily recommend it and hope to see you there.... (Book your accommodation now if you want to go next year!). There's more information here:

- why it is wise to build your house on Jesus' words.



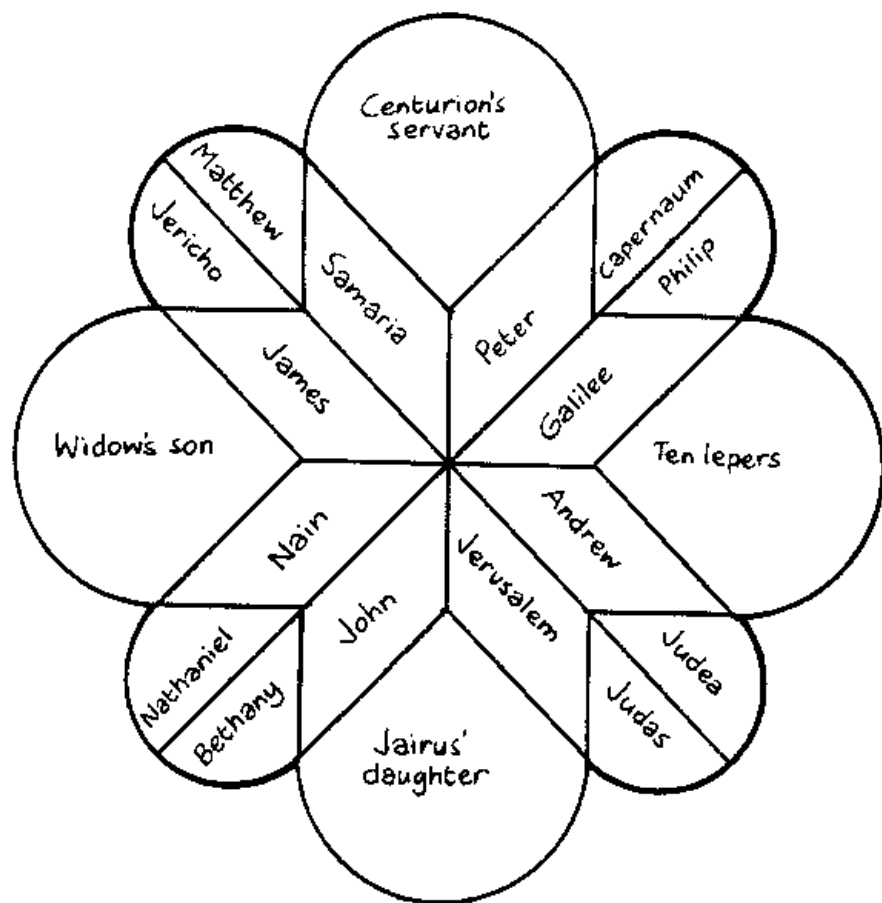
