SOME THOUGHTS FROM REV. ANGELA FROM BOOTLE RECTORY

As we come into harvest time and celebrate God's blessing, I often think of one assembly when I was at Secondary School. All the usual things were there such as cabbages, marrows, potatoes and apples, but there in the centre of it all was a single glass of water. How many other pupils saw it and wondered why it was there I do not know, but I certainly did. That was until one of the teachers used it in his talk. The story he told was of a village where one year there was very little harvest because the crops had been washed away by rain. The rain had been so bad very little could grow and all that they could be thankful for was water. Why I remember this was not because of the story, but the visual impact of the single glass of water, which has stayed with me since for the rest of my life.

Of course, there have been many other harvests that I can call to mind, such as when Coventry Cathedral celebrated the car industry which gave wealth and prosperity to the city. Then there were the times of taking boxes of food around to the elderly who in fact did not need our gifts, but it was the unemployed younger families who needed them more. This was especially so when there were four million people unemployed. Then there was the changing of gifts brought to the church, from carrots and apples to soap, razor blades, and chocolate. These went to the hostel for the homeless who needed those things far more than the traditional goods.

I believe we can all remember when harvest and the celebration of the harvest was placed as a far more important event than it is now. This may be partly so in cities, where there is a greater disassociation with the food one eats and how it is produced. However, I'm sure there are countries where it is still very important. One year I went to South Korea to visit my son and he told me that he had a few days holiday because it was a national holiday in thanksgiving for the harvest.

So much more is available to us all the year round now. For instance, strawberries are no longer seasonal, grapes are not just given to us when we are sick and eggs are bought by the dozen and not just by the one or two. (That was of course due to the slow progress out of rationing.) We have so much in abundance, and even here, where we live, we can all of us forget that the food is still grown by someone. It is still back breaking work for someone somewhere and crops are still dependent on the weather. The question is still asked of "how good the yield will be this year" and this is from potatoes to plums.

How much will alter through climate change we have yet to discover. As we all know, climate change is not just a possibility, but it is with us now.

We have all seen the disasters that have overtaken many places around the world. We will have to act quickly as there is no second chance.

Then of course, for the past eighteen months, we have all had to cope with the covid crisis that has impacted on us globally, not just in our community or country. That too has been a harvest of sorts as it has impacted on the economy, our children's schooling, the way we live our lives, and the isolation and fear that we have all experienced.

Like the glass of water, there have been many visual impacts that we can bring to mind this year. These we can bring to our harvest. Along with our gifts of apples, marrow and potatoes and anything else we may bring, we can also bring ourselves. Let us bring what we have been through, both painful or pleasant. The things that we are concerned about such as climate change. Our community, it's health and economic security. The church and our way forward into the future and our mission to God's people.

As many of you know, before coming to Black Combe I was a chaplain doing Industrial Mission. I was visiting work places that are part of the everyday economy of life. That too is a harvest and so are we. All that we are is part of the kingdom of heaven that we can lay before God our maker and creator. I pray that our harvest may be rich, fruitful and above all hopeful in faith and in God. A way that passes all understanding, a way of peace.

GOSFORTH PARISH CHURCH MANAGEMENT COMMITTEE

At our July meeting we discussed our concerns about the process of nominating foundation governors for Gosforth School and decided to be ready to raise this at the next APCM. The future of zoom services was discussed and it was decided that at present there wouldn't be services exclusively on zoom, but that they may resume for some Sundays in the winter months if there was a need. However, we would continue to zoom services held in St Mary's so that people could join them from home and monitor the uptake to decide if this will continue on a permanent basis.

The financial position has not improved to the extent we had hoped for, with a deficit of £500 over the period May and June, but were pleased to note we are still on track to pay our parish pledge for 2021 in full. We reviewed the budget and forecast for the rest of the year and agreed to aim to stay on track. The gas company have made an error in their charges since 2018 and have asked us to pay the extra, we feel they should take responsibility for their error and are in negotiation with them.

Much of the equipment used to zoom services out of St Mary's is borrowed. We agreed to set up a sub group to look at all the modern technology needs and report back with a view to making purchases when money is available.

Fund Raising – Once again the main event will be a Christmas Fair in the Public Hall on Saturday 28th November, please make a note of this date. A group will meet after a Sunday service in September to consider what changes to the format will be needed in the light of available helpers and events since the last one. Discussions are on going over the possible formation of a 100 Club to give a small but regular increase in income, a money raiser from Christmas Lights, a coffee morning and an open gardens weekend. We would welcome any offers for people to take part in sponsored events such as runs or walks (maybe the Gosforth 10 or Fun Run) and raise sponsorship money for Gosforth Church, or specifically for the maintenance of the churchyard.

It was felt that another forum meeting to consider a summary paper on our earlier discussions and decide on a way forward was needed. This will be on a date in September still to be decided.

We checked up on the requirements of the last quinquennial report and have now done all the more urgent items. It was noted that we need to make people aware that there are rules from the Church of

England on what can and cannot be done in a churchyard. We discussed another change in service times and agreed that we had no option but to fall in with the pattern in the Mission Community and that this meant that the main service on Sundays would be at 11am with a request that the service was never more than an hour long.

There will be a report on the forum meeting in the October magazine. The next regular management meeting to monitor the situation will be on Tuesday 12th October and the report will be in the November magazine. If you have anything you wish us to consider please 'phone 01946 725 300.

SAINT FOR SEPTEMBER

Lancelot Andrew's is a name that may not be familiar today, but the Church of England regards him as sufficiently important to remember him on the 25th of September, the date of his death in 1626. Common Worship describes him as 'Bishop of Winchester and Spiritual writer' but this does not give him justice. He was a dedicated and hard-working don at Cambridge and he was in turn Bishop of Chichester and Ely before going to Winchester. He was a noted preacher who impressed both Elizabeth I and James the VI and Ist. He wrote a book of private prayers which was widely used in the past, so please remember this saintly person, even if you have never heard of him before.

An Affinity of Place


Just published – a novel by Jonathan Falkner, set on the Norfolk Broads.

An affinity with an exceptional place...

For the last ten years Lorna had lived with her father in a small cottage out on the marshes. Now Henry Banningham had died, and Lorna was alone. Would she find companionship? Might she find love?

Meanwhile, the life of this special place – its birds, insects and flowers, its reedbeds, its flowing waters – ministered to her in her solitude.

The village church, the pub, sailing on the Norfolk Broads, local people and incomers, provide the wider setting for a story whose focus always returns to this unique environment at the heart of the Broads.



Jonathan writes:

From 1990 to 1999 my family and I lived in north Suffolk, on the edge of the Norfolk Broads. We enjoyed sailing on the Broads, and visiting the many nature reserves of the area. In particular, I paid regular visits to the Ludham and Potter Heigham Marshes National Nature Reserve, and made notes of my observations through the seasons. I realised that better naturalists than I am would be keeping a scientific record of this reserve; then it occurred to me that another way to pay tribute to this unique environment would be to make it the setting for a story. This would also allow me to describe other parts of Broadland and to draw upon the pleasures of sailing on these beautiful waters. There is even a short visit to the Lake District! After retirement I dug out all my notes and began to plan this story, and the lockdowns of the last two years have given me time to finish it.

Gosforth Methodist Chapel

A hundred and fifty years ago plans for the building of a chapel at Gosforth were approved. In September 1872 the plot at Becksde was bought for £36 by four local preachers who had a particular interest in the Gosforth Society of Wesleyan Methodists, who had been meeting in each other's homes at least since 1839 (the first recorded date.)

Donations for the building of the chapel came in quickly and the opening service was held on 27th December 1874.

Although we are closing our Chapel with great sadness, we are embracing the opportunities of uniting in worship with St Mary's Church here in Gosforth.

On the evening of Friday 6th March, 2020, I attended the World Day of Prayer service here in Gosforth Chapel. Little did I know that it would be the very last service I would ever attend there. Within weeks of that service the world as we knew it was turned on its head and things would change dramatically, some forever.

It soon became almost normal to attend virtual church services, organized by Jill and Keith Hudson. As the world slowly started to return to 'normal' and chapels and churches reopened, it became apparent that Gosforth Chapel was not sustainable. A meeting was called, prior to which there must have been much praying for guidance. It was decided that we could no longer afford to run the building and the proposal of closing the Chapel was put forward and carried.

Over the past few weeks I along with Lorrie, Mary Snape and Mary Moody have spent many hours sorting and clearing out the cupboards ready for our final exodus. Items have been unearthed from way back and with them many happy memories.

There are many happy times to look back on but there are also exciting times to look forward to for our congregation here in Gosforth. We may not have a building anymore but we are still a church – the church consists of God's people. It is the assembly of believers in Jesus Christ. The physical buildings facilitate the fellowship, worship, and ministry of God's people, but it is not the church.

At the time of writing the plan for our future is still a work in progress, but with God's help and guidance I know we will continue to be a 'church'. Jill and Keith Hudson have laid a foundation stone for our future with all the hard work they put into what I call 'Zoom' church and if our efforts can match theirs, then I'm sure that this new and exciting chapter which we are embarking on in Gosforth will be a happy and successful one, and I'm confident that there is a bright future ahead, and hopefully another few hundred years of Methodist worship in Gosforth. So, this isn't a farewell – it's a we will be back!
