Friends

As we live through a time of war in Europe, it has been a humbling experience to see the witness of Ukrainian Christians reciting the psalms from bunkers and bomb shelters,

and to use these images as part of a weekly vigil for peace. Refugees from that conflict have started to arrive in our region and it is heartening to see the beginnings of a generous and hospitable response. Each week we will attempt to communicate what is going on to support refugees across Horsforth and the Yorkshire region in the church notice sheet.

In the conversations that I am involved in, the migration of people caused by the conflict in Ukraine poses serious questions about our response to refugees from other parts of the world too, with local hotels providing temporary accommodation for migrants from Syria and Afghanistan. Conflicts and the impact of climate change are likely to drive more migration in the years to come.

Psalm 31 ends with the words, *Be strong and let your heart take courage, all you who wait in hope for the Lord.* As a community waiting in hope for the Lord, may our response to those forced to leave their homes be courageous and generous.

We try to involve the pupils as much as possible either in the story or sometimes with sound effects!

It is a real privilege to go into schools to tell these Bible stories and Duncan says that students at Horsforth School still remember some of them and often greet him with the Open the Book song.

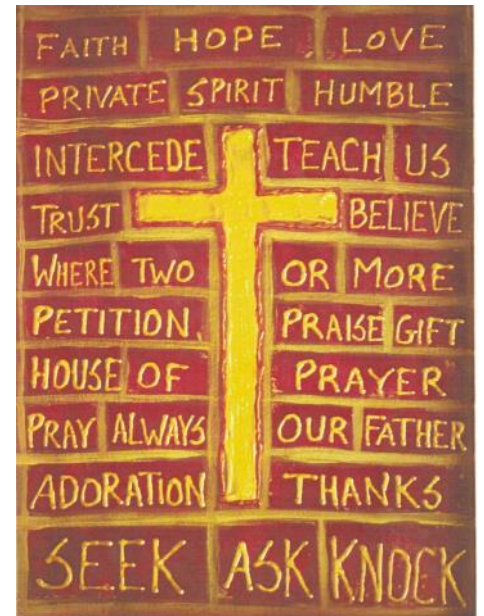

Who was James Whitaker?

I wonder how many of you have looked at the plaque on the wall of the South side aisle of the Church and wondered why there is a solitary memorial there? The memorial is to James Whitaker, who died almost 150 years ago. It has often intrigued me, so I decided I'd try and find out a bit more about him. This memorial is the only one of its type in the Church and as the South aisle was only added to the Church in 1904, it was probably elsewhere in the Church initially.



Was James a benefactor who gave money for the building of the Church or a prominent local figure? Here is what I've been able to find out about him.

He certainly was listed as one of the Horsfordians who had a lot of involvement in St. James' in its early days. He was apparently also known as the 'Village Poet' and he wrote a 'hymn of dedication' for the new St. James' Church – hence the reference to his literary power on the Memorial.

James was by profession a schoolmaster who was the proprietor of Moss House Academy on Scotland Lane. He was baptised at St. Margaret's in 1810; in 1841 he was living with his wife Hannah and their 4 children; by 1861 he was a widower living on Long Row with his daughter Ada, a schoolmistress, and son James, a 15 year old scholar. In the 1871 census he was recorded as a widower living at Woodside Mill Cottages with his elderly parents. It was here that he died in the June of that year; the Coroner's verdict on his death was 'found dead from Natural Causes'.

A red marble memorial stone, now laid flat, just by the right-hand side of the path leading from the West door to the back gate, marks James' resting place in the Churchyard.

So, some interesting facts about James Whitaker, but still no answers as to why he is the only person commemorated by a Memorial on the wall of the Church!

Recipe Corner

Thai Grilled Chicken (serves 4)

7 oz block creamed coconut

½ pt very hot water

3 - 4 cloves garlic, peeled and chopped

2 fresh green chillies, deseeded and chopped

1 - 2 level tsp ground ginger

3 tbsp light soy sauce

grated zest and juice of 1 - 2 limes

2 level tbsp caster sugar

1 pack fresh coriander

4 boneless chicken breasts

Cut coconut into large chunks and dissolve in the hot water (or use liquid milk instead). Blend with all other ingredients except chicken, reserving a little coriander to garnish.

Make 3 diagonal cuts in the chicken breasts, arrange in a dish and pour over the marinade. Cover and marinate in fridge for at least 30 mins. Preheat grill to medium setting. Arrange chicken, skin side down in a grill pan and spread over some of the marinade. Grill for 10 - 15 mins, turning and basting occasionally. Allow slightly longer to cook the skin side of the chicken. Heat remaining marinade in pan and simmer gently for 2 mins. Serve chicken and sauce on bed of rice.
